Several Merchants in this Town will be great Sufferers by the Loss of Capt. Gwin's Ship, as they had large Interests on board, without Insurance.

WE, Freemen and Freeholders of the City of New-York, assembled at the Coffee-House, the 23^d Day of June 1766, impressed with the deepest Sense of Gratitude to all the Friends of Liberty in America who exerted themselves in promoting the Repeal of the STAMP-ACT, think it our indispensable Duty to endeavour, by erecting a proper Monument, to perpetuate the Memory of so glorious an Event to the latest Posterity.

MANY were our Friends on this truly important Occasion, and we render them, from the Bottom of our Hearts, the Thanks justly due to their very eminent Services.—They are too numerous to admit of having that particular Respect paid to each, which they deserve, and we are so ready to bestow.—But, in Honour to them all, we propose to single out one of the many, who stood out in the Support of American Freedom; without whose timely Interposition, the utmost Efforts of all our other worthy Advocates, might probably have proved fruitless and ineffectual.

We therefore earnestly entreat of, and strenuously recommend to you, Gentlemen of our Representatives, that you will move in the House of Assembly now sitting, for a Vote of the Honourable House, to make Provision for an elegant Statue of Brass, of the Right Hon^{ble} WILLIAM PITT, Esq; whom we regard in the Sacred Light of having a second Time been the Preserver of his Country.

SUCH a high Sense have we of the Integrity and Ability of that great Patriot, that we would not have applied to the Honourable House in this Manner, did we not think the Honour greater, if conferred by the Representatives of the People, than in any other Way.

For the same Reason, we also desire that you will transmit the Thanks of the House to all those illustrious Personages, both in and out of Parliament, who appeared in Favour of the Colonies.

Gentlemen,
A GREAT Number of your Constituents having thought proper to appoint us a Committee, to wait on you, with these their Instructions; they have no Doubt but that you will cheerfully use your best Endeavours to effect that, which not only they, but, (as they conceive) the Inhabitants of the Colony in general, most ardently wish to see accomplished.

The General Assembly of this Province, now sitting, have come to the following Resolutions, viz. That Provision be made for furnishing the Barracks in the Cities of New-York and Albany, with Beds and Bedding, Fire-Wood, and Candles, and Utensils for dressing Victuals, for Two Battalions, not exceeding 500 Men each, and One Company of Artillery, for One Year. That an Equestrian Statue of his present Majesty, be erected in the City of New-York, to perpetuate to the latest Posterity, the deep Sense this Colony has of the eminent and singular Blessings received from HIM during his most auspicious Reign. That for the many eminent and essential Services done the Northern Colonies by the Right Honourable WILLIAM PITT, Esq; but in particular in promoting the Repeal of the Stamp-ACT, and to perpetuate to the latest Posterity the grateful Sense this Colony entertains on that Account; Provision might be made for erecting an elegant Statue of

him in Brass. They have also ordered, That a Piece of Plate, value £.100 Sterling, be presented John Sargent, Esq; of the City of London, with the Thanks of the House, for his having cheerfully undertaken, at their Request, and to their great Satisfaction faithfully discharged, the Trust of special Agent, and liberally declined any Allowance for his Trouble.

Some Time since Three Vessels belonging to Bermuda, were taken by the Spaniards at Salter-tuda, in making Salt, and carried to Lagaira, where the Masters were sent to the Common Goal. As soon as the above Account reached Bermuda, Mr. John Jennings of that Island, immediately set out for Antigua, and made his Complaint to the General and Admiral, when the latter directly dispatched the Ship Beaver, Capt. Duane, to Lagaira, to the Spanish Governor, to know his Reasons for permitting his Catholic Majesty's Subjects to treat Englishmen as Pirates; but not meeting with him there, Capt. Duane, and Mr. Jennings, proceeded to the Caracas, where, upon setting the Matter in a proper Light to the General, he treated them very genteely, and ordered the Vessels to be restored, and the Owners to be paid Damages; but as Capt. Duane and the Spaniards, could not agree upon the last Article, he brought off the Vessels, and left the Damages to be settled by the Courts of Great-Britain and Spain.

ANNAPOLIS, July 10.

Thursday last, and in the Night, we had a very heavy Rain, which has done considerable Damage in different Parts of the Country, by carrying away Mill-Dams, beating down the Wheat, &c.

Since our last arrived here from Charles-Town, South-Carolina, the Schooner Nancy, Capt. Jonathan Porter, who was only Three Days on his Passage from the Bar to our Capes.

On Saturday last Dr. RICHARD TOOTELL and Mr. LLOYD DULANY, were chosen of the Common-Council of this City, in the Room of Messrs. MACCUBBIN and HYDE, who Resign'd.
