" After having voluntarily pleaded Guilty, I to receive Sentence of the Law. Great as my Majesty's Mercy is still greater; and if in my any Circumstances have happily happened, by your Majesty's Subjects (and with Truth I can say I have lived above 200 from perishing) I hope those who will, in some Measure, recommend me, a truly dutiful, to his Royal Majesty; and if it shall be a Pleasure to save that forfeited Life, which before the Means of saving many others, the Remainder spent in a Manner becoming the Situation, of that ineffable Blessing. My Lords, I appear in Court last Sessions to put off my Trial, in order to be able to lay many favourable Circumstances before your Majesty, that might incline your Lordships to be being advised that those Circumstances were to be laid before his Royal Majesty, I confessed which in Conscience I could not deny. Your Lordships, you feel as Men, and perhaps, may now have compassion for an unhappy Youth truly penitent, Twenty Years of Age. Permit me, my Lords, if your Lordships, who are now proceeding according to Law, shall be pleas'd to render me any compassion, that Obligation to myself and my worthy (now involved in my Sufferings, but not in my never be forgotten. But my Lords, if after all Cup of Justice is not to be removed from me, I submit to thy Will, O God, in whom I trust."

On Sunday Night, at near Eleven o'Clock, Majesty's Messengers, dispatched from the Secret Office, came to Newgate, and brought a Reprieve, King's Pleasure, for Michael Sampson, who on Confession was convicted of Forgery, and received of Death, at the last Session at the Old Bailey, and included in the Death Warrant, to suffer with seven Malefactors Tomorrow. BOSTON, August 20.

I am sorry to tell you, that by the late Orders received in the Officers of the War to be sent to the Officers, and by a seizure made in consequence of the Spaniards are terrified that they will not run a risk of being either seized or taken to traffic with a Pistole is now rarely to be met with; and, in a former time, this Island, which always abounded with Spanish remitted such Quantities of it to England, will now be supplied with Linen, Woollens, Silks, Cottons, from the French and Dutch Colonies, who will probably to set a true Value on this Branch of Trade, and to keep it. We are quite at a loss to know what Hopes they ever did in England, or where is the Mischiefs that our Country, is supplied with the Spaniards with the Goods of Great-Britain!!

NEWPORT, August 20.

It is with Pleasure we hear some of the principal merchants in Boston have come into a Resolution to curb Superstitions in Dress; and that upwards of fifty have signed a certain Agreement for that Purpose. Ruffes, &c. are to be entirely laid aside: No English to be purchased but at a fixed Price; the usual Manner of expressing their Regard and Sorrow for a deceased Relative, by covering themselves in Black, is also to be discontinued, and no Part thereof but the Colour of the Hat is retained; instead of which, a Piece of Cloth to be tied upon the Arm, after the Manner of the Gentlemen.
