LETTERS from Algiers, advise, that in the greatest Consequence of the Apprehension of a Conspiracy against the Government, on which Account many wealthy People had retired, their Apprehensions were found to be a false Conspiration against the Government, which was to have been carried on the 1st Instant, but was discovered before. Ten of the principal Persons were taken, Six of whom were strangled, and the Dey has ordered the remaining Four, upon their Discovery, to be put to death. These Earthquakes have happened in the Month of Algiers, Two Months before.

Ferrara, August 20. On the 19th there arrived at Venice Five Gallies from Alexandria and Cyprus, loaded above a Million of Ducats in Money, a considerable Quantity of Gold, which is so scarce in the Kingdom of Sicily, that the Signior has prohibited the exportation of his Estates. It is said that all the Vessels of whatever Nation, found in the Ports of his Dominions, are to transport Troops into Sicily.

Constantinople, July 4. The Emperor has been more than in any other Part of the World.

They write from Salonica that Yaffini had passed near that City, with 15,000 Men, on his March, and he was to embark for Georgia, to bring back small Bodies of Albanians to the same Destination.

Civita Vecchia, July 14. Several Persons, residing in Foreign Countries, have petitioned their Court to passers which the Genoaese have refused, which the Genoaese have refused to do. Port-Mahon and Gibraltar of those Places are forbid to be put into neutral Powers.
