wards for real Services, and as Encouragement to other gallant Heroes. They were honourably earned in a different Sort of Campaigns from those at Westminster; they were gained by Actions full of Danger to themselves, of Glory and Benefit to this Nation; not by corrupt Votes of Baseness and of Destruction to their Country. You will find no secret Service there; and you will find that when the Warrior was recompensed, the Member of Parliament was left free. You will likewise find a Pension of 1500l. a Year to Lord Camden. I recommended him to be Chancellor; his public and private Virtues were acknowledged by all, they made his Station more precarious; I could not reasonably expect from him that he should quit the Chief Justiceship of the Common Pleas, which he held for Life, and put himself in the Power of those who were not to be trusted, to be dismissed from the Chancery, perhaps the Day after his Appointment. The Public has not been deceived by his Conduct. My Suspicions have been justified; his Integrity has made him once more a poor and a private Man; he was dismissed for the Vote he gave in favour of the Right of Election in the Subject.

Here the North British Lord, who lately made a remarkable Declaration about the Revolution, and talked of foreign Force, called Lord C—m to order. The Conferee of Sixteen and the Magpies clamoured—To the Bar!—To the Bar! L—m—t moved, that Lord C—m's Words should be taken down.

Lord C—m.] "I neither deny, retract, or explain these Words. I do re-affirm the Fact, and I desire to meet the Sense of the House; I appeal to the Honour of every L—d in this —, whether he has not the same Conviction."

Lord R—m, Lord T—e, and many other Lords, did on their Honour most solemnly affirm the same.

Lord S—h and Lord W—th would have withdrawn the Motion; but Lord M—, encouraged by Lord M—d, persisted, and moved in Erse, that nothing had appeared to justify such an Assertion.

Lord C—m.] "My Words remain untracted, unexplained, and re-affirmed. I desire to know whether I am condemned or acquitted; and whether I may still presume to hold up my Head as high as the Noble Lord who moved to have my Words taken down."

To this no Answer was given. Lord C—m.] "If I am to go off acquitted I do now declare to you, that there are many Men to impeach, and many Measures to arraign, for the Security of this Nation, and the very Existence of our Laws and Constitution; and, by God's blessing, I will arraign and impeach them."

In this same select Company, on the same Day, a certain L— was hard driven on a former Declaration he had made, viz. "That he never had disclosed, and never would disclose, his Opinion on the Middlesex Election; but that it should be buried with him in his Grave." He was forced at last to add, "except in private intimate Confidence."

March 23. A great Politician has publicly declared it as his Opinion, that if domestic Matters are suffered for a short Time to subside, popular Clamour will gradually decrease; and has therefore strongly recommended American Affairs to be taken into immediate Consideration.

April 2. Yesterday his Excellency the French Ambassador gave a splendid Entertainment to a great Number of the Nobility and several of the foreign Ministers, at his House in Great George Street.

Friday some very important Dispatches arrived at the Earl of Weymouth's Office, from his Excellency William Henry Littleton, Esq; his Britannic Majesty's Ambassador at Lisbon, and Saturday Morning Don Mello de Carvelle, the Portuguese Ambassador, had a Conference with Lord Weymouth, on the Subject of Dispatches received from his Court.

The Numbers in a certain Place on Friday Night were 187 to 125.

It is whispered that a fresh Prosecution will be commenced against a popular Patriot in the Month of May, on an old Subject.

Commodore Forek, who commands on the Jamaica Station, has lately sent home, requesting some more Ships to be sent out, as the Spaniards have been making great Preparations in those Parts for some Time past.

It is reported that a Treaty is on Foot with the Emperor of Morocco for ceding to France a very commodious Port on the African Coast contiguous to Guinea.

It is said that all the Regiments in England, both Horse and Foot, will be reviewed by his Majesty in the Course of the ensuing Summer.

The last Dispatches, from Mr. Murray, the British Ambassador at Constantinople, confirm the Accounts already published of the great warlike Preparations of the Turks; and add, that the Grand Signior will cut a more respectable Figure at Sea this Summer, than at any Time since the Establishment of the Ottoman Navy.

They write from the Hague, that an illustrious German Prince is going into the Service of France.

It is now said that there is not the least Ground for the Report of an intended Coalition, Matters having been carried too far on both Sides to admit of a Compromise.

April 4. It is reported a great Personage has desired a Conference with Lord Camden, on an Affair of Importance; and a Report is circulated, that this upright Lawyer will be reinstated in the Possession of the Seals.

A certain great Personage was very rudely treated by the Populace on Friday Night, in going from the Theatre.

Notwithstanding the utmost Diligence has been used in the Course of the present Sessions for the Dispatch of public Business, we are assured, that the same cannot be finished before the latter End of next Month.

It is said that Overtures have been made to the Minority, which, it is said, is likely to bring about a Reconciliation.

An Ambassador Extraordinary is soon expected in London from Constantinople, charged with a Commission of great Importance, from his Sublime Highness the Grand Signior to the King of Great-Britain.

A Letter from Galipoli mentions, that Twenty Sail of Turkish Men of War are now riding near the Mouth of the Hellespont, to dispute the Passage of the Russian Fleet.

April 5. In examining the State of the Nation on Tuesday Night, we are informed, the Sum of One Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Six Hundred and Five Pounds appear to have been issued from the Civil List Revenues towards maintaining the Household.

We are credibly informed that, for the Future, none but Persons of high Rank and Character will be appointed Governors of his Majesty's Plantations in America.

It was Yesterday confidently reported, that the Grand Signior had transmitted to our Court, by Means of John Murray, Esq; his Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, some Dispatches of a very extraordinary Nature, which are now under Consideration of the Ministry.

By Persons that are well acquainted with the Port of Constantinople, it is affirmed, that that City lies so exposed (besides being built of Wood) that a Squadron of English Men of War, with a few Bomb-Ketches, would reduce the remainder to Ashes in a few Hours.

It is said, the remainder of the Russian Fleet now at Portsmouth will leave that Harbour in a Fortnight's Time, and pursue their Voyage for the Archipelago.

We are credibly informed that Five Mea of War are now fitting out as a Re-inforcement for the Fleet on the Jamaica Station.

A Correspondent assures us, "That the noble Person who is supposed to influence our Councils, is now seeking Health, long lost, upon the Mountains of Waldagnia, suffering what Brutes might pity! So far is this noble Person from concerning himself in our Affairs of Government, that he is the most industriously ignorant of them. Those who correspond with him, all received it in charge at his going, never to name the Subject in their Letters. Nor let this Account be received (says this Correspondent) as an idle and ignorant Tale: He who writes this has the Honour of that Correspondence; and has received that Charge at the Condition of it, and has never violated the Injunction."
