

QUBBEC, October 4. 1764.
The following were lately Passed here, by the Governor, and Council of Canada, viz. An Ordinance for regulating and establishing the Courts of Judicature, Justices of the Peace, Quarter Sessions, Bailiffs, and other matters relative to the distribution of Justice within this Province.

An Ordinance for ratifying and confirming the decrees of the several Courts of Justice established in the Districts of Quebec, Montreal, and Trois Rivieres, prior to the establishment of civil Government throughout that Province, upon the tenth of August last.

An Ordinance declaring that publishing the Ordinances of that Province in the Quebec Gazette, shall be deemed a sufficient Publication, after they have been read publicly in the several Towns.

An Ordinance for establishing the Currency of that Province. (All Coins are fixed, so that they are in the Province of the Massachusetts a Dollar 6 s. a Guinea 28 s. &c. but a Pistole is reckon'd at 1 s. 2 d. and 20 British Coppers is one Shilling.)

An Ordinance relating to Assize of Bread, for ascertaining the Standard of Weights and Measures in Quebec. When the Price of Wheaten Flour is under 14 s. the 112 lb. Assiraupeis, a 6d. Loaf of the same shall weigh 4 lb. ditto brown Loaf 6lb.

The hon. Walter Murray, Esq; is appointed Receiver-General of the Province.

Richard Murray, Esq; Vendue Master, and Deputy Receiver-General. And

James Potts, Esq; Judge of the Court of Admiralty.

NEW-YORK, December 3.

We are credibly assured, that Sir William Johnson proposes calling down the Chiefs of every Nation this Winter to his Hall, on Business of great Importance to England, and the People in America. A great Number of Indians came to Sir William's the 6th of last Month. The whole we hope will terminate to the Honour of his Majesty, and the general Benefit of his Subjects.

On Tuesday arrived the Sloop Friend, Capt. John Malcom, in 16 Days from Quebec, by whom we hear, that a considerable Quantity of Snow had already fallen there, and the Winter seemed to be set in earlier than usual; but the People were generally healthy, and extremely happy under the Civil Government lately established there, which was so judiciously regulated as to give general Satisfaction and Advantage both to the English and French; and the Appointment and Conduct of all the Officers in the Administration, especially of his Excellency the Governor, met with the highest Approbation from all Ranks of People.

PHILADELPHIA, December 6.

On Monday last arrived here Major Small, in his Way to New-York, with Dispatches from Col. Bouquet to General GAGE; our Advices by that Gentleman are as follow:

That he left the Army in high Spirits, encamped at the Forks of Muckingham, on the 18th ult. That the Expedition into the Indian Country has had the desired Effect, the Mingoes, Delaware and Shawanese Indians, after a long Struggle, having at last submitted to the Terms prescribed to them, viz.

1. To deliver up all the Prisoners without Exception.
2. To give Fourteen Hostages, to remain in our Hands, as a Security for the strict Performance of the foregoing Article; and that they shall commit no Hostilities against His Majesty's Subjects.

That upon these Conditions they are permitted to send Deputies from each Nation to Sir WILLIAM JOHNSON, to make their Peace. That the Mingoes have given Two of the above mentioned Hostages, the Delawares Six, and the Shawanese Six. That from the present humble Dispositions of the Savages, it was thought our Frontier Inhabitants might return in Safety to their deserted Plantations. That the Indians had brought in above Two Hundred Prisoners before the Major left the Camp, and above One Hundred more were daily expected. That the Delawares and Mingoes have not only delivered all their Prisoners, but even their own Children, born by White Women. That the Shawanese had been very obstinate, but were forced to submit to the same Conditions as the other Nations. That the Enemy were said to be in the greatest Distress, having neither Provisions, Cloathing, nor Powder, their Women, we hear, being covered with Skins only, and the Men in a still worse Condition; and that it was generally believed they are now sincere, and the Peace will be lasting, as they were convinced, at last, that even their Woods could not protect them, when followed by so brave and judicious a Commander, at the Head of a gallant, though but

small Army; it being remarked, that the whole of the Troops on the Expedition have behaved in the most regular Manner, and shewn the greatest Activity and Resolution; and it is particularly mentioned, that the Men from this Province have carried on the Service with great Zeal and Cheerfulness, and that their Conduct does them Honour in every Respect. That the Troops of this Government were to be sent immediately to Carlisle, and with them the Prisoners belonging to it. That the Army have been very healthy, and had met with no Loss since they left Pittsburgh, only one of the Light Horse, who was killed by some Indians, supposed to be Wyondots, but that there were other Indians out after them, who promised to bring them in, if possible. And that the Colonel, with the Forces, it was expected, would be at Fort Pitt as Sunday last.

ANNAPOLIS, December 13.

Last Thursday Evening, Departed this Life at his House in Town, after a tedious Indisposition with complicated Diforders, in the LVth Year of his Age, the Hon^{ble} STEPHEN BORDLEY, Esq; one of his Lordship's Council of State, Commissary-General of the Province, and one of the Aldermen of this City. He was a Gentleman of great Eminence in, and Proficiency in the Law, and many young Gentlemen studied under him, do Honour to his Memory. Mr. BORDLEY formerly Represented this County, in the General Assembly, and was also, Officer of this District, and Attorney-at-Law of the Province. And his Remains were interred with great Decency, Entomb'd on Tuesday last in his Family Vault.
