I defigued complying with every Custom of the Parish; I never intended, nor gave the least Affront to the Vestry, or to any Individual, and notwithstanding the Reception I met with, I bear no Man the leaft Ill-Will there.—The Custom in every Parish, by particular Inquiries of every Clergyman I have feen, exactly corresponds with my Conduct in this Respect, which is to register the Induction, for Security against Fire or Accident, the next Vestry-Day, but Possession was always taken before. This was what I practifed in Two Parishes, and not the least Objection was made in either. Mr. Chase, of Baltimore, assured me, that in a former Parish he held, upon a Dispute happening in the Vel try, he never did exhibit his Induction to them at all. When the Vestry asked me to let them see my Induction, I showed it them willingly, would have had it then registered, if they chose it; they had it in their Hands, and read it and at that Time seemed well satisfied. But if Vestries assume to themselves it is the Dual legal Powers, and arbitrary Privileges, it is the Duty of Lord Ballimore's great Officers of State to see that the Laws be duly executed, and his Prerogative kept inviolate, and the Security of his Prerogative will be the Security of my Property. If Vestries have by Law a Power of Admission, I delire not to divest them of it. I have inquired of almost every Lawyer in Maryland concerning the Matter, and they are univerfally of O-pinion that they have no fuch Power by Law.—I do not wish to abridge, much less annihilate the Power of Vestries, I think it stands on a good Footing both for the Parish and the Minister; and I should be very glad to concur with the Vestry of All-Saints, in any reasonable Expedient to restore quiet to the Parish.

A few Days, would indeed have been, as Tom Fun ob-ferves, too little by my Conduct to have removed Prejudices, but a few Minutes, with the Use of a Press, would have been sufficient. General Accusations against a Man's moral Character, are particularly un-generous, as they do not admit of a Defence, it being impossible to prove a Negative. A Man, for Instance, who would undertake to prove he never was in Liquor, in his Life, must bring every Man he ever sat down with, and this would not do; for they would say, as it was said of Mr. Addison, that he got drunk in his -The only Opening was to retort and prove clofet.—The only Opening was to retort and the fame Vices, by proper Vouchers upon my Antagonist. This the *Bystander* did.—The Piece was laughable enough—I showed it Mr. Chase, who returned it with this Declaration, if you publish it, The Party will murder you. Is not my Character as dear to me as another Man's?—What Right has any Man to attack my Reputation upon whom I have not an equal Right to retort? Is C.
