Extract of a Letter from Dominica, dated October 10. Two Gentlemen just returned from Martinico, bring a Confirmation of the Ports in that Island and Guadaloupe being to be shut against any English Vessel, after the 31st of December next, upon any Pretence of Business whatever, even Lumber and live Cattle.

LAST WEEK we had a very heavy Storm of Wind and Rain, the Severity of it was on Wednesday, no great Damage done in this Harbour; but in the Bay the Wind being violent at N. E. many Vessels were in great Distress.

A SNOW from the West-Indies, Capt. Somerville, bound to Piscataqua, was cast away on the bank of Newcastle; the Vessel and Cargo are said to be lost.

WE HEAR the Subscription Paper for increasing our own Manufactures, and laying aside certain enumerated Articles, fills up surprizingly; and that said Measure is so well approved of in the Country, that Town Meetings are now calling, in order to agree upon similar Measures.

SATURDAY last we were favoured with a Sight of the China Tea-Plant in Foliage, being cultivated by Capt. Harrison of this Town; some of the dried Leaves being by Mrs. Harrison presented with the Shrub, in Flavour exactly resembling the common Green-Tea.

CHARLES-TOWN, (S. CAROLINA) October 6. Michael Muckenfuss, dispatched by the Post-Master General, with the Mail for St. Augustine, returned here last Wednesday, and gives the following Account, upon Oath, that on the 20th ult. (Three Days after he left Savannah) he reached the Store on Santilly River, kept by James Lemmon, who told him, that the Day before, while George Mills, Benjamin Baker, Je-

remiah Wyly, and one Cummins, were driving some Cattle across a Run of Water, near the said Wyly's Houfe, the Three last mentioned were fired upon and killed on the Spot; Mills made his Escape, and rode towards Wyly's, where he saw Five Indians killing Two Women, Three Children, and old Mr. Mills, his own Father, on which he rode off; he knew the Indians to be Creeks, belonging to the Village of Allatch-way, who, to the Number of Fifteen, had been for some Time hunting in that Neighbourhood.

OCTOBER 20. Mr. Job Elliot, living at Saltketcher, has brought to Goal one Moon, chief of the Villains who have done so much Damage in the back Parts of this Province, and whose Name has struck such Horror into the Minds of his Majesty's Subjects; Mr. Elliot met with him accidentally, a considerable Distance from home, and having some Remembrance of him when a Boy, decoyed him to a convenient Place, and then secured him, agreeable to the Governor's Proclamation; and without any Assistance, or other Authority, brought him safe to Charles-Town Goal, where he is now lodged; and it is hoped, the numerous Roberies and Outrages, it is said he has been guilty of, will be known to some of the many Persons who will be Attendant at the ensuing Sessions, so that there may be no Want of Evidence to bring him to his deserved Punishment.

NEWPORT, November 9. Captain Giles Stanton arrived here, last Saturday, from Monto-Christi, in Twenty Days Passage. He informs, that the Spanish General at St. Domingo had sent Orders to the Mount, forbidding any English Vessel to lie there more than 24 Hours.

NEW-YORK, November 16. Captain Sheldon, from Newfoundland, in 17 Days, informs us, that Governor Palliser had lately condemned there, a French Ship and Cargo, which he found out of her Limits, for having only 6 Beaver Skins on board; the Vessel was afterwards cleared, and gone out of Port, but the Cargo detained.

PHILADELPHIA, November 19. Extract of a Letter from London, September 19, 1767. As to Politics, every Thing still remains as it has done for some Time past. Lord Mansfield is made Chancellor of the Exchequer pro Tempore, till our great Men can agree among themselves, or till some spirited, and honest Man, shall take the Lead (which I wish may be the Case) and, trusting in the King's Countenance and Support, who means nothing but the Happiness of his People, make a proper Arrangement of the Candidates for public Offices, and establish a Ministry upon a solid and respectable Footing; a Situation highly necessary for this Country.
