

believe her to be the same Person, she having generally appeared before in an old Man's Coat, Woollen Cap, blue Apron, &c. Her Behaviour now, is that of an affable well bred Woman, and agreeable in Conversation. She supported the Character she had assumed with Reputation, as a fair Dealer, and had served every Office in the Parish, except that of Church-warden, which she was to have been next Year, had not the Discovery been made.

July 24. On Saturday Night last Four Indian Chiefs, Three Indian Women, and Two Interpreters, arrived in Town. It is said their Business here is to complain against some Dutch Settlers near Albany for encroaching on their Lands, and driving them from their Plantations; which Encroachments are represented to contain 400 Square Miles, or thereabouts.

Orders are given for the Indian Chiefs and Women, just arrived in Town from America, to be supported at the Government's Expence, during their Stay here.

July 26. Letters from Genoa say, "Several Particulars have been handed about here for some Time past, as so many Marks of a strong Animosity, which it is pretended subsists between the Chief of the Corsican Rebels and the Count de Marbeuf, of which there is not even a Shadow of possibility. It is certain that in the Treaty concluded between the Court of France and the Senate, his most Christian Majesty only engages to Guard with his Forces the Genoese Places in that Isle, to employ his Mediation for bringing about an Accommodation between the Republic and the Corsicans, and lastly to grant them his Guaranty."

July 29. The Post-Masters General have appointed Peter De Lancey, junr. Esq; Deputy Post-Master-General of the Carolinas, Floridas, Georgia, and the Bahama Islands, with their Dependencies.

Some private Letters from Turin mention, that a Negotiation was on Foot for ceding the Isle of Corsica to his Sardinian Majesty; but whether by the Islanders themselves or Genesè, was not mentioned.

They write from Leghorn, that the French still continue to strip the Forests in Corsica of their most valuable Oak Timber, which is exported in great Quantities to Brest and Toulon; nor can the Corsicans prevent it, as the Auxiliary Troops are in Possession of that Part of the Island where Ship Timber grows in the greatest Perfection.

August 2. It is said that Patents are preparing to be made out, for Five British and Nine Irish Peerages.

It is said, with some Confidence, that the Presents and Emoluments given by the Mogul to the East-India Company, will be claimed by the Parliament as national Property.

Some Accounts from Paris insinuate, that Propositions had actually been made to the General of the Corsicans from that Island, to become a Province to France.

August 9. The King of Prussia, according to private Letters from the Continent, is absolutely deprived of his Reason. The Fit of Insanity seized him One Day as he was Walking with his Brother Prince Henry at Potsdam; he caught a Firelock from one of his Guards, and presented it at the Prince, but happily was prevented from discharging it; since which he has been confined under the Care of several Physicians. It is added, that if he does not shortly Recover, the Prince Royal will take upon himself the Government of the Kingdom.

CHARLES-TOWN, (S. CAROLINA,) Aug. 25.

By a Letter from Augusta we are informed, That on the 29th past, in the Afternoon, Three inhuman Villains went to the House of John Scott, Esq; (commonly called Ready Money Scott) a Magistrate who lives above Stephen's Creek, upon Savannah River, and Robbed him of all his Gold, Silver and Paper Money, to the Amount of above £.1450, treating him and his Wife in a most barbarous Manner. The Account we have, says, When they first came to his House, they demanded his Money, upon which he offered them some Half-pence; but they refused to take them, saying they had not come 500 Miles for his Coppers; after which they seized him and his Wife: The helpless old Woman's Head they covered with an empty Bee-Hive, tied her up in a Blanket, ran a Brand's End of Fire into her Face, filled her Eyes with Ashes, and then threw her into the Chimney Corner: Mr. Scott not being very ready to give up what they sought, they held him to the Fire till his Eyes were ready to Start out of his Head, burnt his Toes almost off, heated Irons, and branded and burnt him in a shocking Manner,

and then made him Swear Three Times on the Bible, that he had no more Money. — None of the Perpetrators of this horrid Barbarity are yet discovered.
