HE Commissioners appointed by the King for the Sale of Lands in the Islands of Grenada; the Granadines, St. Vincent, Dominica, and Tobago, and for adjusting and settling with the French Inhabitants of St. Vincent and Dominica, the Terms and Conditions on which his Majesty has been graciously pleased to direct that the said Inhabitants may become British Subjects, and remain in Possession of the Chared Lands they occupied at the Time of the Surrender of the faid Islands, &c. &c. being informed in Possession of the cleared Lands they occupied at the Time of the Surrender of the said Islands, &c. &c. being informed that some Missperehensions and Doubts have arisen concerning the Tenor and Meaning of the said Islands: the Commissioners, the better to enable the faid Inhabitants clearly to comprehend the same, have directed the subsequent Abstract, taken from his Majesty's Instructions, to be translated into French, and dispersed in the said Island.

Abstract of the Terms and Conditions contained in his Majesty's Instructions, relative to the French Inhabitants of the Island of St. Vincent and Dominica.

HE native Caribbees of St. Vincent are permitted to remain undisturbed in their Cottages and Grounds, and the French Inhabitants is the 150.

remain undiffurbed in their Cottages and Grounds, and the French Inhabitants in that Island and Dominica are encouraged to continue on the Lands which they have cleared, and to enjoy their Possessions, by Virtue of Leases under the Crown in the following Manner, and sobject to the solution of Conditions, that is to say: The Lesses is to take the Oaths of Allegiance, and make and sobscribe the Declaration of Abjuration; he is to hold by his Lease only such cleared Lands, as he was at the Surrender of those Islands, and still is possession of a contiguous Lands where his very great Conveniency makes some small Alterations necessary, in which Case small Parcels of contiguous Lands may be added and comprised therein as the Commissioner shall judge reasonable. In Cases where Lands were held before the late Peace by several French Proprietors jointly, some of whom are fince retired from them, the said Lands are to be severed into Parts, and Indulgence shown in the Division to those who are contented encouraged to continue on the Lands which they have clearfrom them, the faid Lands are to be severed into Parts, and Indulgence shewn in the Division to those who are contented to remain and receive their Portions. But the Lands which have been occupied by religious Societies are not infelded within the Meaning of these Provisions, nor intitled to the same Favour, but are to be otherwise disposed of. And if any French Inhabitant there happens to be, who has occupied more than Five Hundred Acres of Land, as above described, in St. Vincent, or Three Hundred in Dominica, his Possessions are the research to the Number of Nicholand. his Possessions are to be reduced to those Numbers. Neither the Leases, or any Part of the Lands thereby demised, are the Leafes, or any Part of the Lands thereby demifed, are affiguable to any other Person, without a Licence first had from the Governor-General, and the Approbation of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations: And a Covenant is also to be inserted in the Leafe, that the Lesse shall reside at least one Half of the Year, in the Island where the Lands lie. If it shall be found necessary to appropriate to public Uses, cleared Lands in the Possession of any French Inhabitant, he shall be paid for any Buildings, or Improvements thereon by fair Appraisement, and be allotted uncleared Lands in lieu of his cleared Lands so appropriated as above-mentioned.

Under the Restrictions, and with these Conditions, Leases, to be figured by the Commissioners, and passed under the Seal of the Islands, may be granted for the Terms of fourteen, twenty-one, thirty-two, or forty Years, at the Option of the Lesses, or (if they preser it) for fourteen Years, renewable at the pleasure of the Lesses for a further Number of Years, not exceeding forty in the whole. And, in Confideration hereof, certain Fines are to be paid down and Quit-rents reserved to the Crown, according to the Natura and Circumstances of the Case. But if any French Inhabitants shall not be disposed to occupy the Land he has already cleared, upon the Terms of the Leafe required of him, he will be permitted to take up uncleared Lands, usincumbered with those Terms, to be allotted him by the Commissioners, in lieu of the former, and be moreover paid for the Buildings thereof he fair Aparaifament.

IV. The Determinations of the faid Inhabitants with Regard to the Terms and Conditions explained in the preceding Abstract, declaring which of the Alternatives offered, they severally prefer. In order to become British Subsects.

ceding Abstract, declaring which of the Alternatives offered, they severally preser, in order to become British Subjects, and early the Privileges and Advantages of that free and happy Government.

And, lest any improper Infinuations should be used to alarm or prejudice the said Inhabitants, it is declared, that such information is required with no other View, than to enable the Commissioners the more easily and speedily to settle the Business that is to be concluded with them.

It may not however be improper particularly to evolute.

It may not however be improper particularly to explain, that no Bargain or Agreement whatever can be fuffained, which any of the faid Inhabitants may have made or entered into with other Persons, respecting Lands or Houses, since

the Time of the Surrender of the faid Islands; nor will any the Time of the Surrender of the said Islands; nor will any Allowance be granted for Improvements of any kind, made in consequence of such unwarrantable Proceedings. All Lands and Houses (excepting the Town Lots granted by Governor Dalrymple, in Charlottville, is the Island of Dominica) which shall not be judged by the said Commissioners actually to belong to French Ishabitants occupying the same, will be the Property of the King, and disposed of according to his Majesty's royal Instructions.

UBLIC Notice is hereby given, That the Commissioners appointed by his Majesty for the Sale and Disposal of Lands in the Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Tobago, St. Vincent, and Dominica, are (in Consequence of Resolutions taken at a Board held in Barbados the fifth Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-five) a-

One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-five) about to proceed immediately to the several Illands that are the Object of their Commission, for the more speedy and effectual Execution of his Ma-

jefty's Instructions.

That they shall accordingly, in Conjunction with the Governor-General of the Grenades and Neutral Islands, or in his Absence, with the Lieutenant Governor of each Island, respessively, proceed to divide the Islands of Tolsago and St. Vincent into convenient Districts or Parishes, and set apart, in these and the other Islands, such Lands (in the most convenient Situations) as shall be thought most proper for Fortifications, Yards for the Use of the Navy, and other military Purpofes.

· That the faid Commissioners shall determine on a proper Situation in every Parish for a Town convenient for Trade and Navigation; such Towns to confist of Lots of different Size and Extent for Houses, to which Gardens or Fields will be annexed, not exceeding fix Acres, to any one Town-Lot: And that in laying out such Town-Lots, they shall referve convenient Places for Wharfs and Quays, and for all other necessary public Uses; and reserve in every Parish such Wood Lands as shall seem necessary for the Construction and Repair of Fortifications and public Buildings, and to prevent that Drought which in these Climates is the usual Consequence of a total Removal of the Woods.

. That they shall also trace out the Direction of all great Roads in each Island respectively, for the Conveniency of Communication between Town and Town, and fet out Roads between the Allotments of Plantation Lands, for the Conveniency of the Purchafers thereof.

That uncleared Lands shaft be set apart in each Parith for such poor Settlers as shall apply to the Governor General of the Grenades and Neutral Islands, or the Lientenant-Governor of the Island where such Lands lie, for the same.

That the native Caribbees of St. Vincent are to continue undisturbed in the Possession of their Cottages and Grounds.

That with Respect to the cleared Lands in the Islands of Sr. Vincent and Dominica, as the same have been occupied by the French in open Vio-lation of the Faith of Treaties made between the Crowns of Great-Britain and France, and in express Contradiction to the public Orders iffued by the Court of France; and as no Authority has been given to any of the Governors to make Grants thereof, the Commissioners are forbid to allow of any Establishment of the French, in Consequence of the Settlements made by them in the faid Islands: But his Majesty has nevertheless been graciously pleased to encourage the present French Inhabitants o continue under his paternal Care and Protection, on certain Terms, Refrictions; and Refervations; and the Commissioners accordingly shall and will, with all convenient Speed, proceed to execute his Majesty's Instructions on that Head, as follows:

That is to fay, To fuch of the French Inhabitants of the faid Islands as shall take the Oath of Allegiance, and make and subscribe the Declaration of Abjuration, Leafes shall be prepared and granted by the Commissioners, which shall also pais under the Seal of the Government of Grena-

da, and be registered in the Office of the Secretary of the Island where the Lands lie, of fuch cleared Lands as were in the Possession of the faid French at the Time of the Surrender of the Illands aforefaid, and fill are in their Possession (together with such small Parcels of contiguous Lands in Wood as may be convenient to the Lesse, and which the Commissioners may think reasonable to infert in fuch Leafe) unless such cleared Lands are found necessary for public Uses; in which Case other Landa shall be allotted them in Lieu thereof, and the full Value and Improvements shall be afcertained, and Compensation made for them in the most fair and equitable Manner.

That such Leases shall be for Fourteen, Twenty-one, Thirty-two, or Forty Years, at the Option of the Lessees; or 14 Years, renewable at the Pleasure of the Lessee; for a Number of Years not exceeding Forty in the Whole: And, in Consideration of which Leases, such Fines and Quitrents shall be paid down, as are thought proportionable to the Term of Years and Quality of Land.

That the Land so demised shall not be affiguable to any other Person, without a Licence sirft had from the Governor: General of the Grenades and Neutral Islands, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, and approved by the Lords Com-missioners for Trade and Plantations.

That the Lessee shall reside one Half of the Year in the Island where the Lands lie. And in Cases where Lands were held before the late Peace by several French Proprietors jointly, some of whom are fince retired from them, they are to be severed into Parts, and indulgence shewn in the Division to those who are contented to remain and receive their Portions, and who will also enjoy every Advantage that peculiarly belongs to British Subjects.

That in Case any French Inhabitants should rather preser uncleared Lands in any of the Islands, to the cleared Lands on the Terms above-mentioned, uncleared Lands, unincumbered with the Terms of the Leafe, shall be allotted them in Lieu thereof by the faid Commissioners; and they shall moreover be paid the Value of the Buildings

they leave.

That these Provisions shall not however extend to such as occupy more than 500 Acres in the Island of St. Vincent, and 300 Acres in the Island of Dominica: If any such there be, the Com-missioners shall reduce their Possessions to those Numbers, and dispose of the Surplus in the same Manner as of Lands not occupied by French In-

That the Commissioners are impowered by his Majesty to determine who are to be deemed French Inhabitants, and what Lands they shall be deemed possessed of, within the Meaning of the King's Instructions: That religious Communities are not to be considered as included herein; such Lands as they have been possessed of will be fold for the public Benefit.

That no Grants, Bargains, or Sales whatever, hitherto made (excepting legal Sales in Grenada and the Grenadines) will be attended to or allowed of, as his Majesty has been pleased to declare that of, as his Majetty has been pleafed to declare that no Authority has been granted to any of his Governors for this Purpole. His Majetty has notwithstanding been pleafed to except twenty-five Town-Lots, confisting of forty Feet in Front and one hundred and fifty Feet in Depth, granted by Governor Dalrymple in the Town of Charlotville in the Island of Dominica: And the Commission in the Island of Dominica: And the Commissioners are directed to confirm these Grants, by giving to the several Grantees Certificates that the faid Lots were so conveyed to them; which shall intitle them to Grants thereof under the Seal of the Islands, provided they agree to insert in such Grants the same Conditions as are in all other Grants of Town Lots.

I hat with Respect to all Lands in any of the Islands which are the Object of the Commission, and which are not comprised within the above Description of Lands reserved for public Uses; Lands set apart for poor Settlers; Lands which are the rightful Property of the Inhabitants of Grenada and the Grenadines; or that may be leafed out to the French Inhabitants of Dominica or St. Vincent, or possessed by the native Caribbees; they shall be divided into Allotments for [For the Remainder turn to the loft Page.]
