

Frigates, of 30 Guns, are now fitting out there, to cruise against the Algerine Corsairs, and other Barbary Pirates, in the Mediterranean.

A Letter from Dublin, dated Sept. 8, says, "It is reported here, that at the next Meeting of our Parliament, the State of the Penions upon the Civil Establishment of Ireland, will be taken into Consideration."

Extract of a Letter from Algiers, July 23. "M. Angelo Emo, who commands the Venetian Squadron, has not been able to re-establish the Peace between his Republic and this Regency. The Dey, with whom he has had several Interviews, abated, indeed, in the Demand which he first made of 50,000 Sequins, and reduced it to 30,000, but on Condition that the Republic made him an annual Present of 12,000 Sequins, with a Cargo of Timber, proper for the Construction of Ships. Admiral Emo, on his Side, offered no more than 10,200 Sequins, besides the Presents which the Dey demanded on his Accession to the Regency, but without the Ship-Timber. The Dey refused these Offers, and told M. Emo, that, if he did not agree to what he had demanded, he had nothing to do but to return." This last Interview passed the 20th of this Month, and next Day the Four Ships, which composed the Venetian Squadron, put to Sea. Immediately after their Departure, Notice was given to the Corsairs, that they might attack the Venetian Ships, and take them wherever they met with them.

The Dey has also notified to the Danish Consul, "that if his Nation does not fend, within the Term of Three Months, the Presents which the Dey demanded on his Advancement to that Dignity, War shall be declared against the Danes."

Extract of a Letter from Lijon, August 30. "The 24th of this Month arrived in the Pagus, a Shallop with an Exprels on board, dispatched by the Governor of Senegal, with Orders to repair to London as soon as possible, to inform the Government, that a Mortality rages with such Violence among the Troops, that out of 300 Men, of which they were composed, scarce 60 are remaining; and moreover, that there is a great Scarcity of Provisions."

BOSTON, October 26. The Freeholders and other Inhabitants of this Town, are notified to meet at Faneuil Hall on Wednesday next, at 10 o'Clock in the Forenoon, in order, amongst other Things, to consider and agree upon some effectual Measures to promote Industry, Oeconomy, and Manufactures, thereby to prevent the unnecessary Importation of European Commodities, which threaten the Country with Poverty and Ruin:—That the Mind and Resolution of the Town may be taken, with respect to the Expedience of an humble Request to his Excellency the Governor, that he will convene the General Assembly as soon as may be; and the giving proper Instructions to the Representatives of the Town, for their Conduct at this critical Conjuncture of our Public Affairs: Also to consider of some Measures for employing the Poor of the Town of Boston, by reviving the Linen Manufacture, and in such other Ways as shall be thought most beneficial.

It is with Pleasure we can inform our Readers, That within the last Year, 30,000 Yards of Cloth were manufactured in one small Country Town in this Province; so far does the Spirit of Industry begin to prevail among us, and we hope will, in this Way, assisted by Frugality and Oeconomy, daily afford us a more promising Prospect of our Emergency from the present alarming Scarcity of Money, and consequent Stagnation of Trade; and from the almost universally increasing Complaints of Debt and Poverty.

By Captain Bruce we learn, that the Gentlemen in England who were appointed Commissioners of the Board of Customs, had taken their Passage in Captain Watt, who was to sail in a few Days after him for this Place.

ANNAPOLIS, November 12. By Advice from home, we are informed of the Death of WILLIAM SHARPE, Esq; Brother to his Excellency our Governor. He was first Clerk of his Majesty's Council in Ordinary.

Last Week a young Lad, Servant to Capt. Bryce of this City, and a Negro Boy, belonging to Mr. Joseph Middleton of Virginia, were unfortunately drowned in the Potomack River, by carrying too much Sail.
