WARSAW, July 1.  
PRINCE Radzivil has been elected Mar-  
shal of the General Confederacy of Ra-  
don, after some pretty sharp Debates, in  
which it is assured some Blood has been  
spilt.

GENOA, July 4. They write from Madrid, that  
a Treaty is negotiating with Russia, and another  
with some German Princes, for allowing a Number  
of their Subjects to settle with their Families in  
Spain, in order to cultivate a barren Tract of  
of Ground, called Serra Molenos. They are to  
be allowed the Expences of their Journey, and, on  
their Arrival in the Spanish Territories, are to re-  
ceive the King's Pay, and be provided with Neces-  
saries for a Year. They are also to be furnished with  
Materials for building, and Tools for Husbandry; but  
after the Expiration of the above-mentioned Term,  
they are to maintain themselves with the Produce  
or Revenue of their respective Lands, which will  
be granted to them as their full Property, besides  
an Exemption from all Taxes for Ten Years to  
come.

By a Vessel arrived here from Toulon, we learn,  
that a Frigate and a Chebec had sailed from that  
Port for Cadiz, but we are Strangers to the Mo-  
tive. It is added, that in order to forward the  
Works carrying on at the said Port, the Number  
of Workmen had been doubled, and that Vessels  
laden with Timber for Ship-building, were per-  
petually arriving there from different Parts of  
Italy.

FLORENCE, July 4. There are actually 6000 Je-  
suits in the Ports of Orthibello, St. Stephen, and  
Port Real, on Account of the Republic of Genoa  
not having permitted them to land on their Terri-  
tories.

WARSAW, July 4. The Confederated Dissidents  
have received from the Courts of Copenhagen,  
Stockholm, and Berlin, the strongest Assurances of  
Protection. The King of Sweden, in particular,  
has charged his Minister at Petersburg, to deliver  
to the Deputy Pfarfki, a Declaration in their Fa-  
vour, which Commission he has already discharged.

### L O N D O N.

JULY 3. A great Personage is said to have de-  
clared that he will himself lay the Ground-Work  
of a new Administration, which shall at least have  
the Merit of DURATION.

We hear that Sir William Trelawney, Member  
for West Looe in Cornwall, is appointed Governor  
of Jamaica.

JULY 16. They write from Lisbon, that Four  
Ringleaders in the late Infurrection at Tercera,  
were arrived there, in Chains, on board a Portu-  
guese Frigate of War.

JULY 18. They write from Guernsey, that the  
Coast of France, between the Ran of Alderney  
and Cape Uphant, has been strewn with Pieces of  
Shipwreck, during the late hard Gales of Wind  
in the Channel.

We are assured that the Earl of Chatham has  
resigned his Place.

JULY 21. We are informed that there are Eight  
eminent Citizens, who have already declared to  
stand Candidates for the City of London at the  
ensuing general Election.

The Earl of Chatham is so enfeebled by his pre-  
sent illness, that his Lordship has been obliged to  
be carried, for the Benefit of the Air, between Two  
Hories, on a Litter.

It is said that the Earl of Chatham will shortly set  
out for the South of France, for the recovery of his  
Health.

From Malaga they write, that some Assassins  
broke into the House of Mr. Tulk, an English  
Gentleman there, when they killed Two of his  
Domestics, and dangerously wounded him, but he  
is since recovered. Mr. Tulk, and some young  
Gentlemen, passing by the Host, and not paying  
Reverence to it, is said to have occasioned this hor-  
rid Act.

The Island of Tercera, the largest but one of the  
Azores, it is said, is to be ceded to Britain, in Sa-  
tisfaction for the late Aids furnished to Portugal.  
This Island can boast of a Soil fit for the Producti-  
on of Corn, Cattle, and Poultry; but its Wind is  
very despicable. It has a good Harbour, and lies  
in the Atlantic Ocean, about half Way between  
Europe and America.

A Patent is passing the Great Seal, appointing  
William Spry, Esq; Governor of the Island of Bar-  
bados.

We hear that Expresses have been sent to the  
Right Hon. Earl Temple, and the Right Hon.  
William Dowdeswell, Esq; desiring their Attendance  
in Town.

A Letter received at Lisbon, from the Bay of  
All-Saints, mentions, that Two Dutch Sloops, and

a Schooner, laden with Powder and Shot, Small  
Arms, Ordnance Stores, &c. were boarded by a  
Portuguese Man of War near the Rio de la Plata,  
the Commander of which, finding the above Car-  
goes were for the Use of the Jesuits of Paraguay,  
had confiscated the whole, for the Use of the King  
of Portugal.

It is said, that the Crown made by Mr. Cox, of  
Shoe-Lane, Jeweller, for a Nabob in the East-Indies,  
and sent as a Present from the Company, by Capt.  
Rous, in the Britannia, was so much approved of,  
that the Nabob ordered a Present of Rupees to be  
made in return, amounting to about 75,000l. Ster-  
ling. We hear the Crown was valued before it  
was sent over at 14,000l.

We hear from Amsterdam, that they import  
13,000 Laits of Corn from the Baltic in a Week,  
and export 30,000 Laits to the Mediterranean in a  
Month, notwithstanding which their Granaries were  
all full, and ready to supply the London Market,  
when required.

It is said that the Decree given in Scotland, in  
Favour of the Hamilton Family, is not final; and  
that an Appeal will be made next Sessions to the  
Right Hon. House of Peers, for a Re-hearing.

The Changes in the Administration expected for  
some Time past, and which were, it was generally  
supposed, to have been settled in the Cabinet Coun-  
cil at St. James's, have not yet taken Place. It has  
been currently reported, that a Plan, formed by  
their Graces Bedford and Newcastle, the Marquis  
of Rockingham, and the Hon. Mr. George Gren-  
ville, was Yesterday laid before a great Personage,  
in which, of the above Number, only the Marquis  
was at the Levee Yesterday; and the Duke of New-  
castle came to Town about Noon.

It is said that Lord Clive, on his landing at Port-  
smouth, ordered Five Guineas to be given to each  
of the common Sailors belonging to the Britannia,  
which brought him home.

JULY 23. The Confederacies formed by the Mal-  
contents seem to draw the Attention of the Senate  
rather more than the Affair of the Dissidents. The  
new Prince Primate set out the 30th ult. for Radon,  
whither a Body of Russian Troops has advanced,  
with a large Train of Artillery, in order to support  
the Confederates, in case of Necessity.

We are assured, that by a late Treaty between  
this Court and that of Versailles, a mutual Agree-  
ment hath been entered into, for the reciprocal  
Surrender of all Fugitives, who may fly for Shelter  
into either Kingdoms, for any Acts of Rebelli-  
on or Felony; in Consequence of which, we hear  
that a certain Nobleman's Steward, and a Banker's  
Clerk, of this Country, who have taken Shelter in  
France, after running away with considerable Sums,  
have been lately demanded, in conformity to the  
said Treaty.

We are assured that a noble Lord, much esteemed  
in the Literary World, lately disposed of a Work,  
now publishing, to Two Booksellers, One at the  
West-End of the Town, the other in the City, for  
Two Thousand Guineas.

JULY 25. We can with great Certainty assure the  
Public, that the new Ministry are not settled; not-  
withstanding what has been mentioned in the Public  
Papers; and to speak in the Stock-Broker's Phrase,  
THIS MORNING, NOTHING DONE.

Earl T— refused to join the late intended Co-  
alition, as being hasty, crude, indigested and im-  
permanent.

We hear, that within these few Months, not less  
than Three Thousand Sheep have been carried to  
France.

A Morning Paper says, we hear a great Per-  
sonage has expressed his Resentment, in pretty se-  
vere Terms, to a certain Nobleman, of the Incon-  
sistency of his Conduct hitherto, which it is said,  
would be attended with a speedy Resignation.

We hear the late Investigation of the Douglas  
Cause, has already been attended with an Expence  
of Thirty Thousand Pounds.

A Letter from Podore Factory and Settlement,  
says, that One of the Moorish Caravans had disco-  
vered, a long-Way Inland, a Species of white Ne-  
groes of very diminutive Stature; One of whom,  
of the Male Sex, they brought with them to the  
Fort, who did not exceed Three Feet high.

By Letters from Leghorn there is Advice, that  
General Paoli had strongly recommended to an As-  
sembly of the States to copy the Example of Great-  
Britain, in always maintaining a formidable Naval  
Power, as the surest Means to preserve the Corfican  
Nation, and render them respected both at home  
and abroad.

JULY 27. The Hague Gazette, of the 21st Inst.  
says, that one of the Principal Affairs that Sir James  
Grey, Ambassador from this Court to Spain, is  
charged with, is to settle the Dispute relating to  
the Manilla Ransom.

On Saturday, a Sailor, who had bought an old  
Sea-Chest, for Five Shillings, from a Broker in  
Rosemary-Lane, discovered, soon afterwards, One  
Hundred and Eleven Spanish Gold Pistoles, con-  
cealed in a false Lining at the Bottom.

JULY 28. Letters from Madrid, dated June 30,  
say, "The King has appointed a Commission to  
examine the Papers found in the Houses belonging  
to the Jesuits, in order to find out, among other  
Things, if those Fathers were not the principal  
Authors of the Infurrection of the Populace,  
which happened last Year. It is reported that a  
Treaty of Commerce is on Foot between this  
Court and that of Russia."

JULY 30. By a Ship which arrived in Holland  
the 21st Instant, and departed from Greenland the  
28th of June, we learn, that 40 Dutch Ships had  
taken only 51 Whales, and that 92 others were  
then empty, with little Prospect of any Success; and  
that this Season has been the worst ever known.

We hear that on Sunday last Lord Clive present-  
ed to the King a Letter from the Emperor of In-  
doftan, accompanied by several oriental Curiosities;  
and that his Lordship the same Day had a private  
Conference in the Closet with his Majesty, which  
lasted an Hour and a Half; after which he had a  
private Audience of the Queen, and presented to  
her Majesty some Diamonds and Pearls from the  
Great Mogul.

Tuesday a Master of a Ship was re-committed to  
the King's Bench, on Suspicion of intending to de-  
fraud the Freighters of his Ship of a large Sum of  
Money, by pretending the Chefts, in which it was  
contained, were thrown overboard by Mistake,  
when the Ship was in great Distress. But on his  
Return from Guildhall, he prevailed on the Tiptiff,  
who had him in Custody, to go with him on board  
the Ship in the River to see some great Curiosities;  
when, locking the Officer in the Cabin, he jumped  
into a Boat, and made his Escape.

We are told, that a young Man from Ireland,  
lately invented a Machine for destroying Enemies  
by Land or Water, which was used at Woolwich  
last April, and found to answer; but has been since  
condemned, as being of too inhuman a Nature to  
be adopted in our Warlike Enterprizes; that the  
young Man was gratified with too small a Reward;  
that he thereupon retired to France, where he has  
received the best Encouragement, and that many  
of these Engines are making in that Country, under  
his Inspection, that will bear a Charge of Three  
Hundred Pounds of Gun-Powder, to be used a-  
gainst us upon the next Rupture.

JULY 31. By a Gentleman just come from Lisbon,  
we are informed, that the English Merchants there  
are obliged, for want of Business, to dismiss their  
Clerks; that they expected Money by the last Fleet  
from the Brazils, but have got none; that they  
cannot get in their Portuguese Debts; and that  
Ruin stares them in the Face, whether they stay or  
go.

### Extract of a Letter from Constantinople, June 15.

"The Reis Effendi, or Minister for foreign Af-  
fairs, lately signified to the Envoy of a certain Court,  
that he was to inform his Master, that since the late  
War, the Porte had a Demand upon him for divers  
Sorts of Provisions, drawn from Wallachia for the  
Service of other Powers, and which had been car-  
ried off by the Troops of the said Court. The En-  
voy having been informed, from good Authority,  
that the Reis Effendi had addressed himself to the  
Minister of another Power, and demanded Payment  
of the said Debt, told him, that it would be to no  
Purpose for him to call upon his Court, inasmuch  
as he was persuaded, that it would never pay one  
Farthing of it; on which the Reis Effendi inform-  
ed him, that unless the Debts were discharged, he  
would bring himself into Trouble. The Envoy  
desired him to give him this Answer in Writing,  
and in the same Terms, that he might endeavour  
to secure himself against such a Menace: but the  
Envoy having solicited the Day after, of the Grand  
Signior, an Audience of Leave, the Reis Effendi  
changed his Tone, and at present shews the Envoy  
greater Civility than ever."

### Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, June 20, 1767.

"Since my last, Four Ships from the Rio, Two  
from Bahia, and Four for Fernambucco, are arrived  
here; these last are belonging wholly to the Mono-  
polizing Company, that has engrossed the whole  
Trade of that Country. The Rio Ships bring some  
Hides, a few Sugars, and only Forty Thousand  
Pounds in Specie, though Ten Times the Sum was  
expected. What adds to the Distress of this Place  
is, that none of the Portuguese will own they have  
received any Remittance in Specie for their own  
Account, but pretend it is for Account of the Peo-  
ple in Brazil, and that their Remittance consists  
only in Effects, as Hides, Sugars, &c. which too  
they will not give in Payment, but at Prices that
