ANNAPOLIS, July 12.

On Tuesday the 5th Instant, came on, at Baltimore-Town, the Election of Four Representatives, to serve in the General Assembly of this Province, for Baltimore County, and the next Day, on closing the Polls, the following Gentlemen were declared duly elected, viz. Messrs. JOHN RIDGELY, JOHN MOALE, GEORGE RISTEAU, And, ROBERT ADAIR.

We are informed, the above Gentlemen carefully avoided Treating, both before and during the Election, to prevent the least Colour for a Second Complaint, on that Account.
