LONDON, August 8.

A GENTLEMAN of Distinction, at the West End of the Town, remarkable for his great Strength and Athletic Constitution, has laid a Wager of 1000 Guineas that he throws a Stone 50 Pounds Weight 50 Yards. Great Bets are depending on the Decision.

On Thursday one Carr, a Waterman, laid a Wager that he and his Dog would jump from the Centre Arch of Westminster Bridge, and be both at Lambeth within a Minute of each other. The Dog seeing his Master go off, jumped immediately after him into the River, seized him by the Nape of the Neck, and would not let go his Hold until he had by force landed him at the Bridge Foot on the Surry Side, to the great Diversion of the Spectators. A Gentleman present offered 5 Guineas for the Dog, which were refused.

NEW-YORK, October 17.

We hear that a Design of establishing in this City a Market, to commence on Wednesday the 23^d Instant, for all Kinds of Home Manufactures, meets with universal Approbation; as many were at a Loss to know how to come at what they

wanted in these Articles; and it is expected that it will be equally convenient for those who have such Goods on Hand, and that quick Sale, and ready Money, will induce them and many others to increase their Diligence, and bring their Goods to Market.

On Tuesday last arrived the Sloop William, Captain Rivers, in 36 Days from Pensacola; by whom we learn, that ten Sail of Transports, with Troops (to relieve those on that Station, who are going Home) were arrived there, and that there has been a great Mortality amongst them, ten of twelve dying of a Day, amongst which was that gallant and worthy Officer, Brigadier General BOUQUET, whose eminent Services, and amiable Character, demand the Tears of his Country and Acquaintance:—He arrived the 23^d of August, and died the 2^d Day of September. Out of six Officers Ladies, who accompanied them, five were dead, and the other very ill, and not likely to recover. The Place, we are told, is barren and uncomfortable, and as no Trade has been permitted with the Spaniards, 400,000 Dollars having been turned away, the Design and Use of it is not very discernible, unless it be for a Burying Ground.

PHILADELPHIA, October 24.

Extra^d of a Letter from Bristol, August 15.

"The present Situation of the Colonies alarms every Person who has any Connection with them; and if our new Ministry do not repeal the Act made by the old One, we shall all be ruined.—The Avenues of Trade are all shut up.—We have no Remittances, and are at our Wits End for Want of Money to fulfil our Engagements with our Tradefmen.—How this will end, Time only can evince; however we dread the Consequences."

We hear from Antigua, that a Ship from London, bound for Jamaica, but put in to unload some Goods for the Merchants of Antigua, had brought over three Persons, said to be the Distributors of Stamps for the Island of Jamaica, &c. who were in so great a Hurry to get to the Spot, where, with Impunity, they might rob and tear from the Inhabitants of those Isles their Money and Liberties, that they offered any Price for a Vessel to go down immediately to Jamaica.

We hear from New-Jersey, that one Family in that Province, had manufactured and wore as much Cloth, &c. as would, by a moderate Computation, have cost 50 l. had they purchased it. A noble Example, worthy the Imitation of at least every One who lives in the Country. If one Family can save the Country 50 l. in a Year, how much would 20,000 in each Province save?

We have the Pleasure of informing our Readers, that the important Business of the GENERAL CONGRESS at New-York is in great Forwardness, and, it is thought, will be finished this Week; in the transacting of which, we are assured, there has been the most perfect Harmony and Unanimity.

In the New-York Mercury there is the following Character of the late brave General BOUQUET.

"This Gentleman served his Majesty all the last War with great Distinction. He was promoted from conscious Merit, not only unenvied, but even with the Approbation and good Wishes of all who knew him; his superior Judgment and Knowledge of Military Matters; his experienced Abilities, known Humanity, remarkable Politeness, and constant Attention to the CIVIL RIGHTS of his Majesty's Subjects, rendered him an Honour to his Country, and a Loss to Mankind."

ANNAPOLIS, October 31.

This Day the General Assembly of this Province is to meet here; the Hon^{ble} Speaker, and a Number of the Gentlemen of Both Houses, being already in Town.

On Sunday last, being a very windy Day, a Schooner loaded with a light Cargo, by carrying too much Sail was overfet near the Mouth of Patuxet, and one Man Drowned. She afterwards drove ashore at the lower End of Kent-Island.

Friday last Died in Dorchester County, the Rev^d. Mr. Thomas Airy, Rector of a Parish there.

Yesterday arrived here the Brig Free-Mason, Capt. M^r Kirby, in Seven Weeks from Cadiz: She spoke the Brig Sally, Captain Richard Thompson, from New-York for Madeira, in Lat. 32° 25'. Out 43 Days. All well.
