A Continuation of the Account of the Hurricane which happen'd at M... of August past, which was

IN the highest Period of its fury, issuing from the East, which immediately dispersed thirty-five Brigantines, Sloops, Pettaiguers, of which Twenty and Seven English, besides Two perished in our Road. To all we must add, the most despicable Country. On all the Plantations, hardly remains a Building, under whose Ruins proprietors have been buried; C... Plantations and Magnoc, were destroyed; the Number of in this Parish, is not yet known, the Number taken out of the Shore, and missing, we estimate and double the Number would be.

Our Intendant was at Caz... the Hurricane, and ran thro... by its Violence; he came her... Soul was overwhelmed with G... on Account of this public Calamity, all his Care and Attention, good Order, so necessary in such a Crisis.

This is a precise Account of St. Pierre, and proceeding from other Parishes still more unfortunate, of the Carbet, and elsewhere had the same Fate with our Buildings, Provisions, nor the Royal, of which most of the ruined by the dreadful Fire has not escaped this last Calamity of most Part of the Houses and several tumbled down; Citadel were uncovered, and Barracks, 120 Feet long, and moved from its original Situation though the Building held itself, anchored in the Bay driven on Shore, and destroyed Schooners and Sloops were Fond Belmard, at the Savan... which cannot be got off; tore to Pieces on the Wh... chored in the Basin, are Fifteen of which, whose aground on the Quays of Entrance of the Port; but be got off. The Inhabitants totally ruined; the Number amounts to 40, and as many Lamentin, in general, has at least they have yet some Trees, and a few Pieces of no Provisions.
