

more than his Duty, in assisting his Ally, the Republic of Genoa, against their rebel Subjects. Lord S... replied, "We do not consider the Corsicans as Rebels." "Your Proclamations fill them so," answered the Count.

They write from Paris, that, on the 12th of last Month, a Fire broke out in the Village of Bisseul, in Champagne, which, in the Space of Five Hours, destroyed 195 Houses. Twelve or Fifteen Persons, with 200 Cattle, perished in the Flames; and the Bells in the Steeple were melted; but one Half of the Church, and Nine Houses escaped.

July 7. We hear that all the marching Regiments, on the English Establishment, are ordered to be reviewed separately, by their Officers, and to make a due Return thereof to the War-Office, on or before the first of August next.

We also hear that a general Survey of the Navy is ordered to be made forthwith, and a due return made to the Lords of the Admiralty, with all speed; to which End, on Tuesday next, the proper superior Officers, will be appointed by the Lords of the Admiralty.

We are informed that Advice has been received of Four French Men of War having lately sailed from Brest, for the Coast of Africa.

It is rumoured, that several Men of War of the Line, will speedily be put in Commission, for an important Expedition.

They write from St. Petersburg, that the French Agents are industriously buying up all kinds of Warlike Stores, to be shipped in Russian Bottoms, for the Ports of Brest and Rochfort.

They write from Dublin, that great Quantities of Irish Provisions are now buying up in different Parts of the Kingdom, for the Use of the French garrisons in Corsica.

It is said Orders are given for a watchful Eye to be kept upon the Operations of the French at Dunkirk.

We hear Orders are sent to Ireland, for all the Fortifications of that Kingdom to be immediately put into a proper State of Defence.

July 9. Letters from Warsaw, of the 15th Ult. gives us the following Account of the Confederacy newly formed at Proshowick, Three (Polish) Miles from Cracow. The Nobility having assembled there, in order to hold the Diet, as soon as Mafs was over, which they always begin with, on a Signal given, every one drew their Sabres. A Member of the Regency having asked what they meant by it, was told, they were going to Confederate. It was in vain he represented to them the Consequences; they cried out, "Confederacy! Confederacy!" He asked them, "Would they rebel then against the King?" They replied, "No; if the King will join us, then we will join him, and all present shall sign it;" on which the Confederacy was immediately formed.

The News that the Nobleffe of Samogitia had entered into a Confederacy, is confirmed.

Yesterday some Dispatches said to be of Importance, were received at the Secretary of State's Office, from Commodore Spry, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Squadron in the Mediterranean.

Some Letters from Leghorn, mention, that the Genoese had been lately thrown into the greatest Consternation, on the receipt of a Memorial from Great-Britain.

They write from Genoa, that the Senate had received Advice, that the Corsicans had sent off their Wives, Children, and Effects, to certain strong Holds in the Mountains of Nebbio, while the whole Strength of the Island had been mustered, to watch the Motions of the French.

It is said Admiral Keppel will soon be appointed to the Command of a Squadron, now fitting out at Portsmouth, and Plymouth.

July 12. One Day last Week, at a certain Coffee-House, not 100 Miles from St. James's, a Wager of 1000 Guineas, to 20, was laid, that War would be declared between Great-Britain on the one Part, and France and Genoa on the other, before the 3d Day of August next.

It is reported, but we know not how true it is, that many Persons residing at Dunkirk, have been commanded to leave that Place.

By a Gentleman just arrived from Calais, we are informed, that the common Topic of Conversation, at that Place, Dunkirk, and other Sea-ports in France, is of an approaching War with England. He further says, that he was surprized to see in Calais many of the Doors and Windows of Houses, Churches, and on some Carriages, "No. 43, and Liberty," chalked.

We hear Orders are sent to the Out-Ports, to the Shipwrights to work a Day and one Tide in fitting out several Men of War intended for immediate Service.

Extract of a Letter from LECHORN, June 14. "We have received Advice from Corsica, that at the General Assembly, held at Corte, it was resolved to treat all those, as Enemies, who should make any Attempts against the Liberty of the Inhabitants of that Kingdom, and to defend, with Vigour, the Rights of the Country, which have been acquired by the Blood of so many Citizens. Pursuant to this Resolution, all the Inhabitants are forbidden, on Pain of Death, to furnish with Provisions, any of the Places occupied by the French. The Inhabitants of Capraia have likewise received Orders not to lend their Gondolas to the French; and General Paoli has promised the Inhabitants his Protection, and that of the whole Nation, and has sent some Detachments of Troops to the Coast, to watch the Motions of the French. These Advices add, that the Inhabitants of the Islands, are so highly animated in the Defence of their Liberty, that the very Women offer themselves to fight against all those who would endeavour to reduce them under the Yoke of the Genoese."

Extract of a Letter from Berlin, June 29. "Sir Andrew Mitchell, Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of London, is gone to the King at Potsdam, in consequence of an Invitation made him, on the Part of his Majesty; but what is the Motive of it, is absolutely unknown to the Public."

They write from Gibraltar, that a Moorish Admiral had just entered the Mediterranean, with Nine Sail of stout Corsairs, fitted out by the Emperor of Morocco, to cruise against the several European Powers with whom that Prince is at War.

BOSTON, August 29.

A Letter from Halifax, mentions, that the Troops from Louisbourg, St. John's, and the other Out-Posts, were arrived there; and those which were there before, lay in readiness to embark, and that it was currently reported they were destined for this Port.

We also learn, that there was in Halifax Harbour, the following King's Ships, viz. Launceston, Glasgow, Beaver, Martin, Bonetta, and Magdalene, and two or three more Men of War are hourly expected from England.

We further learn, that Fort Cumberland has been dismantled, and the Cannon, Stores, &c. together with the Troops, were arrived at Halifax.

NEW-YORK, September 5.

The Ship, Earl of Hertford, Captain John Pym, of New-York, left the Cape De Verd Islands, with a Load of Salt, the 18th of July last, bound for this Place: On the 18th of August about Six in the Evening, they met with a violent Thunder-Gust, one Clap of which gave the Ship a prodigious Shock; and on trying the Pumps they found she had sprung a Leak: They continued to labour hard at the Pumps till near two o'Clock in the Morning, when finding the Water above the Salt in her Hold, they hoisted out their Boat, into which the Captain and Crew got, consisting of 15 Persons in all, with some Provisions. It rained and was dark towards Morning, when they lost Sight of the Ship, and when Day-light came on, they could see nothing of her, so she must have gone down:—Two Days after they happily fell in with Captain Buck, in a Sloop from Salteruda for New-London, who took them all up; but being short of Provisions, a second Distress threatened them:—On the 28th they met with Captain Jones, in a Brig from Lisbon to Philadelphia, who took 8 of them on board, and carried them into that Port; and on Friday last, being about 4 Leagues from Barnagat, Captain Pym, with the Remainder of his Men, took to their Boat again, and arrived here on Saturday last.

Yesterday Morning Captain Hunt arrived here in 21 Days from South Carolina, who says, that 14 Days ago, he fell in with Captain Rogers, in a Brig from the Bay for this Port, who had in Company with him a Snow, which he said he had come up with a few Days before, adrift, having neither Man nor Papers on board, to discover where she belonged to, her Sails all to Rags, and about 5 Feet Water in her Hold; Captain Rogers's Men soon pumped her out, and having some spare Sails in the Brig, they had got them up on the Snow, and were bringing her along here.

ANNAPOLIS, September 15.

On Wednesday the 7th Instant, a Purse of One Hundred Pounds, was run for, at Leonard-Town, in St. Mary's County, which was won, with Ease, by Mr. M'Gill's Horse Nonpariel.

At the Assizes held for Baltimore County, last Week, Three Persons received Sentence of Death, viz. Patrick Constantine, for Murder; Edward Power, and Thomas Robinson, for Burglary.
