HERE arose here in the Night between the 23d and 24th of this Month, a terrible Storm, mingled with Rain, Thunder, Lightning and Hail. In an Inftant the Rivers (welled fo confiderably by the Fall of the Waters which rushed down from the Mountains, that they flowed again into the City. tains, that they flowed again into the City; and arose in some Streets as high as the first Stories of the Houses; so that several of their Foundations gave Way. Divers Persons, and a great Number of Cattle, perished in this Inundation, which carried before It the Cellars and Magazines filled with Wines, Oil Paising and other Magazines. Oil, Raisins, and other Merchandizes. The Loss is valued at 3000 Pezos, without comprehending the Damages of the Houses, which are rendered uttinhabitable by this Accident. The greater Part of the Vineyards are destroyed, the Villages and their Fields are ruined, and we expect to hear News still more melancholy, which this Storm may have occasioned at Sea.

LONDON. October 27. In September last the Princess Caroline Custom-house Yatcht, Capt. John Read, failed from Leith for Lerwick in Shetland, with two Custom-house Officers on board, to be stationed there.. The Ship being old aid crazy they spring a Leak, and were obliged to out in at Peterhead to refit. On the Afternoon of the Day they failed from the Haziness of the Weather, they found themselves among the Breakers on the main Land of Shetland; and to avoid immediate Destruction, pushed into a small Bay sur-Pounded on all Sides with Rocks, of a stupendary to the back of the stupendary to the duous Height: Here they luckily ftruck on a Sand Bank. In the midst of their Conflernation a faithful Negro, whom Capt. Read had brought from the South Seas, Iwam off with a Rope in quest of dry Ground; this he found, though by the Sea Mark on the Rocks, It was evident that it was many freet under Water at full Tide. By the Assistance of the Rope they all left the Shi Affistance of the Rope they all left the Ship exceptions of the Officers before mentioned, who being sold and corpulent, choic rather to flay on board; they had loft their Boat before: They then endeavoured in vain to elimb the Rocks, and the Advance of the Tide redoubled their Terror. At last the Negro discovered a Clest, by which they might ascend the Rock above High Water Mark; this Clest terminated in a Hollow or Grotto, where they all took up their Night's Abode. Next Morning at Ebb they descended to reconnoite their Situation, and found that the Rocks, were inacceffible, nor could they any ways get round, as the Rocks forming a Semi-circle, extended on both Sides far into the Sea. They then in Defpair returned to their Ship, where they found the Officer they left on board, upon the Main Sheoulds from where he had formed. Main Shrouds, from whence he had fcarcely been ten Minutes, before the Malt came by the Board, and was followed by the Foremalt: And now the Hull worked so that they all resolved to leave tier again, which they did with much Difficulty, and had not been long on Shore before the went to Pieces .- Thus they were to all Appearance reduced to the Alternative of Starving or Drowning; which carried them to a more minute Examination of the Rocks, when one of the Sailors found a Place which feemed to offer, the hare Poffibility of Ascent at the Hazard of his Neck, which, however, in their Circumstances, was no hazard at all. He mounted, and carried a Rope with him, and fastened it to

the Top, by which the reft got up after him. Thus being contrary to all Hopes delivered, half naked, and almost perished, they sought and found a Hut, where they reposed themfelves, and after procured a Conveyance to

Lerwick.
