*Extract of a Letter, Sept. 17.*  
“In my last I informed you that the Nation, in general, seemed greatly displeas’d with Mr. PITT, now Earl of Chatham) for accepting a Peerage, and I am sorry now to add, that Lord T—l was amongst the most virulent of his Enemies, in traducing and villifying his Character.—But now the People discover the Deception, and at the next Election we shall see another Instance of true Patriotism, and the East-India Company are not without their Fears, they shall feel the Effects.”

*Salsbury, Sept. 22.* The Inhabitants of the Town of Devizes, commiserating the Distresses of the Poor through the high Price of Provisions, have purchased Wheat, and sold it to them at 5s. per Bushel.

*Gloucester, Sept. 22.* Several Farmers upon the Hills, touched with the Distresses of the Poor, have come to a Resolution of selling their Wheat at 5s. per Bushel; and considerable Quantities have been sold to the Bakers in their Neighbourhood at that Price.

**QUEBEC, October 27.**  
On Tuesday last the Reverend Mr. Veyssiere, who a few Days since left the Order of the Recollets (amongst whom he was known by the Name of Father Emmanuel) and declared himself a Protestant, took the usual Oaths of Allegiance to the King, Abjuration of the Power and Supremacy of the Pope, and Abjuration of the Pretender, and subscribed the Declaration against Popery. He appears to have taken this happy Determination from the laudable Motive of Conscience only, after a long and careful Consideration of the Points in Controversy, between the Roman and Protestant Professions, and to have stood in reputable Esteem amongst those of the former, as well as the few of the latter he has been known to. The Reverend Father Emmanuel Crespel, the present worthy Commissary of the Order in this Province, was so just as to say of him, after he had declared his Intention: *That he was a Man of every good Behaviour, and exact in all his Duties.* A Testimony which does equal Honour to the Candour of the Father Commissary, and the Character of Mr. Veyssiere.

Friday last arrived here, the Crew of the Sloop Sea-flower, Stephen Emeroy, Master, from New-York for this Port. On the 15th current, about 7 o’Clock in the Morning, in a Snow Storm, she ran upon the Rocks to the Eastward of Red Island, about 40 Leagues below Quebec, where the Vessel and Cargo were intirely lost. The Crew having taken to the Boat, with great Difficulty got a shore on Red Island, and remained there two Days and Nights, suffering much from the Inclemency of the Weather.

**CHARLES-TOWN, (S. Carolina) Nov. 18.**  
The Northern Tribes continue their Incursions against the Cherokees, who have suffered greatly by Fevers; several Towns have lost from 20 to 40 each, much owing to their Manner of treating the Sick, who either on being seized, plunge themselves immediately into a River, or send for the Physician, who repeatedly washes the Patient with cold Water, to abate the febrile Heat, Blows, Scratches, Cups, &c. till the Constitution, however strong, is fairly overcome, and Death closes the Scene. Amongst those dead is the faithful Indian named Chickesaw, who headed the Party of his Countrymen, that, by Direction of the Hon. John Stuart, Esq; Superintendent, &c. prevented the French and Illinois Indians from obstructing the Passage of Major Farman, and the 34th Regiment, for which very important Service he received publicly the Superintendent’s Thanks, in his Majesty’s Name, together with several Presents. The Sickness prevailing in that Nation has prevented the boundary Line, behind North-Carolina, from being run; the Indians having solicited Governor Tryon, and the Superintendent, that it may be postponed till the Spring.

**BOSTON, November 28.**  
Tuesday last a large Transport Ship put in here, having on board a Detachment of his Majesty’s Royal Train of Artillery, who were bound to Quebec, to relieve those which had been there several Years; but the above Ship, after making many Attempts to get up the River in vain, was obliged to put in here: We hear also that a Number of the same Corps, which had been relieved

at Halifax, were on board said Ship, intended for England, after they had taken on board those at Quebec.

**NEW-HAVEN, November 29.**  
Mr. Timothy Baldwin, of Amity, a Parish in New-Haven, departed this Life last Tuesday. For about a Year past he was troubled with a small Obstruction in discharging his Urine, but not so as to prevent him doing his common Business. Fourteen Days before his Death he rode into Town, about Seven Miles; was instantly taken with a violent Pain in the lower Part of the Abdomen, with a strong Inclination to discharge his Urine. He supposed it to be a Cholick; but never discharged a Drop until the Day before his Death, only by the Use of the Catheter, and nothing but Blood. His Bladder was taken out by Dr. Loverett Hubbard, in which he found a Wen as large as a Goose Egg, by the Sphincter Vesicæ or Muscle that goes around its Neck, and a purid Ulcer, which contained about Ten Ounces. The Bladder and what it contained weighed Four Pounds.

**NEW-YORK, November 27.**  
Some Letters from Mobile, via Pensacola, inform us, that it has been so sickly in that Place, that all the Inhabitants have left it, except about a Dozen Families, and the King’s Garrison.

We are credibly informed, that several Debtors lately confined in Goal, in this City, are discharged by the charitable Benevolence of the Lady Moore.—A second Instance of that Lady’s good Disposition, since her Arrival here, in the Course of 12 Months; and sets an Example worthy Imitation, especially as it has a direct Tendency to the Preservation of their Poor distressed Wives and Children, by letting them have the Assistance of their Husbands Labour, for a Support the approaching Winter.

Paragraph of a Letter from Quebec, Nov. 8, says, “the famous Rum Duties claimed by the King, as Heir at Law, and by Conquest to the French King, was Yesterday by our new Judge, &c. special Jury, given against the Crown; the King’s Attorney talks of Appealing, but we mean to remonstrate to his Majesty against the illegality of Taxing us against our Consent; and plead his own Proclamation in our behalf, where he promised the Canadians, as well as English, the same Rights and Privileges as his natural born Subjects. We do not refuse the necessary Aid for the support of Government in this Province, but claim the Right to raise them ourselves, and hope daily to learn this has been granted us, in giving us, as well as the other Colonies an Assembly, which we have some Time since applied for.

**PHILADELPHIA, December 12.**  
*Extract of a Letter from London, Sept. 30, 1766.*  
“I happened to be at York during the Races there, where a prodigious Concourse of Gentry were assembled, and where the Marquis of Rockingham was presented with very warm Addresses, from most of the Trading Towns of that County, highly exolling his late patriotic Administration, and deeply regretting their being now deprived of his farther Assistance. And indeed the late Ministry seem to stand very high in the Public Esteem in general. How this will operate next Winter, I will not pretend to say.

“At present, People seem to be somewhat tired of the Abuse that hath, for some Time, been thrown out against Lord Chatham, and wait with Impatience to see what Conduct he adopts at the Opening of the Session; he is now very ill of the Gout, and is at present at Bath, in order to recruit his Health.—In the mean while there is nothing but Riots and Insurrections over the whole Country, on Account of the high Price of Provisions, in particular Corn: The Privy Council have put a Stop to the Exportation of it in the Interim, but some Means must be fallen upon to lower the Price of the Necessaries of Life in general, or I know not what will become of the labouring Poor.

“Last Wednesday I was present at a General Meeting of the Proprietors of the East-India Company, who, in Consideration of their late immense Acquisitions in India, insisted on an Increase of their Dividend from 6 to 10 per Cent. and carried it by Ballot, against the unanimous Opinion of the Directors, who deemed it more prudent to wait till Matters were more composed in India, and till they are enabled, by returns from thence, to pay off the large Debts of the Company, which they declared they were at present wholly unable to do. The Directors were told (and they did not contradict the Assertion) that their yearly Revenue in Bengal was now actually equal to their whole Capital Stock, which is £. 3,200,000, and that therefore it was absurd to delay making an increas-

ed Dividend, seeing they could borrow, with Ease, whatever Sums they might have Occasion for. They (the Directors) seemed fearful, and unwilling to speak out; they only told the Court, that the Duke of Grafton had lately sent for them, to acquaint them, that their Affairs would probably come before the Parliament early in the Session; and from this Enquiry they seemed (though some think without Ground) to have some Apprehensions. It is not very easy to say, however, how this Affair will terminate.”

**ANNAPOLIS, December 18.**  
We hear from Virginia, that a Bill was under the Consideration of the Honourable House of Burgesses for erecting a Statue to his Majesty, as a grateful Acknowledgment for repealing the Stamp Act, and thereby restoring the Rights and Privileges of his American Subjects; also an Obelisk, to commemorate the Services of those Noble and Worthy Patriots that distinguished themselves in bringing about that happy Event.
