268 with English, whose Folly and Extravagance alone, in 12 Months, will more than enable us to make good the paltry Sum now demanded."—The King faw the Rectitude of his Advice, and acquiesced. And the English, by their Behaviour, have proved the Duke was no false Prophet.

March 17. Saturday last a Foreigner of Distinc-tion arrived in Town from Holland; and it is rumoured at the West End of the Town, that he is a Corfican Agent, charged with some important

Dispatches to our Court.

March 18. This Day being the Anniversary of the Repeal of the American Stamp-Act, we hear that many of the real Friends of this Kingdom, and of the Colonies, intend to commemorate the fame.

Yesterday there was a great Board of Treasury, and asterwards a Board of Trade, at which several

of the Colony Agents attended.

We hear it has already been discovered, that the Effects, &c. of a certain Merchant will pay his Creditors near, if not full, 20 s. in the Pound.

March 19. Yesterday the Levee at St. James's was very numerous, and afterwards a Cabinet Council was held, at which most of the great Officers of State, and many of the Privy-Council, affisted.

We hear that the Right Hon. the Earl of Chatham, had Yesterday a Return of the Gout.

March 20. In a Letter lately fent by Lord Clive to his Father, we are informed, his Lordship acquainted him, that he had been upwards of 700 Miles up the Country, to the Capital of the Great Mogul, who had not only conferred on him the Title of Omrah, but shewed him more distinguished Marks of his Favour than to any other Person whatever. His Lordship also says, that he has the Pleasure to acquaint him, that he had acquired a Revenue to the East-India Company of Four

Millions Sterling per Annum.

We are informed, that the Lisbon Mail, which arrived on Tuesday, has brought some agreeable Advices to the Portuguese Merchants of this City, in respect to their Commerce with that Kingdom.

The last Amsterdam Gazette, under London, March 3, fays, We are affured, that by virtue of a Treaty on the Point of Conclusion between this Crown and the Empire of Morocco, the English are permitted, among other Privileges, to form a Settlement near the Promontory, adjacent to Cape Verd, on the Coast of Africa.

Tuesday last 30 Transports were taken up by the Government, in order, it is said, to carry Troops

to North-America.

March 21. It is faid that Sir Edward Hawke, and some more of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, will fet out early this Summer to make the Survey of all the Men of War at Portsmouth and Plymouth; together with the Marine Arfenals and Royal Dock-Yards.

The Poor throughout the Highlands of Scotland are starving for the want of Oat Bread.

There is a great talk, that numbers of rich Merchants, and others, propose to lend Eight Millions, at Three per Cent. To have the Liberty of free Trade to the East-Indies, for as much Yearly as they pay, which doubtless will be a Benefit to the Subscribers, but the Company of course must suffer as much as the free Traders get, therefore the Directors will probably oppose such a Proposal's taking Place.

Sir Jeffery Amherst, Knight of the Bath, is soon to be married to Miss Cary, Daughter of Major-general Cary, and Niece to Lord Falkland.

The struggle between the Inns and Outs, continues as violent as ever, but must be finally deter-mined in a few Days; both Parties having affiduoully called in all their Forces, in order to decide the Dispute.

'Tis now faid the Earl of B ---- (not the Earl of Bute) is resolved to have no further Connections with this Administration, and that the Marquis of R-----m has given a positive Resulal to recent Application for his Lordship to join them on his own

All the Regiments on the British and Irish ,Establishments are to have the Number of each: Regiment marked on their Buttons. The French Ar my havelong fince followed this, and find it useful.

It is faid the whole Army, and even the Militia, will have white Waistcoats and Breeches.

The late failure of a great Merchant, was oc-casioned by his having diffursed several large Sums on a Corn Contract with Italy, which he had agreed to supply, to the Amount of 100,000 l. with American Wheat. The stipulated Cargoes are now on the Seas; and should this Adventure turn out well, as is rather probable, he will have a very confiderable Surplus, after the full Payment of his Creditors, if not, they will be great Sufferers.

They write from Cadiz, that Ten Battalions of

Spanish Infantry and Marines were daily expected there, to be embarked on board several Men of War, Frigates, and Bomb ketches, and it was said their Destination was for the Coast of Barbary.

The Repeal of the Cambrick Act is entirely laid aside; and it is even said that a total prohibition will take Place.

If we may credit some Accounts, our Trade with Portugal is not likely ever to be so considerable as heretofore; not owing, as has been represented, so much to the Aversion of the Portuguese to the English, as to their being able to furnish themselves with the Manusastures they formerly took from us. Some few Years fince, one House in the City of London was faid to furnish Portugal annually with Hats, to the Amount of between Seven and Eight Thousand Pounds, which Branch of Trade is now almost entirely lost, the Portuguese having fince established Manusactories of their own, whereby they are enabled to supply themselves at a cheaper Rate, than when they imported that Article of Commerce from foreign Countries.

According to private Letters from Madrid, a Treaty was on foot with the Court of Verfailles, for ceding back the Island of Hispaniola to his Catholic Majesty, in lieu of which a certain Tract of Territory on the Continent of South-America was to be delivered up to the French.

March 23. Yesterday Morning about 3 o'Clock died of the Bruises he received by a Fall from his Horse, the most Hon. Francis Russel, Marquis of Tavistock, only Son of his Grace the Duke of Bedford, Member of Parliament for the County of Bedford, and Colonel of the Bedfordshire Militia. His Lordship was born October 1739.
PHILADELPHIA, May 11.

Our last Advices from Europe are, That Great-Britain, France, Spain, Portugal, Prussia, Russa, and Holland, are making great Military Prepara-tion, which indicates a Rupture among some of the European Powers—That it is expected by many that fresh Troubles will arise in Poland on Account of the Protestants-That, if the Affairs of Geneva are not amicably fettled, very speedily, to mutual Satisfaction, which fome think has already been done, some Protestant Powers will interpose in Behalf of the Liberties of that Republicbrave Corficans continue inflexible in their Resolution of freeing their Country from the Yoke of Genoese Tyranny-That there is a powerful French Faction in Portugal, which impedes a proper Ajustment of the Differences between that Court and Great-Britain :- And that Party Animosities run very high among the Great in England, infomuch that the true Interest of the Nation seems to be almost forgot amidst the general Struggles for Power and Place.
