D'Eon, for his Excellency the Count de Guerchy, Ambassador; a special Jury was impanelled on the Occasion; but no Evidence appeared on D'Eon's Behalf, he was found guilty, and sentence is to be pronounced To-morrow Day of Term.

On Saturday Night, at Ten o'Clock, the 82d Year of his Age, at his House in Pall Mall, the Right Honourable William Pulteney, Earl of Bath, Viscount Pulteney, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Salop, and one of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Counsellors, died. He dying without Male Issue, the Title and his paternal Estate devolves to his Son, Lieutenant-General Harry Pulteney, who is far advanced in Years.

July 12. We hear that on Saturday last a Petition was entered for the Right Honourable Lord Halifax, in the Action brought by Lord Halifax's Clerk against his Lordship, and his Majesty's Messengers.
