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Wished him per Week, which will cost from 7/6 to 10/ the Cord, but for which he is to be charged no more than 5/0. The Houses in which the Troops are to be quartered, consist, for the most Part, of no more than four Rooms, including the Kitchen, for which the Inhabitants pay a Rent equal to what you pay near the Royal Exchange, London, so that it is really hard upon them to be obliged thus to let the Officers have their Rooms gratis. On the Canadians, in particular, it is very hard, most of them having their Houses destroyed in the Bombardment, to rebuild which they had borrowed Money, and had nothing to depend upon, but the letting them out in Lodgings. The English have sent a Letter to the G— of C—, wherein they represent their distressed Condition, and propose to repair the Barracks, till his Majesty's Pleasure be known, &c.

"Advice is just now come from Montreal, that Things are arrived there to such a Height, that the Inhabitants never dine, nor even sit in their own Houses, without Pistols before them. When a Soldier enters, and demands a Pound of Sugar, or any other Thing which dare not be denied him, they present a Pistol to him to prevent his committing any Outrage, and hold it in that Posture till he retires. People dare not even go out into the Street in the Day Time, without Arms. Two Officers are taken up on Suspicion of being concerned in Mr. Walker's Affair, of which I wrote you Word in my last. [See the Letter above] A Serjeant, his Wife, and a common Soldier, are also taken up on the same Account, and are brought down to Quebec for fear of a Rescue at Montreal. There is no fear of their rescuing the Officers there, as the Inhabitants would murder them if they could do it privately, and the Soldiers will not obey the Officers in any Thing. It is greatly feared the Troops in general will either lay down their Arms, or join the Canadians and Indians, who it is feared, have some Intentions to attempt to repossess themselves of the Province, there being 800 or 1000 of the latter assembled at Frontinac, who murder all they meet with, without Exception, though they give out they are going against the Niagaras, another Party of Indians, with whom they are at Variance. The Arrival of these Indians so near Montreal has thrown the Inhabitants into the greatest Confusion, and may probably end, not in an Indian War, but a Provincial One.

Copy of the Pasquinade pasted up in the Market-Place at Quebec.

"By good Intelligence from New-York, we can assure the Public, that the Society for the Encouragement of Arts and Sciences has sent there, to be forwarded to Quebec, as a Present to that infant Colony, a high finished Picture, executed by a masterly Hand, and expecting it to be fixed up in their Town House, to stimulate the Inhabitants to a Defence of Trade and Commerce, which is ever founded on Liberty, and Property, and adds, that our House of Legislature sits on Wool Bags for the same Purpose.

"Principal Figure, as large as Life, a Madman, endeavouring to ascend a Pile of Books, lettered, English Laws. Six Asses, bellowing his praise, and aiding him. In his left Hand Magna Charta, much torn and abused, which he swears to destroy as soon as he can gain the Summit. Behind the Six Asses is Britannia fainting: Time tries to comfort her by pointing to the Madman and the Pile of English Laws, signifying that the Madman will tumble before he can destroy the Scroll that is in his Hand; near Britannia is Liberty, much frightened and weak, endeavouring to take Leave of her: Time prevents her, by pointing with his left Hand to Judges and Civil Courts. On the Back Ground is a Ship bilged on Rocks; Casks, Bales, and other Emblems of Merchandize, floating down with the Tide of Destruction.

"The opposite Corner, is filled with a Group of meagre Bodies, called Louis's Outcast, grinning at the Scene, in like Manner as Milton describes Death's Grin in his Paradise Lost."

QUEBEC, June 6. In Justice to the Merit and distinguished Generosity of the Troops at Montreal, you are desired to publish the following Paragraph of a Letter transmitted to the Governor and Council, who cannot sufficiently applaud the Behaviour of the Officers and Soldiers upon the late melancholy and trying Occasion.

Montreal, May 29, 1765. "Yesterday, in the Forenoon, we wrote to Capt. Brown, That as, upon Enquiry, we found the Behaviour of the Soldiers had been so zealous for, and necessary to, the Safety of the Town, we thought it incumbent upon us to make them a Present, in order to replace the Necessaries they lost during the Time of the Fire, and begged that he would let-

de with the other Commanding Officers of the Corps, what Time would be most convenient to meet us, in order to consult about the intended Reward.

"In Consequence of our Letter to Capt. Brown, he, with Captains Hope and Johnson, waited upon us, and thanked us, in the Name of the Soldiers, for our Intentions; that, sensible they had done their Duty, and pleased with the Governor and Council's Approbation of their Conduct, they renounced any pecuniary Reward, as there were but too many necessitous Sufferers, who required the Assistance of Government; as to themselves, they had their Pay to support them." BOSTON, July 1.

Funerals without Mourning or the giving of English Gloves is become so fashionable, that there has been but one Burial for many Months past, and that a Negro, in the old fashion way. We are much indebted to those Patriots who first set this Example of Frugality, by which it is said this Town only has made a Saving the last Year of near 10,000l. Sterling. Other Towns and Provinces have copied the Example, and will experience its Utility. It is a Pleasure to behold what other Savings are made by laying aside a Multitude of superfluous Articles of British Manufactures and British Produce, as without these Sacrifices we should have nothing to pay by way of Stamp-Duty.—The British Merchants and Manufacturers have hitherto had all our Cash in pay for Articles, six-eighths of which are proper Luxury: And if they chuse to have it go by way of Revenue to Capts. of Guarda Costas, New Courts of Admiralty with Concurrent Powers, &c. &c. rather than to receive it in Pay for their Manufactures, in the Name of Wonder let them be pleased. Without going into one Branch of Manufactures ourselves, we may for one barter Part of the Amount of what goes annually for the Purchase of superfluous Articles be furnished with every Thing really necessary; and if in Consequence of this Retrenchment Two Millions of People in Britain are left without Employ, they will then have Leisure to inquire into the Conduct of those who have deprived us of the Means to procure Luxury, and the Propriety of Measures calculated to enlarge the Revenue at the Expence of Trade.

We hear from Dunstable, that about 14 Days since a Flash of Lightning struck 15 Sheep (lying down under a large Oak Tree, within a very small Distance from a House) dead upon the Spot, and the Tree not broke.

KILLINGLY, June 17.

On Monday last, the House of James Bruce of this Place, was struck with Lightning; which entered in at the Roof, near the Chimney, took off several Boards and a Rafter, which were split into small Splinters, and some of them carried ten or twelve Rods distant from the House; the Lightning then running down a Post, entered a Room where eight Persons were sitting, tearing up the Floor next the Chimney, splitting a Sleeper adjoining the Hearth, in so small Pieces, that none could be found exceeding three Feet in Length, and two Inches in Diameter, without hurting any Person, except a Woman, who received a small Wound on her Leg, by the Lightning, which soon turned of a purple Colour, swelled much, and was extreme painful. A Man was sitting in the Garret, separating Hemp from Tow that was intermixed; and the Tow was set on Fire, without his receiving any Harm. No Person in the House was sensible of hearing the Thunder, tho' they imagined they heard some uncommon Noise.—Two Hogs that lay near the House were killed.

NEWPORT, July 1.

Capt. John Thurston arrived here last Saturday, in 19 Days from the West-Indies. Before he sailed he received Information of a free Trade being opened at Martinico and Guadaloupe, for all Sorts of North-American Produce, Pork, Beef, Bread, and Flour, excepted.

NEW-YORK, July 4.

We are informed from Jamaica, that the Difference between the Governor and General Assembly of that Island, arose in the following Manner: The Carriage of one of the Members of the Assembly, which had brought him to the House, was arrested by the Marshal, for a Debt of 50l.—The House resent it, and imprisoned the Marshal. The Governor immediately prorogued the Assembly, whereby the Marshal was released of Course.

When the Assembly met again, their first Work was to imprison the Marshal, upon which the Governor dissolved the Assembly.—The same Members were all re-elected, and when they met, immediately imprisoned the Marshal, and the Governor again dissolved them.—Since which we have received no further Advices.

ANNAPOLIS, July 18.

Sunday-last Died here of the Small-Pox (at the House of her Brother Mr. Chief-Justice BAILEY) Mrs. ANNE DENTON, Widow, a Gentlewoman of a Pious and Exemplary Life and Conversation.

Thursday last arrived in Severn, the Capt. Spencer, from Bristol, with a Number of his Majesty's SEVEN-YEAR-PASSENGERS.

Yesterday arrived the Ship Dolphin, Capt. Robert Johnson, from Gibraltar, in Five Weeks.

And, The Brig Darlington, Capt. Henry M'Lauchlan, in Seven Weeks from London; but we have not yet heard any good News that he has brought.
