Manuscript (of which no Copy remains) was privately tucked up at the Door of the Stadt-Houfe, the General Assembly their sitting, and the Office of Provincial Printer vacant, by which (tho' not intended) he did his real Service; for, she was so happy, soon after, as to be unanimously chosen.
