QUEBEC, July 3.

Saturday the 28th ult. at 11 o'Clock in the Forenoon, his Excellency the Honourable Major-General JAMES MURRAY, Esq; Governor of this Province, embarked on board the ship Little William, Capt. John Grant, for England: He was attended at the Beach by public Officers, several of the Religious Orders, Merchants and other Inhabitants. He was attended in Barges to the Ship by Col. Jones, who commands the 52<sup>d</sup> Regiment and Garrison, Capt. Morris commanding the Detachment of the 27th Regiment in Garrison here, and the Officers of their Corps, by Col. Robertson, Barrack-master General of North-America, Mr. O'Brien, Lady Susan O'Brien, and other Ladies (under a Salute from the Cannon of the Grand Battery) who also attended his Excellency down the River, to near the Parish of St. Laurent, upon the Island of Orleans, where they took Leave, and left the Ship, and his Excellency proceeded on his Voyage, the Wind fair, and the Day fine. His Excellency has to accompany him on his Voyage, Francis Mackay, Esq; and his Lady, Lieutenant Rose, of the 32d Regiment, Lieutenant Abbot, of the Royal Artillery, and Mr. Fotheringham.

The same Day, at 11 o'Clock at Night, arrived in this City from London, on board the Commerce, Captain Johnson, Mr. Briand, Bishop of Quebec, for the Roman Catholics, who manifested on this Occasion all their Affection for what concerns their Religion. On the Day following, at 5 o'Clock in the Morning, the Bells of all their Churches announced his Arrival to the whole City, which gave such general Satisfaction to the Canadians, that many of them were seen to shed Tears thro' Joy. It was really affecting to see them congratulate each other, wherever they met, and to hear them incessantly say to one another, It is true that we have a Bishop; GOD hasb taken Pity of us: And to see them afterwards run in Crowds to the Parish Church to see this Bishop, whom they look upon as the Support of their Religion, and as a Pledge of the King's paternal Goodness to them. In Fact, at the same Time that they publicly bless the Lord for having given them a Bishop, they loudly proclaim their Gratitude to his Majesty for having attended to their Request: It is likely that this Favour conferred on the Canadians by the King, will effectually attach them to the British Government. It is also very pleasing to them, to have received on this Occasion the Congratulations of several Persons of Note of our Nation, who indeed seemed to partake of their Joy. And we doubt not but that the Canadians, who appear to be very susceptible of Gratitude, will by those Means become more firmly united to us.

BOSTON, July 21.

A Mineral Spring has lately been discovered at Stafford in Connecticut, which issues out from the Root of a Maple Tree, at the Bottom of a Mountain, on the Margin of the Rivulet Whitemantick; the Water of which is very Clear and exceeding Cold; some say it Tastes like Ink, others like

Epsom Salt, but most think it Tastes like Rust of Iron. It operates mostly by Urine, and generally upon the first Drinking makes Persons feel somewhat Sick, and some few it Vomits. Was this Spring under proper Regulations, and attended with some skilful Physician to give Directions about using the Water, 'tis thought it would be a public Blessing; but in its present Situation, where it helps one, it is said two are hurt by it, owing to an abuse of the Water, which is most imprudently used by great Numbers, who flock there by Hundreds in a Day, with all Disorders; and some are injudicious enough to drink two Gallons a Day, and when they bathe, to stay a long Time in the Water, which is prejudicial. In Hectical and Consumptive Cases this Water is very hurtful; but in Rheumatic Cases, and contracted Limbs it has done some great Cures, of which the following Instance may be depended upon.—Thomas Simmons, Mariner, aged 34, had a fever settled in his Right Arm, which contracted his fingers so that he could not separate them; his Hand was stiff as a Bone, and so useless that he could not move a Straw or take up a Feather; he could feel no Pulse, and his Arm perished up to his Elbow: In this Condition he continued 17 Months, being pronounced incurable by some of the most eminent Physicians in New-York, Connecticut and Boston; but drinking about Three Pints of this Water a Day, and frequently bathing his Arm in it, warmed; his Pulse returned, his Fingers became flexible, and he so far recovered the Use and Strength of his Hand, that on the Ninth Day of his using the Water, he carried with his lame Hand a Skillet of Five Pound Weight 60 Rods; and on the Tenth Day he wrote his Name in a fair good Hand.
