P R E S E N T.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day his Grace William Henry, Duke of Portland, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, his Grace Augustus Henry, Duke of Grafton, and the most Honourable Charles Marquis of Rockingham, the Right Honourable Henry Seymour Conway, Esq; and the Right Hon. William Dowdeswell, Esq; Chancellor and Under Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace Aug. Henry Duke of Grafton, and the Right Honourable Henry Seymour Conway, Esq; to be His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, they were this Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Daniel, Earl of Winchelsea and Nottingham, Lord President of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable Richard Earl of Scarborough, John Earl of Ashburnham, William Earl of Bessborough, and George Bussy Villiers, commonly called Lord Villiers, Vice Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

Whitehall, July 13. The King has been pleased to appoint Charles Marquis of Rockingham, Knight of the most noble Order of the Garter, the Right Hon. William Dowdeswell, Esq; the Hon. John Cavendish, commonly called Lord John Cavendish, Thomas Townshend, and George Onslow, Esqrs. to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Hon. William Dowdeswell, Esq; the Offices of Chancellor and Under Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

L O N D O N, July 11.

We hear another Attempt will soon be made to find out the North-west Passage, under the Direction of an Admiral well known for his Skill in Navigation.

Yesterday Mr. Williams, Bookseller in Fleet-Street, whose Six Months Confinement in the King's Bench Prison, for republishing N^o 45 of the North Briton, is expired, was brought to the Court of King's Bench, Guildhall, and discharged, on his giving Security for his good Behaviour for 7 Years, by two Sureties, bound in 500 l. each.

Yesterday was tried at Guildhall, before Lord Mansfield, a Cause, wherein Messrs. Carr, Ibbetson, and Comp. Mercers on Ludgate-Hill, were Plaintiffs, against several Revenue Officers, Defendants, for entering and searching the House of the Plaintiffs, under Pretence of their having a large Quantity of prohibited Goods in their Possession: When it appearing that the Officers had not the least Foundation for such Search, the Jury, which consisted of Merchants, found a Verdict against the Officers for 100 l. Damages, with Costs of Suit.

Yesterday the grand Match at Newmarket, between Lord Bolingbroke's Gimcrack, and Sir James Lowther's Ascham, was won by the former. The Betts which depended on the Match, were said to have exceeded 100,000 l.

July 13. His Majesty has appointed the Earl of Scarborough to be Cofferer of the Household, in the Room of the Earl of Thomond.

The Earl of Ashburnham to be Keeper of the Great Wardrobe, in the Room of Lord Le Despencer.

The Earl of Bessborough and Lord Grantham to be Post-Masters General in the Room of Lord Hyde and Lord Trevor.

And they have appointed Henry Potts, Esq; Secretary, and Samuel Potts, Esq; Comptroller of the Post-Office.

On Wednesday the Right Hon. Mr. Pitt set out from his Seat at Hayes, on a Visit to Earl Temple at Stowe. The Firmness and unalterable Union of these two illustrious Patriots, shews, stronger than any Words can, the Rectitude of each other's Conduct; while their known Integrity, Abilities, and Love for their Country, make every honest Man sincerely wish they were restored to their proper Places in the Administration; which, however, cannot be accomplished, until secret Influence is totally removed; an Happiness that is not only most ardently looked for, but hoped to be not far distant.

On Thursday the 4th Instant, was tried at Guildhall, before Lord Mansfield, an Action upon a Policy of Insurance, against an Underwriter on Goods shipped in a general Ship at Montserrat, for London; when, it appearing that the Ship was not Sea-worthy to undertake the Voyage, the Cause was determined in Favour of the Insurer. By this Determination it appears, that when a Ship is insufficient to proceed upon the insured Voyage, all Policies of Insurance (whether on the Ship or Goods) are discharged; and that Shippers of Goods must resort to the Owners of Ships for a Satisfaction for the Injury they sustain by Losses occasioned from the Insufficiency of Ships.

When Mr. Williams entered Guildhall, on Wednesday, he had a Roll of Paper under his Arm, and being asked what it contained, he informed the Enquirer it was one of his Sureties, and immediately produced a Print of Mr. Wilkes, with the Cap of Liberty by his Side.

It is now hoped, that Vigour and Unanimity will once more reforme their Seats in our Councils.

July 16. Yesterday, and not before, Lord John Cavendish, George Onslow, and Thomas Townshend, Esqrs. kissed his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Commissioners of the Treasury.

Yesterday Lord Villiers kissed his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Vice-Chamberlain of the Household.

The following Resignations have been made, and Alterations taken Place, since our last.

On Sunday the Duke of Marlborough resigned the Office of Privy Seal; Earl Powis that of Treasurer; and Lord Charles Spencer that of Comptroller of the King's Household.

Yesterday there was a Council at St. James's, when the Duke of Newcastle was sworn in Lord Privy Seal, in the Room of the Duke of Marlborough; and took his Place, and received the Seal accordingly.

Yesterday his Majesty was pleased to create the Right Hon. Sir Charles Pratt, Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, a Peer of Great-Britain, by the Title of Baron Camden, of Chislehurst in Kent.

We are informed, a Scheme is on Foot for each of the North-American Colonies to furnish their own armed Ships in the Nature of Guard-de-coftas; as is intended to be done by the Province of New-England; and for which they will be allowed an adequate Sum; his Majesty's Ships of War are to be recalled, in order to lessen this Expence of Government.

The Freeman of the Town of Newport, at a Meeting held on the third Instant, UNANIMOUSLY VOTED, That the following Instructions should be given to the Gentlemen who represent them in the General Assembly, viz:

To the Deputies of the Town of Newport, GENTLEMEN,

THE Confidence we have in your Integrity and Ability, hath induced us repeatedly

to make Choice of you to represent us in the General Assembly; and it is with Pleasure we reflect, that your Conduct hath justly merited our Approbation.

The Trust reposed in you, at all Times requires your Attention to the public Interest: But at this critical Conjunction, when the Liberties of his Majesty's Subjects in America are in the greatest Danger of being subverted, the utmost Wisdom, and the most unshaken Fortitude, are necessary, to extricate us from our perplexed and embarrassed Situation.

With Hearts filled with Loyalty and Affection to his Majesty, and inviolably attached to Great-Britain, the Inhabitants of this Colony cheerfully complied with every Requisition made by the Crown during the late long and bloody War; and exerted themselves in it with a Spirit far exceeding their Ability. They were happy in receiving the Approbation of his Majesty and the Parliament; and with great Reason flattered themselves, that the same Favours and Indulgence, which had been always shewn them by their Mother Country, would have been continued to them: That their ruined Commerce would revive: That, being freed from the heavy Expences of the War, they should find Means in Time to discharge the enormous Debt accumulated by it: And that, together with the Blessings of Peace, they should enjoy inviolate the inestimable Liberties and Privileges which they received from their Ancestors, and wished to transmit to their latest Posterity.

Instead of these parental Favours, by some of the late Acts of the British Parliament, the Channels of our Commerce are obstructed,—our Property subjected to the arbitrary Decisions of the Courts of Admiralty,—and an internal Tax levied upon us without our Consent.

Trials by Juries, and the being Taxed by none but their own Representatives, are the inherent Rights of the Inhabitants of this Colony: They have been confirmed by a ROYAL CHARTER: They were never contested, but have always been recognized by the KING and PARLIAMENT of Great-Britain.

Who then can see those glorious Bulwarks of Liberty, TRIALS BY JURIES, AND THE RIGHTS OF TAXATION, shocked to their Foundations, and not feel for his Country? Who is there that can feel, and suppress his Concern?

The Inhabitants of the other Colonies, affected with their present Distresses, and animated with the noble Spirit of Liberty, have proposed a Meeting of Commissioners from all the Colonies, to be held at New-York, to consult upon, and join in such Measures as shall be thought necessary for the Removal of these Grievances.

Inspired with the same Sentiments, we expect that you will give your utmost Attention to those important Objects, the Courts of Admiralty, and the Act for Levying Stamp Duties: That while you express the greatest Affection and Loyalty to our Sovereign, and all proper Regard to that august Assembly, the British Parliament, you assert our Rights with a becoming Firmness.

That you will use your utmost Endeavours, that the General Assembly of this Colony appoint Commissioners, to meet those who are or shall be appointed by the other Colonies, upon this most interesting Occasion; and, in general, to join and co-operate with them in every reasonable and probable Measure for the Preservation of our Liberties.

It is for LIBERTY!—That LIBERTY, for which our Fathers bled!—That LIBERTY, which is dearer to a generous Mind than Life itself, that we now contend!—The Cause is vast and important; and if the Efforts of his Majesty's loyal Subjects in North-America be but equal to its Importance, we have the highest Reason to think, that, notwithstanding the Disregard shewn to the separate Remonstrances of the Colonies, their united Endeavours will be crowned with Success.
