LONDON, June 14.
Extract of a Letter from Islamabad, in the East-Indies, December 2, 1763.
OSSIM ALY, about the 6th of October last, committed the most barbarous Massacre at Patna, on our People, to the Number of about 58, chiefly military Officers and covenanted Servants, who were unfortunately his Prisoners, dragging them out one after another, and butchering them all in one Day, in the most cruel and unheard of Manner. Unfatigued with this he continued the Massacre to every private European in his Possession, and even of his own Subjects; he left not a Man alive of either Power or Substance in this Country. As soon as the melancholy Tidings reached Calcutta, a Cloud of Sorrow overpread the whole Settlement for the Loss of so many valuable Men, a general Fast was observed, and a mourning of 14 Days.

The Army continued their March to Patna, which they took by Storm, November 6, after a very obstinate Defence, in which the Enemy had 1000 Men killed. About 30 Europeans and 150 Sepoys were killed or wounded on our Side. The Nabob Cossim Aly is retired into the Soubah of Oude's Dominions, with the small Remains of his Army, and a Treasure more than Three Millions in Specie, besides Jewels and other valuable Effects, which will still make him formidable.
Among those who suffered by the Massacre, were Messieurs Ellis, chief of Patna; Hay, of the Council of Calcutta; Luffington, second of Patna; Gentlemen of great Merit, who had formerly survived the Black Hole, after that accompanied Lord Clive in his Success, now fell by the Hands of a common Executioner. Much about the same Time were put to Death, Seat Motehray and his Brother, two Bankers, esteemed the richest Subjects in the World.
Mr. Fullerton, Surgeon to the Patna Factory, was the only Person that escaped the Massacre.

June 18. Wednesday his Majesty in Council was pleased to order 25 Grants, to different Persons, of a great Number of Acres of Land in the Country of Florida, in America.
Yesterday his Majesty was pleased to appoint his Royal Highness Prince William Henry to the Command of the Coldstream Regiment, in the Room of Lord Tryalway, who has resigned.
It is said a Disgrace has been issued out against a great Personage, and three of the King's Messengers, at the Suit of Mr. Beardmore's Clerk, who was several Days confined on Account of the Monitor.
Yesterday the Purser of the Oyster, Vincent, arrived at the India-house, with the News of that Ship's being arrived in the Downs, from Bengal; he has brought Advice, that every Thing was re-settled there on its former Footing, and Peace and Tranquillity restored since the taking of Mougear and Patna, from Cossim Aly, in the former of which Places 2000 of the Enemy surrendered at Discretion.
It is said 80 non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers, suffered at Patna, besides the Gentlemen of the English Factory there.

The Diet is now sitting at Warsaw, for the Choice of a King, where the Disputes run high; when the Affair of Religion came upon the Carpet, Sabres were drawn, because there seemed to be a Design to favour the Protestants. It has therefore been resolved that the Person to be chosen King ought to be, both by Father and Mother, a Descendant of a Polish House, and of the Roman Catholic Religion.
Some Advices from Warsaw remark, that there has been several Rencontres between the Armies of the contending Parties for the Crown.
Advices from Warsaw say, that the Crown Army have elected Count Branicki their General, to be King of Poland, and allege as a Reason for it, that it was done in order to be before hand with the Diet.
It is said that a common Seaman's Share of the rich Spanish Prize, the Santissima Trinidad, will amount to 600 l.
Yesterday was brought to the Bank from Portsmouth, in two Waggon, guarded by a Party of Sailors, about three Tons of Money, among which was a considerable quantity of Gold, brought home in the Depford Man of War from the Havannah. The above Ship brings Advice, that the English Affairs in that Island will not be so soon finished as was expected.

A CASE to the Gentlemen of the Law.
ILL WEBSTER, of Stamford, sold as good a Cup of Ale as ever mantled or nitted in a Beer-Glass. He was bred a Baker, and as it is common in the Country, he also sold Bread; and it was as usual for Working People to call for a Penny Loaf, as a Penny-worth of Ale, at his House.
A Man came to Webster's one Day, and wanted six Penny Loaves—Webster served him as he sat in the Drinking-Room; but after six Loaves had been told out to the Fellow, says the Man, Master Webster, take one of your Loaves back, I'll have but five, and bring me a Penny-worth of Ale, that will make up Six-pence all the same.
The Man drank up his Penny-worth, called for another Cup of Ale, returned the Landlord a Loaf, and so on, until he had exchanged all the six Loaves for six Penny-worth of Ale. Then rising up to go, the Landlord demanded his Reckoning: For what? quoth the Man—For my Bread, replied the Landlord. Have you not had it again? was the Customer's Answer. Then pay me for my Ale, replied the Publican: I gave you Bread for it, answered the Defendant.
BOSTON, August 13.
English Cheese is now hawk'd about the Streets of this Town at 2 d. Sterling per lb. soaverse are the People from purchasing any Manufacture, Remittances for which is likely to be so difficult, if not impossible to be made.

We are informed that large Demands are made upon this Province from New-York for Wool, the People there being determined immediately to set forward that Manufacture with the utmost Vigour.
We are credibly informed, that a Subscription will be set on Foot within six Months, for no Person to wear British Manufacture of any Kind, above 6 s. Sterling Price, and 'tis said it will certainly be effected.
A WHITE NEGRO is to be seen at the White-Horse.— This is thought by some to be a Specimen of what may be very common a few Years hence, tho' at present a great Curiosity.

Extract of a Letter from Quebec, May 30.
We have Chief Justice Gregory, with some Attorneys at Law, &c. lately arrived here, but it is thought that the Civil Government will not take place till some time in September, at which Time, by the Treaty of Peace, all the Inhabitants that do not go to France, must become British Subjects; but the Number which we shall lose on the Occasion will be very inconsiderable, as we have by every Ship from England, French reduced Officers of the Colony Troops, and those that have Connections in this Country, coming over to take up their Quarters and settle, who are generally very much dissatisfied with their Reception and Treatment in France.—Every Thing remains quiet in the Upper Country, though it is said by some late Letters that the Savages are making Preparations to open the Campaign. The 300 Canadian Volunteers which were raised and went from hence, are arrived some time past at Oswego. The several Nations of Indians about this Place have taken up the War-Hatchet in our Favour. Sixty Warriors are already gone to join Sir William Johnson, and about 60 more are preparing to set out.

NEW-YORK, August 20.
Extract of a Letter from Niagara, dated July 15, 1764.
Last Sunday Afternoon the Snow Johnson arrived here from Ontario, with Sir William on board; who since his Arrival has been much busied in holding Councils with the Indians, of whom there are now at this Place above 1000, of different Nations, some to join and proceed with the Army; some with Peltry, expecting Trade to be opened; and others to treat of Peace. This Morning 105 Men of the Follen Avonies, arrived here, and are now in Council in the Fort. The Senecas have been expected for several Days past, but are not yet come in: We are informed that there are about 900 of them and the Delawares assembled together. It is whispered about, that if they don't come in, in a few Days, the Army will march against them. The Army in the Boats was 8 Days in the Passage from Fort Ontario hither, having met with some violent Storms, in which four of the largest Boats were cast away and wrecked to Pieces; the Mens Lives were all saved, and most of the Provisions and Baggage. About two-thirds of the Army, with their Boats, &c. are got over the Carrying Place, and the Remainder will be over in two or three Days. We have now four Vessels on Lake Erie; the last of which set out for Detroit Yesterday. A few days ago, a Soldier was fired at by an Indian on the Carrying-Place; the Ball struck his Haversack, the things therein prevented its entering his Body; he returned the Fire, and made his Escape to one of the little Posts. If Sir William's indefatigable Diligence and Influence over the Indians does not prevent it, we'll be at Loggerheads with them in a few Days.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, August 2.
We are here, attending the Congress Day after Day, with about 1300 Indians of different Nations, some of whom have come 600 Miles. They have concluded a peace with Sir William Johnson, except the Delawares and Shawanese, whom we have, near a Month, waited for, as they are to bring their Prisoners, in order to be delivered up. We expect to set off for Detroit in a few days, having every thing ready for that purpose.

Another Account of Indian Affairs.
Our Advices from Above, relating to Sir William Johnson, his Expedition to Niagara, are of several dates, equally of good Authority: They affirm, That there are upwards of 2000 Indians of different Tribes attending the Treaty, some to join and proceed with the Army, some with Peltry expecting Trade to be opened, and others to treat of Peace, some of whom it is said came the Distance of 600 Miles: That Sir William, having made Peace with all the Nations of Indians that were there, on the 6th of August left Niagara, and on the 7th returned safe to Fort-Ontario. That by this Peace the Delawares are to give up two of their principal People, for the Performance of which three Seneca Chiefs are now Hostages at Fort Ontario. And—That Col. Bradstreet, with his Army, left Niagara the 6th of August, on his Way to Detroit.

ANNAPOLIS, August 30.
On Monday the 20th of this Instant, Died, at his Seat in St. Mary's County, in the LXVIIIth Year of his Age, the Hon^{ble} PHILIP KEY, Esq; one of the Council of this Province. He was a truly pious and devout Christian, an affectionate and tender Husband, an indulgent and fond Parent, a humane Master, a warm Friend, a friendly Neighbour, and a most agreeable and cheerful Companion. His Death is sincerely lamented by his Family, and all his numerous Friends and Acquaintance.
The Ship Betsey, Capt. James Butler, from James-River for Bristol, was spoke with 100 Leagues to the Eastward of the Capes, on the 10th Instant, by Capt. John Thomas of the Portsmouth, All Well on Board.

Extract of a Letter from Quebec, dated June 22, 1764.
We had three Men of War come up here last Week, which are to stay here some Time. Yesterday came Capt. Malcolm of this Place, and made Oath before the Secretary, That he was lately at Turks-Island, one of the Bahamas, when a 64 Gun French Ship of War, and four Frigates came there, and burnt and destroyed all the Settlements there belonging to the English, to the Amount of about 150 Families, and carried off all their Effects: That some of the Inhabitants went to the French Governor at Cape-Francois, for Redress, but he told them, his Orders from the King his Master were, to suffer no English to settle there: We imagine here, from what the Captain reports, that the Spaniards lay Claim to that Island, and have given it with Part of Hispaniola in Exchange for Louisiana; however, there are some Men of War gone in Quest of them, and I hope will give a good Account of them. I think they begin full early.
