" My Lords and Gentlemen,

I RETURN you my Thanks for this very loyal and dutiful Address. It is with great Satisfaction that I receive from my Parliament so grateful an Acknowledgement of my tender Regard for the Rights of my Subjects. Be assured, that I shall continue to adhere to the true Principles of our excellent Constitution; from which I cannot deviate, without justly forfeiting the Affections of a free People."

March 18. The Tweed Frigate, now lying at Chatham, is ordered to be got ready for the Earl of Dunmore, in order to carry his Lordship to his Government of New-York, for which he intends to embark in a few Days.

April 3. It is now said to be certain, that a Request for Disfranchisement will not take Place; but that to accommodate Matters, a Reconsideration of particular Resolves is determined to be complied with.

It is said that Overtures have been made to the Minority, which, it is said, is likely to bring about a Reconciliation.

It is confidently reported, that the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, who so greatly distinguished himself in the Course of last War, has accepted of a Commission in the French King's Service.

We hear the Marquis of Rockingham is to have a Conference with a great Personage in a few Days, on the Subject of some very important Matters, which, it is thought, will greatly contribute to reconcile the present party Dissentions.

It is now certain that a noble Person, for his late Conduct on his present political Principles, will be soon deprived of that Addition to his Titles which gives him the Military Government of a certain County.

It is also said, that the only Thing which has retarded the Execution of the above Measure, is a Dispute concerning his Successor; though we believe the Minister's Eye is more particularly pointed at a certain Object.

We hear from undoubted Authority, the Reason why so many Encampments are now forming round this Metropolis, is only intended as a preventative Measure, to preserve the Peace, if disturbed by an unruly Mob, on the Enlargement of a Popular Prisoner.

Saturday the Hon. Capt. Leveson Gower, Brother to Earl Gower, set out from Pall-Mall, for Portsmouth, in order to take on him the Command of one of the Men of War belonging to the Fleet which is shortly to sail from thence to the Mediterranean, to watch the Motions of the French and Spanish Fleets, and to see whether they will offer to obstruct the Passage of the Russian Fleet. In case of an Attempt of this Kind, it is thought the latter will be joined by the English Fleet, though the Consequence should be involving Great-Britain in a War.

They write from Leghorn, that Advice had just been received of a smart Engagement between Three Russian Men of War and Seven Tripolitan Corsairs, in which Four of the latter were sunk, one burnt, and one run on Shore.

Reports are now industriously circulating, that the American Affairs will, at last, be brought to a happy Period; but many Gentlemen, skilled in the Temper of the Colonies, greatly doubt it, for there was a Time, (say they) when the Minds of the Americans

were susceptible of whatever Impressions the Mother Country wished to communicate; there was a Time, when their Affections were unalienated; and there was a Time, when we were no less felt than acknowledged of the most eminent Importance to their Convenience and Welfare. But they had not their Manufactories established amongst them, they had not then discovered that Money was the Key to every Port, and the pass pour in all Climates.

That a War is both seriously talked of at Court, and expected will soon happen, is a Piece of Intelligence that may be depended on.

It is said a Gentleman has received some extraordinary Intelligence lately of some secret Preparations, and Intentions, respecting our old Friends, who never can be idle, and are now united, and formed into a Combination, not only to oppose our Trade, but are going on, in a most secret Manner, to destroy it. The Gentleman, we are told, has, in a most dutiful Manner addressed a great Personage that he may be heard before the Secretary of State, in humble Hopes notice may be taken of it; but if left to chance, a Number of ill Consequences to this Nation will attend it, notwithstanding all French Evasions to the contrary.

DUBLIN, March 18.

The Eight following Noblemen and Gentlemen have been struck of the List of Privy Counsellors here: The Earls of Shannon, Laneshorough, and Louth; the Speaker of the House of Commons, Sir William Fownes, Bart. Sir William Mayne, Bart. Hercules Langford Rowley, Esq; and William Brownloy, Esq; William Brabaxton Ponsonby, Esq; Son of the Speaker, is dismissed from his Place of Examiner of the Customs. Lord Annaly, Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, has agreed to resign upon a Pension; and John Hely-Hutchinson, Esq; (who is Alnager) is to succeed him, and to have a Peerage. Lord Duncannon is appointed Governor of the County of Galway.

BOSTON, May 14.

Letters from New-York and Philadelphia intimating, that it has been reported in those Capitals, the Merchants of this Town determined to break through their Agreement and import Fall Goods, notwithstanding the continuance of the Tea Duty; we can assure the Public that nothing can be further from Truth, nor has the Spirit of the Trade at any Time appeared more determined. The Bulk of the Goods which came contrary to Agreement, though shipped by Persons who had not signed, are now put on board the Lydia, Capt. Scott, and do not fill the Hold by a Fourth Part. No one besides the old Importers has yet had the Stupidity to act so much in Opposition, to the Sense of their Country as to persist in Violation, of its unanimous Resolution, we believe that our Trade with Great-Britain will not be open 'til the whole of the late Revenue-Acts are repealed.

NEW-YORK, May 21.

The following is the Postscript of a Letter from a Gentleman in London, to his Friend in this City, dated 26th of March.

" I had forgot, when I concluded this Letter, to tell you that large Quantities of Goods have been lately shipped, and are now daily shipping for Virginia, Maryland, Rhode-Island, Boston, and Montreal, which will doubtless circulate all through the Colonies; the greatest Part of what are shipped, and shipping, are by Strangers unaccustomed to the Trade, so that unless the old Traders should order Goods, the Trade will of Course circulate through a new Channel.

PHILADELPHIA, May 17.

Extract of a Letter from London, brought by Capt. Carr. " The Conversation now is, that it is under the Contemplation of the Treasury to come into an Accommodation with the East-India Company, as to the Duty on Tea, in the following Manner.

" It is proposed to repeal the Statute, which allows a Drawback of Sevenpence Halfpenny per Pound on Tea shipped to North-America; and to repeal the Act, which imposes a Duty of Threepence in the Pound, payable in America; by which, the Revenue will be benefited Fourpence Halfpenny in the Pound, and a commercial Expedient be adopted for the total Repeal of the American Revenue-Act."
