

Y Letters from Spain, we learn,
that the Court of Madrid has
ordered several Companies of
different Regiments of Infantry
to hold themselves in readiness
for the Coast of Africa, as
they have received Intelli-
gence, that the Moors, not-
withstanding the bad Success
of their Enterprize against the
Fortress of Oran, are again determind to attack the
Spanish Garrisons in those Parts.

L O N D O N, March 7.

We hear that a noble Lord still continues to urge
the Expediency of demanding a categorical Answer
from the Courts of France and Spain, relative to the
Object of their present warlike Preparations in Europe,
Asia, Africa, and America.

March 8. A patriotic Member observed on Monday,
when a Motion was made to postpone the further
hearing of American Affairs, that it was much to be
apprehended they would put the Business off once too
often.

We are sorry to inform the Public, as we can from
good Authority, that it is now found impossible for
the Government of this Country to satisfy the Ameri-
cans while any Regard is paid to the Honour and Ma-
jesty of Great-Britain. It is at length clear that no
Repeal of any former Laws, which they considered as
Vexatious to them, will satisfy the Demands of the
trans-atlantic Patriots; nothing less than a formal
Disavowal and Renunciation of the Mother Country's
having any Right to Tax her Colonies at all, will it
seems be accepted as a Step towards other Accommo-
dations; and if the British Parliament subsist, we may
reasonably suspect, that the Day is not very far off
when America will assume a Right to tax England.

Immediately after the Vote of the House of Com-
mons passed, respecting the American Affairs, Six
Ships sailed home in Ballast, that in all Probability
would have been laden with our Manufactures, to the
Amount of at least 150,000l. in case the Determination
had been answerable to the Wishes of the Colonists.

We hear that in Consequence of some Advices re-
ceived from Madrid, George Pitt, Esq; will set out on
his Embassy to the said Court, much sooner than was
at first intended.

The Parliament we hear, will not be prorogued 'til
June.

A Letter from Toulon mentions, that Mons. Bom-
part had received Orders to put to Sea with several
Men of War and Frigates; and it was given out that
their Destination was for the Coast of Barbary.

It is positively asserted that the Land Forces of the
Spaniards posted at the Havannah amount to 13,000
Men, besides a Fleet well manned, stationed there,
ready to act on the shortest Notice.

March 9. We are informed by a Gentleman lately
arrived from the Continent, that about Five Weeks
ago there were 26 Ships of War at Cadiz, near 20
of which are Ships of the Line, ready to put to Sea at
Two Hours Notice, and several of their Sails were
actually bent; and that there were near the same
Number in the Caraccas, that would be ready to go to
Sea in a Week.

Lord Chatham in his Speech on Friday last, the 2d
of March, Inst. observed, "That he would tell the
warmest Friends of America; that they had gone too
great Lengths, and pushed Matters much too far.
How far they intended to proceed, he was at a loss to
determine, but thus much he would assert, and abide
by, that if America was determined to set at Defiance
all the Acts of Trade and Navigation of this Country,
they would not be able to find in this Kingdom, a
more determined Opposer."

Extract of a Letter, by the last Mail, from the Hague, to
a Merchant of this City, dated February, 27.

" Things are carrying on here in such a Manner,
that it is not doubted but a War in Europe is near at
Hand; for it remains no longer a Secret that the
French and Spanish Ambassadors have both strongly
solicited the States General for their Assistance, in
case either of their Principals should be attacked; but
this has absolutely been refused; whereupon they were
as strongly pressed to observe a strict Neutrality, which
I believe is most agreeable to the Dutch in general, as
thereby they will enjoy the Benefit of Trade. On the
other Hand, the King of Prussia seems (by the De-
mands he has made) to think, that if a War should
break out, it will be incumbent on us to take Part in
it; on which Account we have augmented our Forces,
both by Sea and Land, that we may be prepared for
the Event."

March 19. We hear a Detachment from the Regi-
ments of Artillery at Woolwich, will be embarked for
Jamaica, as soon as the necessary Transports shall be
got ready.

Orders are sent to the Carron Water Manufactory,
in Scotland, for a large Number of Ship Cannon,
Field-Pieces, Mortars, &c. to be got ready as soon as
possible.

By Letters from Warsaw we are told, that in the
late bloody Action between the Russians and Confede-
rates near Dobra, in the Palatinate of Kalisch, most
of the Chiefs of the latter were slain, and amongst
them the Count Zawoyiski, who had served in France
under Marshal Saxe, and was greatly regretted.

The Genoeese pretend to have lost Three Millions by
the late Arrangements in the French Finances.

Letters from Holland by the last Mail bring an Ac-
count, that upwards of Twenty Sail of Dutch Ships,
were lost on the Coast of France, in the Storm of
Wind which began the 13th Ult. and continued blow-

I can never consent to increase fraudulently the Civil
Establishment under Pretence of making up Deficien-
cies, nor will I ever bid so high for Royal Favour;
and the Minister who is bold enough to spend the
People's Money, before it is granted, (even though
it were not for the Purpose of corrupting their Repre-
sentatives) and thereby leaving the People of England
no other Alternative, but either to disgrace the
Sovereign by not paying his Debts, or to become the
Prey of every unthrift and corrupt Minister, such
Minister deserves Death.

senger on board the Sally Brig; who, with the Captain,

Corunna, Decr 18, 1769.

" This comes to acquaint you, that after a long and
troublesome Journey of eight Days (from Vigo) we got
here, and are imprisoned in an island separate from the
Town, and have not spoke to the Consul General, nor
the Vice Consul, nor any other Person; neither are
they suffered to come and see us. We came here very
wet, and were put in Prison in that Condition; we had
nothing to lie on but a hard Floor for three or four
Days; and now have a Ransful of Straw, which is as
dear as Feathers in England: These are the Hardships
which we now undergo, and what we shall suffer more
