That Letters by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the faid Dominious, carried by fuch Packers as before mentioned, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or destroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deferting the same before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other Person to ride on the Horse or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Roas; or not, in all possible Cases, conveying the Mail according to his Agreement, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Pesce, be sent to the House of Correction for any time not exceeding One Month, nor less than Fourteen Days.
