BOSTON, August 26.  
CAPTAIN DAVENPORT in a Ship from London, is hourly expected to arrive here. 'Tis said she has the STAMP PAPER on Board, for this and the other New-England Governments, which we hear exceeds Forty Tons.

Wednesday last a Ship arrived here from Leith, in North-Britain, in 9 Weeks Passage. At the Sight of this Ship, great Numbers of People were assembled on the Long Wharf, in Expectation of it's being DAVENPORT from London, with the Stamp'd Paper on board.

Since the Resignation of the Stamp Officer, a Question has been thrown out—How shall we carry on Trade without the Stamp'd Papers?—Carry on no Trade at all, say some, for who would desire to increase his Property, at the Expence of LIBERTY.—Others say, That in Case there shall be no Officer to distribute the Stamp'd Papers after the first of November, a regular Protest will justify any of his Majesty's Subjects, in any Court of Justice, who shall carry on Business without them.

Some very judicious Persons are of Opinion, that the Wisdom of the British Parliament will never order any Measures to enforce an Act, utterly irreconcilable to the Friends, not of a Part only, as was the Case of the Cyder Act in England, but the whole People of America.

To attempt the Enforcement of an Act on the Colonies by Military Strength, would tend to destroy their Usefulness to the Mother Country.—Commercial Intercourse must in a great Measure, if not totally, cease.—And besides, a Colony of Soldiers is in Effect no Colony at all.

Should the Colonies cease to take off the Manufactures of Great-Britain, as they will be under a Necessity of doing very soon, unless the alters her Measures, Thousands of her useful Labourers and their Families must starve—so great a Dependence has the Mother upon her Children.

By a Gentleman who came to Town last Friday from Connecticut, we are informed, That the STAMP MAN for that Colony had appointed his Deputies, one of which, living at Windham, received a Letter from him, desiring him to come to New-Haven, and receive a Commission for that important Trust; but the good People of that Town soon had Knowledge of the Letter, surrounded his House, and demanded it of him, and then advised him not to have any Thing to do with that Office, lest it should cost him dear; upon which he thought prudent to write his Master by the same Post, that he might receive the Commission for another Person, for he would have nothing to do with it.

NEWPORT, August 26.

We hear from New-London, that about Four o'Clock last Thursday Afternoon, was exhibited, in the most public Part of the Town, the Effigies of a Distributor of Stamps, with a Boot on one of the Shoulders, and the Devil represented as looking out of the same. They were suspended in the Air, on a Gibbet, between 20 and 30 Feet from the Ground; and after being exposed about an Hour, were taken down, and carried through the Town, attended by the principal Part of the Inhabitants. The Cannon of the Fort were repeatedly discharged during the Time of Exhibition. Between Ten and Eleven the Effigies were consumed, amidst the Acclamations of the People. 'Tis said the most perfect Decorum was observed in all their Behaviour; and no Person suffered the least Injury.

MISCELLANEOUS ARTICLES.

We are credibly informed that Augustus Johnston, Esq; Distributor of Stamps for this Colony, hath openly declared that he will not attempt to execute his Office against the Will of our Sovereign Lord the People (to use his own Words.) This Gentleman has discovered a Zeal equal with any other American, against the Impositions from Britain, and was not even privy to his Appointment of Stamp-Master. His former Conduct, joined to the aforesaid Declaration, are quite sufficient to wipe away any evil Impressions, which may have been conceived against him on Account of his Place.

When the late great Stir happened in Boston, a certain Hon. Gentleman threatened the Populace that he would raise the Militia upon them, when some of them facetiously answered, that they were already raised.

NEW-YORK, September 2.

We congratulate our Countrymen upon the late Resignations of the Stamp-Officers—and especially the Friends and Well-wishers of the Gentleman appointed to that Office in this City. The Number of his Friends and Well-wishers, which was considerable before, is greatly increased by this Resignation; which has entirely cleared his Character from the Imputation of joining in the Design, to Enslave his Country; for we are well assured, as his Appointment was without his Solicitation or Knowledge, so his Resignation was voluntary, and not the Effect of any Menace or Disturbance, nothing of which has yet appeared in this Place.

We are informed by a Gentleman from New-Haven, that the House of the Stamp Officer there was last Week surrounded by a Multitude, who desired to know whether he intended to act in that Office or Resign. His Answer was, that having accepted the Office in Person, he did not think he had Power to Resign.—They next demanded whether he would promise to deliver the Stamp Materials, as soon as they arrived, to them, in order to make a Bonfire—or to have his House pulled down.

He endeavoured to evade the Answer, desiring them to wait till the Meeting of the Assembly, and several other Pretences,—but none of them availing, he promised that when they arrived, he would either re-ship them to be sent back, or that when they were in his House, his Doors should be open, and they would then act as they thought proper, on which they dispersed.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 5.

We are informed that WILLIAM COXE, Esq; has sent a Resignation of the Stamp-Office for New-Jersey, to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and assigned his Reasons.

ANNAPOLIS, September 12.

This Day, his Excellency in Council was pleased to issue his Proclamation, summoning the General Assembly of this Province (which stood prorogued to the 7<sup>th</sup> of October) to meet here on Monday the 23<sup>d</sup>. of this Month. [The Crown being now entirely clear of the Small Pox.]

By a Letter from Virginia, we are informed, and requested to Publish, That on Monday last Week, at the Town of *Dumfries*, the Effigies of a Native of that Colony, lately arrived there from England, with the honourable Commission of STAMP DISTRIBUTOR, was exposed thro' the Streets of the Town, accompanied by Hundreds of all Ranks: It was on Horseback, with it's Face towards the Horse's Tail, and a *HALTER*: And receiv'd the Insults of the Congregation, by Caneing, Whipping, (the Mosaic Law) Pillorying, Cropping, Hanging and Burning, &c. &c.

At the same Place happen'd a very Tragical Affair, on the Wednesday Morning after: A Challenge having been sent by a young Gentleman to Col. *John Baylis*, was accepted, and the Parties met; when the Second to the Challenger took up the Cause, and engaged Mr. *Baylis*, with Pistols: The first Fire hit Col. *Baylis* in the Thigh and Groin, which prov'd Mortal, and about 5 Hours after he Expired: Both the Combatants were Gentlemen of Character, and had Families, who by this rash Encounter must be made unhappy, in which their numerous Friends participat.
