longing to the Garrison. His Accomplice had called other Soldiers his Comrades, and about Two in the Morning (very dark) a Number of them came down to the Ship, upon whose first Appearance I caused the Planks on the Stage to be hawled in, to prevent their getting on board, and Murdering us all. They asked for the Thief; I answered that I intended to deliver him up in the Morning: Finding they could not get on board, they replied, it was very well, and went off. Had I seen an Officer, or an Order to deliver the Fellow up, or known of any Guards upon the Wall, I would gladly have got rid of him.

"The 10th, 'a little before Sun-rise, twelve Portugueze Soldiers came along fide in a Boat, with their Muskets, and Bayonets fixed; I received them on board, neither suffering, or expecting to meet with any Ill treatment; shewed them the Thief, and told them what he had done; they took him away without any Order, or even an Officer above a Serjeant; after which, to my great Aftonishment, they seized me, my Boatswain, and a Man belonging to another English Vessel, who happened to be on my Deck, dragged us along like Dogs, and tumbled us Head foremost into their I made some Kesistance, by holding fast to the Ensign-staff, but a Soldier attempting to run me through the Back with his Bayonet (which was happily beat off) I was obliged to submit. As soon as they had tumbled us into the Boat, we were most unmercifully beat and bruised with the But-Ends of their Muskets, myself in particular so much, that I never'recovered the Beating while I remained at Oporto after, then tied our Hands together, and thus led and guarded us as the worst Malesactors to a Prison, where my unfortunate Companions were again severely beaten, till I paid two new crowns to the Villains there to defift. From hence we were foon after carried; our Hands again tied, to the common Jull, In this Confinement we remained till the 15th, when my Merchant, Mr. Thomas Stafford, by paying the head Prison keeper Five Moidores, representing to the Governor my ill State of Health, thro' the Beating, and Petitioning for my being released, obtained leave to remove me to his House for my Recovery. The 24th the Jail keeper (I suppose expecting more Money) sent to demand me back from my Private to the public Priton, whither I was forced again to go, ill as I was: The same Day, how-ever, upon the Consul and Mr. Stafford's again Petitioning the Governor, leave was obtained for my Return to my private Prison; where I remained, without daring to sir out, or see after my Ship or Bufiness, till the 5th of December; when, upon a new Petition to the Governor, fetting forth that my ship was unloaded, and ready to proceed up-on a Charter party to South Carolina, I was at last released from my private Prison, and my Boatswain and the other Man from the common Jail, upon the moderate Terms of paying every Charge they thought proper to bring against me and them, and without any other Satisfaction for the Insults, Injuries, and ill Usage we had received."

The Journal of a Wiltsbire Curate.

NONDAY—Received Ten Pounds from my Rector, Dr. Snarl, being one Half Year's Salary—obliged to wait a long Time before my Admittance to the Doctor, and even when admitted, was never once asked to fit down or refresh myself, though I had walked eleven Miles—Item, the Dr. hinted he could have the Curacy filled for Fifteen Pounds a Year.

Tuesday—Paid Nine Pounds to seven different People; but could not buy two second-hand Pair of black Breeches offered me as a great Bargain, by Cabbage the Tailor, my Wise wanting a Petticoat above all Things, and neither Betsy nor Polly having a Shoe to go to Church. Wednesday—My Wise bought a Petticoat for

Wednesday—My Wise bought a Petticoat for herself, and Shoes for her two Daughters, but unluckily in coming home, dropped Half a Guinea through a Hole, which she had never before perceived in her Pocket, and reduced all our Cash in the World to Half a Crown.—Item, chid my poor Woman for being afflicted at the Missfortune, and tenderly advised her to depend upon the Goodness of GOD.

Thursday—Received a Note from the Ale-House at the Top of the Hill, informing me that a Gentleman begged to speak to me on pressing Business, went and sound it was an unfortunate Member of a strolling Company of Players, who was pledged for Seven-pence Halfpenny—In a Struggle what to do——The Baker, though we had paid him but on Tuesday, quarrelled with us,

to avoid giving any Credit in stuture; and George Greafy the Butcher sent us Word that he heard it whispered, how the Rector intended to take a Curate, who would do the Parish Duty at an inferior Price; and therefore, though he would do any Thing to serve me, advited me to deal with Peter Paunch, at the upper End of the Town; morrifying Restections these!—But a Want of Humanity is in my Opinion a Want of Justice—the Father of the Universe lends his Blessings to us, with a View that we should relieve a Brother in Distress, and we consequently do no more than pay a Debt, when we perform an Act of Benevolence. Paid the Stranger's Reckoning out of the Shilling in my Pocket, and gave him the Remainder of the Money, to prosecute his Journey.

Priday—A very scanty Dinner, and pretended therefore to be ill, that by avoiding to eat, I might have something like enough for my poor Wise and Children.—I told my Wise what I had done with the Shilling; the excellent Creature, instead of blaming me for the Action, blessed the Goodness of my Heart, and burst into Tears.—Mem. Never to contradict her as long as I live—for the Mind that can argue like her's, though it may deviate from the more rigid Sentiments of Prudence, is even amiable for its Indiscretion, and in every Lapse from the Severity of Economy, performs an Act of Virtue, superior to the Value of a Kingdom.

Saturday—Wrote a Sermon, which on Sunday—I preached at four different Parish Churches, and came home excessively wearied, and excessively hungry; no more Money than Two pence Halspenny in the House; but see the Goodness of GOD! The strolling Player, whom I had relieved, was a Man of Fortune, who accidentally heard that I was as humane as I was indigent, and from a generous Eccentricity of Temper, wanted to do me an essential Piece of Service: I had not been an Hour at home when he came in, and declaring himself my Friend, put a 501. Note into my Hand, and the next Day presented me with a Living of 3001, a Year.

By some Gentleman in a short Journey from Montreal, we have received the following Extract of a Letter from Montreal, dated the 12th

of March, 1767.

"Major Disney, one of the Gentlemen confined for the Assault committed on Thomas Walker, Esq; on the 6th of December, 1764, and who has been in Confinement for these Four Months last past, was Yesterday arraigned and tried for his Life; and after a Trial of Thirteen Hours, the Jury withdrew, and in half an Hour brought in their Verdict, Not Guilty, on the strongest, and most distinct Evidence on the Part of the Prisoner: The Evidence on the Part of the Crown in many Instances being contradictory and inconsistent;—and the principal Evidence on behalf of the Crown, George M'Govock, a Soldier of the 28th Regiment, appearing to the Court, the Jury, and every one present, to be an infamous perjured Villain.

"The Council for the Prosecutor was Mr. At-

torney-General; and for the Prisoner, Counsellor Grigory; Counsellor Morrison, and Mr. Antill."
We are further informed, that an Hour before they left Montreal, being on the Day following of Major Disney's Trial, they saw all the rest of the Gentlemen (which had been in Custody) dischar-

ged from their Confinement.
