On the 17th Instant, at break of Day, a Body of 12,000 Turks, consisting of 8000 Insistances, and 4000 Cavalry, passed the Nieder upon a Bridge that was covered by a Battery. About Noon the River swelled to such a Degree, that it carried 1870 the Bridge. Prince Gallitzin gaining Intelligence of this Event, attacked the Enemy so successfully, that some Hundress of the Turks escaped by swimming, and the Remainder were either killed, or taken Pri-Cannon, and a confiderable Quantity of Ball, Bombs, and other warlike Ammunition, with some Hundreds of Turkish Women. The Number of Prisoners taken by the Russians beyond the Niester, at the Departure of the Courier, already amounted to 6000, among whom were several Pachas. It was also rumoured in Kaminieck, that Count Potochi, Podszafy of Lithuania, and some other Confederates, had been put to the Sword by the Turks.
