

**ROSEAU, (in Dominica) Nov. 12.**  
By a State of the Damages which were done by the Hurricane at Martinico, in the Night of the 13th of August, lately delivered into the General of that Island, by the Commandant of each Quarter, it appears that Six Churches were destroyed, Four lost their Roofs; 57 Whites were killed, 150 drowned, and 53 wounded; 148 Negroes killed, and 416 wounded; 709 Houses destroyed, and 705 lost their Roofs; 81 Sugar-works, 101 Curing-houses, 78 Still-houses, 95 Mills, 302 Coffee-houses, 245 Fuel-houses, and 6751 Negroe-houses blown down; 62323 Loaves, and 60 Barrels of Sugar lost; 69 Snows, Brigs, Sloops or Schooners, drove ashore, and lost, 18 Pettiaugres, and 27 Canoe Passengers, destroyed.

**CHARLES-TOWN, (South-Carolina) Dec. 23.**  
By Capt. Henderson, from Pensacola, we learn that a most terrible Hurricane was felt there on the 22d of October, which had done much Damage as well on Shore as in the Harbour: That the Gale began at E. S. E. was extremely violent, from about 10 o'Clock at Night till 6 in the Morning, when, the Wind shifting to the W. S. W. it abated. That only four Vessels rode it out, not without receiving some Damage; and all the rest were driven ashore, viz. The Brig Rebecca, Robert Craig, Master, from this Port; a Brig from the Bay of Honduras, belonging to Jamaica, four of whose Hands, and the Owner's Son, were drowned; four Schooners and one Sloop, all of which were entirely lost, except one of the Schooners (a Man of War's Tender) that was likely to be got off. That the 2d Infant, his Majesty's Ship the Ferret, commanded by Capt. Murray, came in there from a Cruise, entirely dismasted: And that five very rich Spanish Galleons, from La Vera Cruz, bound for Havanna and Old Spain, were drove on shore in the Bay of St. Bernard, W. and S. of Pensacola, some Time before the Hurricane of the 22d of October, to whose Relief a Vessel had been sent from New-Orleans, but was supposed to be lost; whereupon the Adventure Man of War, commanded by Capt. Fitzherbert, sailed from Pensacola the 11th of November, to give them all possible Assistance.

**BOSTON, January 29.**  
This Morning the Gaol in this Town was discovered to be on Fire; it is apprehended two Criminals that were confined for stealing of Leather, &c. at Roxbury, perpetrated this Crime, they having escaped before the Discovery; and a Hole was found burnt in the Floor over their Room, into the Chamber through which they made their Escape.

**PROVIDENCE, January 10.**  
On the Evening of the 8th Instant was married, Mr. John Taylor of Johnston, to Mrs. Anne Kelton of this Town. This venerable Pair, whose Ages amount to 161 Years, (i. e. 89 by 72) promises little Hopes of Success in the more common Effects of the matrimonial State.

**NEW-YORK, February 9.**  
Lately died at Groton, in the County of New-London, Mr. Edward Ahley, in the 108th Year of his Age: He retained his Reason, and the Use of his Limbs well, till a few Days before his Death.

**PHILADELPHIA, February 2.**  
Last Week Colonel George Croghan arrived here from the Illinois, by the Way of New-Orleans, Pensacola, and New-York.—And we have the Pleasure of informing our Readers, that this Gentleman has not only happily confirmed the Peace he made the Year before, with the numerous Tribes which compose the Western Confederacy; but he has adjusted, on Terms very beneficial to His Majesty's Interest, the great Contest which subsisted between the Northern and Western Confederacy.

**ANNAPOLIS, February 19.**  
Sunday Evening last, between X and XI o'Clock, we were alarm'd with the Cry of Fire, in a new Brick House in South-East-Street; but it was quenched without much Damage. The Fire was occasioned by a Fault in the Hearth, and the Smoke wak'd the Family.
