

England: All that the Agents contend for, is, that the same Protection of Property and domestic Security, which prevails in England, should be preserved in America. Let Mr. C. D. or his Master, first try the Effects of Quartering Soldiers on Butchers, Bakers, or other private Houses here, and then transport the Measure to America, parental Example may produce filial Obedience.— But—no S----- at S-----, or his Clerk, can ever conceive, that the People of America, or those in England, (whose Interest depend on a commercial Connection and strictest Amity with them) will tamely submit to Incroachments on so dear a Part of their Liberties, which they call on the Bill of Rights to defend. The People of England and America are the same; one King, and one Law; and those who endeavour to promote a Distinction are truly Enemies to both.

LONDON, May 16.

AN Act of Bankruptcy, for the Use of the American Colonies, is upon the Carpet. Yesterday a great Number of Journeymen Weavers, with a black Flag carried before them, accompanied by their Wives and Children, went up to St. James's, to represent to his Majesty their distressed Condition for Want of Work, occasioned by the Importation of French Silks and other foreign Goods. Their Majesties being gone for Richmond before they reached St. James's, most of them went to Richmond; where one of the Lords in waiting brought them Word from his Majesty, that he would do all in his Power for their Relief. Yesterday a Noble Peer, on his Return home from the House of Peers, was insulted by a Number of the Spitalfield Weavers.

May 17. Wednesday Afternoon a Mob attacked the Coach of a Noble Peer in Old Palace Yard, broke the Glasses to Pieces, and wounded him in the Face with a Stone.

Wednesday last a Mob of upwards of a Thousand Men and Women assembled in Bloomsbury Square, armed with Stones, &c. in order to destroy the Windows of a certain House in that Place, which they were happily prevented from doing, by the good Conduct of Saunders Welch, Esq; and Mr. Clay, High Constable of Holbourn Division, with the Peace Officers, who attended for that Purpose.

May 29. In such universal Esteem is the high Character of Mr. PITT, that nothing is more common at any of the Foreign Courts in Europe, when any English Gentlemen are there, than to enquire whether he be alive? And how he does? An Instance of this happened very lately at Rome, where some English Gentlemen were viewing the Palace of his Holiness, who happening to see them, and finding they were English Gentlemen on their Travels, instantly enquired after Mr. Pitt, in the above Words. How happy would it be for our amiable Sovereign, and these distracted Kingdoms, if he were once more at the Head of Affairs! but such is the Force of Intrigue, that the Preservation of a M----- is preferred to that of Mankind!

BOSTON, July 8.

The House of Representatives in their last Session, appointed the Hon. James Otis, Timothy Rugles, and Oliver Partridge, Esquires, a Committee to meet the Committees of the Assemblies of the WHOLE CONTINENT, if they see Cause, at New-York, the first of October, to unite in a Petition to his Majesty and the Parliament, for Relief under the Insupportable Grievance of the STAMP ACT, &c.—It is hoped neither the Governor of Virginia, or any other Governor on the Continent, will think this so improper a Step as to DISSOLVE their Assemblies to prevent it.—For we cannot think any of their Excellencies and Honours altogether unacquainted with the Act of Parliament made immediately after the GLORIOUS REVOLUTION, which declares, IT IS THE RIGHT OF THE SUBJECT TO PETITION THE KING, —and—PARLIAMENTS SIT FOR THE REDRESS OF GRIEVANCES.

The People of Canada are in an ill Temper, and groaning out their Grievances.—The Savages threatening the Southern Governments with a new War.—Trade burthened beyond all possible Bearings, bleeding, dying.—The whole of English America in the Depths of Despair, upon the Loss of Privileges, the most dear and invaluable; such as, a Right to levy Taxes by their own Representatives, Trials by Juries, and the secure and quiet Possession of ones own House: What aggravates our Misery is, that thro' some Fatality or great Corruption, the Colony Assemblies have not at this Time had the Privilege which even the French Parliaments are indulged with, viz. That of lay-

ing their Grievances before their Grand Monarque, and remonstrating against Measures supposed unequal or unconstitutional.—I glory in the Name of Briton, henceforward pronounced before Frenchmen, must only excite their Ridicule and Contempt.

NEWPORT, July 8.

We have a Report in Town, concerning an Insurrection of the Inhabitants of Mexico, something of which, under the South-Carolina Head, was inserted the Week before last. Our Account which is thought to be authentic, is, That an Edict some Time since arrived from the Court of Spain, with Orders, that every Inhabitant capable of bearing Arms, should be subject to be regularly exercised, and apparelled in one particular Uniform. This excited a Disaffection; and some Delinquents being prosecuted with Rigour, caused the whole Country to join in one general Revolt, and pursued it with such Vigour and Success, that the Viceroy was obliged to make a precipitate Flight, and to quit the Country.

Mexico is of so great Extent, as to form a powerful Empire. The Viceroy, who is sent from Spain, exercises as much Despotism as any Prince in Europe. It is divided into Old and New-Mexico, the former is about 2000 Miles in Length, and from 71 to 550 in Breadth.

NEW-YORK, July 11.

Extract of a Letter.

"We hear from Virginia, that the Stamp Act has filled the whole Colony with the utmost Consternation and Astonishment. The General Assembly which met in April, was the thinnest ever known—owing perhaps to the general Perplexity of People's Minds, and the Difficulty of determining how to act in so strange a Case.—Reduced to the Dilemma, of either counter-acting the Proceedings of their King, (whom they love and honour with the most affectionate Loyalty) and the British Parliament, (whom they esteem and reverence as the most respectable Assembly in the Universe, and whose Rights they desire to preserve, as much as their Own) or to give up their Relation to Both, by meanly parting with those Rights and Liberties which alone entitled them to the Name of Englishmen, and which is dearer than Life to every true and faithful Subject of his Majesty. What could they do in such a Situation! When the Assembly met, they seem'd quite at a Loss how to act in the Matter, but postponed taking it into Consideration till they had dispatch'd the necessary Business that was immediately before them, when many of the Members, I suppose, knowing what was to come on, and irresolute how to act—retired—so that there was but a very thin House, when their Rights and Liberties (affected by the Stamp Act) were taken into Consideration, and several spirited Resolutions thereupon, agreed to by the House.—I am inform'd, that the Governor hearing of these Resolves, came into the House and required a Sight of their Journal, which having seen, he immediately Dissolved the Assembly. It is said that at the next Election every Man that voted for these Resolves will be re-elected, and not a Man on the other Side; and that an Assurance of a strenuous Opposition to the Stamp Act, by all lawful Means, will be a Condition required of every Member to be chosen. I am inform'd that Associations are forming, to which several Thousands have subscribed, in that Government, in New-Hampshire, and Massachusetts, in Concert with the other American Governments, to draw up Remonstrances to his Majesty, &c. and to oppose this tremendous Act by all lawful Means.

ANNAPOLIS, July 25.

Last Monday Noon we had a Thunder Gust from the Westward; but about Two o'Clock, the Wind very suddenly changed to South-east, and for a few Minutes blew with great Violence, forcing in a good many Windows, blowing up and breaking to Pieces, Trees, Fences, &c. It pass'd in a narrow Vein, and in some Parts of the Town was scarcely felt.
