THIS Morning the Right Honorable Richard, Lord Bishop of Exeter, was enthroned at St. Paul's Cathedral, between 10 and 11 o'Clock, during the Time of

After the first Lesson, the Choir proceeded to the Chapter House in St. Paul's Church, whence they returned in the forenoon through the West Door, the Organ playing: Two Virgins came first, who were followed by the young Gentlemen of St. Paul's, who were followed by the Vicars Choral, Mr. Saviner, and after him the Minor Canons, Prebends and Residentiaries. Two preceded some Officers belonging to the Church, who were followed by his Lordship's Chaplains. On their Arrival in the Church the Choir divided, and his Lordship seated between them up to the surbourne right Hand of the Choir, where he read the following Instrument read by

"I John Taylor, Chancellor of the Authority to me committed, do hereby enthrone you, the Right Reverend Father in God Richard, by Divine Permission, into the Bishoprick and Episcopal Dignity; and the Lord preserve thy going coming in, from this Time forth forever, and mayest thou remain in Justice and adorn the Place to you delegated; God is powerful, and may he increase thy Grace."

After which, he returned in the forenoon to his Seat, when Te Deum, and the rest of the Service, and an Anthem was performed, and ended, they returned to the Chapter House in the same Manner as above related, where the Vicars Choral, &c. acknowledged Canonical Obedience in the Words following: "Right Rev. Father in God, I acknowledge your Canonical Obedience, due to you as Bishop of Exeter, London."

June 15. This Week a Ship-master of the following Trick had been played upon him, who had brought over from America. He put on board some of his Trunks, and on landing at Cowes received a Letter which required his immediate attendance in London: He accordingly set off for London, giving his Notice to the Captain, giving his Notice to his Passengers, to be paid in London, never having been heard of since, the Captain anxious to enquire into the Nature of the Trick, left in his Hands, and ventured to open the Trunks, which was only filled with Ruin: The whole was discovered to be an Artifice calculated to cheat an honest unsuspecting of his Property.

June 18. It was on Saturday reported that a Memorial is preparing to be dispatched to the King at Madrid, touching the Behavior of the Spaniards, in excluding the English from the Bay of Logwood in the Bay of Honduras, and to demand an Explanation. Since the Report of the Spaniards late in the Bay of Honduras, some People have been Fears about their Friends not yet returned from the Havannah, as the next Step may be a speedy Order for the English to depart without having Time to settle their Affairs, and to remove their Effects from that Island. We have the blessed Effects of suffering so many Ships of Irish Provisions to be transported among the Spaniards, since they may, in all Probability, be consequently fight us with our own Weapons. It is said that the Fortifications of the Havannah and in general every Place of Strength in the West Indies, are in a better State of Repair, and thoroughly repaired, and well garrisoned before the late War; so great has been the Attention of the Court of Madrid towards the Concerns of the Monarchy in the West Indies, and of the World.
