Considerable Bets are laid at the West-End of the Town, that the Duke of Portland, Lord Camden, the Marquis of Rockingham, and Lord Chatham, will be at the Head of the Administration before the Month of April next.

Two Noblemen, who have been hitherto thought strongly attached to Administration, are expected to join the Minority on the next Division.

The French Minister at the Court of Berlin, and the Prussian Minister at Paris, are gone to their respective Homes, and it is thought they will not return, as their royal Masters seem to be of Opinion, that, according to the modern System, their respective Interests are of such a Nature, as not to make it necessary to keep a Minister at a great Expence at each Court.

Letters from Dantzick say, that a Second Fleet of 12 Ships of the Line is fitting out, with the utmost Expedition, in Russia, the Command of which is to be given to Admiral Kofinnin.

Feb. 17. Accounts from Vienna declare, that Advice had been received from Constantinople, that the Grand Signior will certainly put himself at the Head of his Troops, early in the Spring, and that Two of the most respectable Powers in Europe, have engaged to furnish him with Twenty Ships of the Line, in case the Russians should commence Hostilities in the Mediterranean.

Authentic Advices from Venice say, from a Number of concurring Circumstances, it is imagined the Republic will be engaged in the present War between Russia and the Ottoman Porte.

Accounts from Cadiz, Ferrol, and Carthage, mention, that Orders have been sent from the Court of Madrid, to fit out all the Men of War in those Harbours, with the utmost Expedition, and that the like Instructions had been dispatched to Corunna, Barcelona, and Malaga.

A Gentleman who has lately visited most of the Sea-ports of Spain, says, that their Marine is in a very poor Condition, and that it will take them a considerable Time to equip a Fleet of any Consequence.

Letters from Madrid, dated Jan. 23. say, "Our Court is astonished to see it in many foreign Papers strongly asserted, that most of the Ports in this Monarchy are making Preparations for War; it is very foreign from the Truth, which is, that they are building a few new Vessels, and repairing those that wanted it, and arranging some other Things, only with a View of putting the Navy on a good Footing."

Letters from the Frontiers of Poland, dated Jan. 23. say, "On the 23d Instant the Confederates attacked Col. Drewitz near Dobra, but he received them in such a Manner, that they lost all their Infantry and Artillery. It is said that the Russians were only 6000 Men, and the Confederates between 7 and 8000. This is the first Time, and very likely the last, that the Confederates will dare to attack the Russians, and give them Battle according to the Rules of War."

It is said, that an Account of the Number of Men and Shipping from England and Scotland, that were employed last Season in the Newfoundland Fishery, has been laid before a great Assembly.

They write from Paris, that a Body of 50,000 French Troops have been ordered to be formed early in the Spring, but the Object of this Force remains at present a profound Secret.

The learned Serjeant Glynn, Knight of the Shire for the County of Middlesex, made a most spirited and elegant Speech, in a certain Assembly on Monday Night last, in defence of the glorious Cause of Liberty, which lasted for Three Hours and Seventeen Minutes.

L—N—th declared last Week, that "All he had came unasked, quite freely and spontaneously to him;" on which Mr. E—nd B—ke compared him to an Oyster, which lay still gaping for the Tide, ready to receive it, whether it came from the East, West, North, or South, and taking it in, however muddy, foul, and dirty. Another Member added, that "if L—N—th was the Oyster itself, J—m—h D—n and J—k—n were the Two Shells."

Feb. 18. The Evening before the E—l of C—m went out of Town, sitting in Company with a select Party, he declared his Intention of going into the Country next Day, as the Affair, he said, "Was all over." Some Friends of his interposing, and begging his Lordship would wait a few Days longer, he replied in a great Passion, "Zounds, if it was possible Truth or Justice could prevail by their own Force, I

would stay Years in Town, to do my Country all the Service in my Power; but when there is a Majority for G—t on every Question, all further Opposition would be as ridiculous as for a poor Man to contend with a rich one, when the Dispute was alone to be determined by the length of their Purse."

Letters from Hamburgh mention, that the Court of Petersburg lately received some Advices, which had determined the Empress to demand a categorical Answer from the Court of Versailles, whether France intends to take any Part in the present War between the Turks and Russians?

They write from Constantinople, that the People there are very apprehensive the Court of Vienna will soon join the Russians; and they say if that should happen, the Downfall of the Ottoman Empire will be at no great Distance.

Letters from Cadiz mention, that a Fleet of Spanish Men of War is now fitting out there, said to be intended for a secret Expedition.

We are assured, that when Lord Camden delivered up the Seals to a certain great Personage, a long Conversation ensued, in the Course of which, the latter frequently expressed great concern at the present unhappy Divisions, and repeatedly mentioned his Anxiety to put a Period to them as soon as possible.

Feb. 20. Notwithstanding the Reasons assigned for putting Jamaica under martial Laws, the Intelligent, from many concurring Circumstances of the Orders given for the Commissioners of the Visiting-Office to make Preparations to victual a Fleet, the Orders from the Admiralty to fit out several capital Ships, and the Report of 2000 Stand of Small-Arms now sending from the Tower to the said Island, conclude that a War is not very distant.

The French Court, in less than a Fortnight, will have Eight Ships of the Line, Four Ships of 50 Guns, Four small Frigates, and Two Bombketches, ready to put to Sea. For this Purpose, a very great Number of Naval Artificers were a few Days ago sent from Brest to Toulon, in which Place they now are.

Last Week, Beating Orders were issued from the Board of Admiralty, to enlist Recruits to fill up the Vacancies in the Three Divisions of Marines on the Portsmouth, Plymouth, and Chatham Divisions.

The Report from the Committee appointed to examine into the State of the Nation, which was to have been received last Friday in a certain H—e, was put off 'til this Day, a previous Question having arisen, which took up the Deliberation of that Assembly 'til near Ten at Night.

Letters from Vienna, dated January 27. say, "Letters from Hermanstad advise, that the Beginning of this Month the Turks fell upon Buckarest, the Capital of Valachia, and drove the Russians from thence; some Days after the Russians returned, drove away the Turks again, and pursued them a great Way. Many of the Inhabitants of that Province have abandoned their Houses, and Numbers of them have taken Refuge in Transylvania."

Immediately after the Earl of Hillsborough's last Conference with a great Personage, his Lordship went to Judge Bathurst, and we are assured from good Authority, strongly solicited him to accept the Seals.

A Report was last Night current at the Smyrna and Cocoa-Tree, that a French and Russian Man of War had met near the Straits of Dardanelle, and on the former's refusing to give the Precedence to the latter, they came to an Engagement, in which the Russian was worsted. This it is supposed will cause an immediate Rupture between the Two Nations.

Letters from Warsaw, dated January 27. say, "Yesterday an Express arrived with Advice, that a Body of Confederates have taken at Sidles, an Estate belonging to Prince Czartorowski, Grand Chancellor of Lithuania, Count Grabowski, late Marshal of the Confederacy of the Dissidents, together with his Brother, Chief of the Lithuanian Horse-Guards, both Majors-General in the Army of this Grand Dutchy, and Knights of the Order of St. Alexander in Russia. These Two Officers lived retired upon that Estate, without any Apprehensions of being molested by the Confederates. After plundering and using them very ill, they were put in a Waggon, and carried away, but it is not known whither. This Affair makes a great Noise, and it is not doubted but the Russian Ambassador will insist upon these Noblemen being set at Liberty."
