Corunna, Dec. 18, 1769. This comes to acquaint you, that after a long and troublesome Journey of eight Days (from Vigo) we got here, and are imprisoned in an Island separate from the Town, and have not spoke to the Consul General, nor the Vice Consul, nor any other Person; neither are they suffered to come and see us. We came here very wet, and were put in Prison in that Condition; we had nothing to lie on but a hard Floor for three or four Days; and now have a Handful of Straw, which is as dear as Feathers in England. These are the Hardships which we now undergo, and what we shall suffer more God only knows! I know not. My Service to the Consul at Vigo. When you write to me desire the
