LONDON, April 30.

YESTERDAY there was the fullest Houle of Commons known since the Meeting of Parliament, and it was expected would sit late.

This Day will be held a full Board of Trade, being the first since the Holidays; and we hear, the Privy Council have given Grants of Land upon the Continent in North-America, to many of the poor Sufferers in the late War.

Private Letters from Madrid inform, that an Advice Boat had been sent from Cadiz, with secret Dispatches to the Viceroy of Mexico, Peru and Chili, and the other Spanish Governors in South-America, and the West-Indies, said to be on Affairs of Importance relating to the Jesuits.

It is said a Patent will be given to several eminent Mechanics in Watch-making, for making of Mr. Harrison's Time-Piece; that they will be examined when made by a Committee, to ascertain their being agreeable to the Original, and that the Price of them will be likewise ascertained.

The late Duchess of Argyle always desired to be buried just in whatever Things she should have on when she died, and no other; these happened to be a Shift and Petticoat; and her Grace was also wrapped in Half of a Sheet, the other Moiety of which her Noble Consort, the Great Duke of Argyle, was interred in.

We hear a great Number of foreign Jesuits, who are possessed of immense Wealth, have a Design to lay aside their Ecclesiastical Function and Character entirely, in order to come and settle in Great-Britain as Merchants, where they intend to get themselves naturalized; for which Privilege, it is said, they are willing to pay a large Sum to the Government, which they intend to petition for that Purpose.

Extract of a Letter from Madrid, April 2.

Two Jesuits arrived here lately from Paraguay; one of them was the Governor, and the other Chief Justice of one of the principal Provinces. Upon their Arrival they requested the necessary Passes to convey them to Rome; which were readily granted, with express Orders to the Officers not to search or examine any Part of their Baggage. The Jesuits placed so much Confidence in the Orders given, that without the least Fear they proceeded on their Journey to Catalonia, where they intended to embark; but scarcely were they arrived there before their Persons and Baggage were all seized. Upon opening their Baggage, there were found 260 heavy Ingots of Gold, 13 large Boxes, filled with Diamonds, and other precious Stones, and Bills of Exchange for Three Millions, payable at Rome.

Trade is brought to so low an Ebb at Lisbon, that the Custom-house Duties for the Month of February, did not exceed Four Hundred Moldores.

May 2. Yesterday Morning the Two Secretaries of State, and several Lords of the Privy Council, attended at the Cockpit, Whitehall, on Affairs of Importance.

It is now currently reported that the Negotiation between our Court and that of Portugal has taken a favourable Turn; and it is even said that a Commercial Treaty is on foot, whereby all our Rights and Privileges will be renewed, so as to prevent any Subject of future Complaint.

This Week some of the Heads of the German Emigrants settled at Long-Canes and Hillsborough Township, in the Province of South-Carolina, arrived in Town from Charles-Town, and are soon to set out for Germany, to engage a Number of their Countrymen to embark for that Place.

Yesterday Morning Two Battalions of the Middlesex Militia marched, the one for Finchley Common, the other for Hounslow-Heath, to be exercised for 28 Days, in pursuance of the Act of Parliament.

May 4. General Cornwallis, appointed Governor of Gibraltar, in the room of General Irwin, will embark for that Station about the Middle of this Month.

The Government has ordered a Ship of War to be ready at Portsmouth to carry home his Excellency Hamet Aga Joya Effendi, to Morocco, and a new Ambassador is daily expected in Town from Gibraltar.

It is said, in a Letter from Madrid, that the confiscated Effects belonging to the Jesuits through the whole Kingdom of Spain, already amounted to the Sum of Seventy-five Millions of Piasters, exclusive of the Spoils expected from that Society in the Indies.

Accounts by Saturday's Mail confirm the Advices mentioned lately in the Papers, of the Seizure

of the Jesuits at Barcelona on the 14th ult. and add, that in some of their Cells Guns were found, and in others some Papers were discovered burning, which had just been thrown into the Fire.

Saturday Morning a Quantity of Artillery and Ordnance Stores were shipped at the Tower for Senegal, and on Monday Two Companies of Matroses will be embarked at Woolwich for the African Settlements.

We hear the East-India Company is to pay into the Exchequer, by Half-yearly Payments, 500,000 l. per Annum, for Three Years certain; and that on or before the Expiration of that Time, they are to deliver in an Account of all the territorial Revenues and Duties they receive, Military and other Expences deducted, in order to settle what hereafter may be paid; and at that Time will be taken into Consideration the granting of them a new Charter for a longer Term of Years. In the mean Time, the Company are to be aided to enlarge and extend their Trade, for the mutual Benefit of Great-Britain and the Proprietors, and to put a Stop to Smuggling by lowering the Duties and granting Drawbacks; the best Means to increase the Revenue, and to prevent the Dutch, Swedes and Danes rivalling the Company in the Tea Trade, by bringing large Quantities to Europe which are afterwards transported into England. The Company will also buy their Teas in China much cheaper; and lastly, that the Company shall pay no higher Dividend for Three Years than Eight per Cent. and not afterwards, but by a Petition to Parliament, setting forth their Abilities to pay a larger Dividend.

Extract of a Letter from Cornwall, April 29.

On Saturday a large Body of Tinners, to the Amount of 500 or upwards, went in a Body to an Estate near Truro, called Lambessa, in search of Corn, where they met with a small Quantity, for which they paid Fifteen Shillings per Cornish Bushel, and Seven Shillings for Barley, which is Three Winchester; and in examining the Houfe, one of the Number took an Opportunity of concealing some Silver Spoons, which being missed after they were gone, a Person followed them into Truro, and complained to the Man who seemed to be at the Head of them; upon which he assembled them together, and told them what had been done, and insisted on every Person being searched, at the same Time stripping off his own Cloaths, as did many others, to the Amount of Forty or Fifty, when one Person refusing, gave a Suspicion. Accordingly on Enquiry they found Two Silver Spoons upon him; upon which they carried him to the Public Cross, and sent the Cryer round the Town, to give Notice, that such a Person, mentioning his Name, had been guilty of the Theft, and that he should be publicly punished for the Offence. They then procured some Thongs from a Saddler's, made Two Whips, stripped him, and tied him to a Post, and Two of them gave him to the Amount of 200 Lashes, heartily laid on, and to such a Degree, that he now lies dangerously ill. Such are the Notions of Justice in our common Tinners.

The Hon. Sir James Grey, appointed his Majesty's Ambassador to the Court of Spain, will set out for Madrid in a few Days.

Letters from Nuremberg, dated April 3, say, "A Jew at Vienna is become a Bankrupt for so large a Sum, that our Merchants are determined to apply to the Magistrates, to oblige all Jews who carry on Trade, to give double the Security that other Merchants do."

A Lady of great Distinction had no less than Five Hundred Pounds worth of smuggled Lace, seized from under the Cushion of her Sedan Chair last Week, as she was returning home from a Call at her Milliner's.

From some certain Calculations relative to the great Horse Match between Bay Malton, Herod, Turf and Ascham, it is said that there were Wagers depending on that Race to the Amount of 1,100,000 l.

The late amiable Marquis of Tavistock, as appears since his death, allowed a Number of Pensions, from Five to Fifteen Pounds a Year to poor People in Bedfordshire; the Loss of so beneficent a Heart is therefore a public Calamity in any Country, especially at a Time when the Beneficence of the Great is so immediately necessary for the Support of the Indigent.

They write from Cadiz, that an Order has been received there for the Equipment of a small Squadron, said to be intended for an Expedition to South-America, to destroy a certain Sea Port which the Jesuits of Paraguay had possessed themselves of, between Cape St. Antonio and the River of Plate.

They write from Liverpool, that some opulent Merchants of that Town, are preparing to fit out a Number of Ships, to be employed this Season in the Greenland Fishery.

Several of the Foreign Nobility and Gentry, lately arrived here, we are assured, have bespoke very rich Suits of Cloaths, which are now weaving in Spittalfields, to appear in at-Court on his Majesty's Birth-Day.

We hear from Glasgow, that some Fishermen lately dug up, on the Island of St. Kilda, Two antique Urns, containing a Quantity of Danish Silver Coin, which by the Inscription appears to have lain there upwards of 18 Hundred Years.

We are credibly informed, that the Vigilance of Admiral Palliser, during his Station last Year at Newfoundland, has utterly disconcerted the Views of the French in their Attempts to carry on any future clandestine Trade with the English; several of their Fishermen, who carried out little or no Provision for the Voyage, in hopes of being supplied in Exchange for Brandies and European Goods, having been obliged to quit the Coast before the Season was half expired.

We hear that French Louis d'Ors never were so plenty at New-market as at present, to the agreeable Surprise of all the Gentlemen of the Turf.

A Butcher in a Market in the West of the Metropolis, has won 7000 l. by the great Horse-Race at New-market last Tuesday.

A Waiter at a Coffee-House at the West End of the Town lost 400 Guineas last Tuesday, by betting at New-market Races.

A noble Lord, we hear, will shortly take a Tour to the Continent, and stay abroad till he has recovered his Losses at the present New-market Meeting, by a prudent observance of Oeconomy.

We hear that 1200 Guineas were offered last New-market meeting for the famous Horse Bay Malton, the Property of the Marquis of Rockingham, and refused.

May 5. Yesterday Morning his Majesty, attended by their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York, Gloucester, and Cumberland, the Prince of Brunswick, the Marquis of Granby, and several other Persons of Distinction, reviewed the Right Hon^{ble} the Earl of Pembroke's Regiment of Dragoons, in Hyde-Park. The Men were all mounted on fine black Horses, and went through their different Exercises, both on Foot and Horseback, in such a Manner as to give general Satisfaction.

By a Letter from Jamaica we learn, that Silver is now more plentiful in that Island than at any Time since the Conclusion of the late War.

A Letter from Vigo mentions, that Twenty Thousand Trees have lately been cut down in the several Forests of the Principality of Catalonia, which the Spaniards are now employed in sending by Sea to Carthagena, and other Ports in the Mediterranean, for the Use of their Marine.

May 6. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Most Noble Harry Powlett, Duke of Bolton, Governor of the Isle of Wight, to be Vice-Admiral of the said Island, in the room of the Right Honourable Hans Stanley, Esq; who has resigned.

They write from Paris, that a Fire broke out a few Nights since in the Parish of Veneux Naudous, near Fontainebleau, and that the Flames spread so rapidly, that 54 Houses were soon reduced to Ashes.

Letters from Paris say, that the French Ministry have communicated to the Senate of Genoa the Project for an Accommodation received from the General Council of the Corsicans, together with the Memorial of General Paoli; but the Genoese having declared that they could not accept of it, it is supposed that the Expedition to the Island of Capraia was undertaken to bring them to a Compliance.

By a Vessel arrived at Gibraltar from Saltee, there is Advice, that a French Ship of Thirty-two Guns, had lately put into the Island of Fedal, on the Coast of Barbary, and landed a Party of Marines, but were soon after repulsed, with great Loss, by the Moors, and the Man of War narrowly escaped being taken.

The Danish East-India Company, who had agreed not to send any more Ships to Bengal, have altered their Mind, and resolved not only to fit out One this Year for that Coast, but even to send several thither annually, in order to extend the Commerce of the Company in that Part of the World.

They write from Gibraltar, that, by Letters from Algiers, it was expected the Dey would speedily declare War against the Grand Duke of Tuscany.

The Lower House of Assembly of Maryland have constantly and ineffectually hitherto, since Seventeen hundred and Thirty-nine, RESOLVED, That his Lordship hath no Right to collect Twelve-pence per Hoghead of tobacco exported.

Constitutional Tax on the People to support an Agent for the Appointment of the Lower House, has been greatly and frequently attempted, and as often refused by the House.

The Lower House of Assembly contend, That the Clerk of the Council his reasonable Reward, as well as every other Office necessarily attending the Execution of the Power of Government, ought to be defrayed out of the *Fines, Fees, Amerciaments, and other Monies* received by the Clerk for the Support thereof; and, "That Sentiments being directly opposite to the Opinion the Upper House had, on mature Consideration, formed upon the subject of the Clerk of the Council's Claim," principally upon the Non-payment of the Public Debt for upwards of ten Years: The Distress of Trade for Want of a Circulation Medium, and the extreme Necessity of Public Creditors, moved the Lower House to agree to an Appeal to his Majesty in Council, on the Subject Matter of Difference, with the Allotment of any Public Money for that Purpose, as the only Means to settle Disputes, restore Public Credit, and lay a sure Foundation for the future Ease and Good of the Province.
