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

08. 4. Last Sunday the Crow of the Peggy Greendman, of Whitby arrived there. They had made best fishing of any Ship from England, having en Four large Whales, Three under Size and a live or. On the 22d of June they got clear of the Ice, a making the best of their Way to England, were

overtaken by a violent Gale of Wind, which drove them back again into the Ice, where their Ship was crushed to pieces on the first of July, in Latitude 80: 20 North, Haelluit's Headland bearing W. S. W. a-bout Fifteen Leagues. They were about Fourteen Hours upon the Ice, when Part of them were taken up by the Anne and Elizabeth, and the other Part by the Brifish Queen both belonging to Hull. The whole Ship's Company are safely arrived at Whitby.

One Circumstance rather fortunate happened in this Affair: The Captain, when it was deter-mined the Night before to rest at Barnet, loaded his Piftols in the Resolution to defend himself against all Assailants; but the Lady infissing on their being un-loaded again, as she declared she could not seep with loaded Piffols in the Room, the Captain took out the Charges, which probably prevented Bloodshed on the Purfuers breaking open the Door of the Bed-chamber in which they lay. Extrast of a Letter from the Hague, dated Off. 10. " We have this Moment received, by Express, Letters from Vienna, which mark that Prince Lobkowitz, who fet out from the Austrian Court about Four Months ago, on his Second Embally to the Court of St. Petersburgh, has happily fulfilled the great Object he had in Charge; that in Consequence of the Emperor's iteady Adherence to the Fust Proposal which he had made to the Empress of Russia, namely, " That he would never fuffer the Ruffian Aimy to pass the Danube," the Czarina has at last acceded to an amicable Accommodation with the Porte; and it is confidently afferted, that the Czarina is to reftore to the Poste all such Territories as her Armies have conquered, either in Afia or in the Archipelago; that her Proops are to evacuate the Towns of Cotzchim, or Brailow, Ismael, &c. On the other Hand, the whole of Tartary, North of the Sea of Afoph, is to be ceded to her Czarish Majesty, in full Sovereignty; together with the Crimea lower Territory, which is to be held of the Imperial Crown of Russia, by the Kan, as a

aifo to make her Czarish Majesty a pecuniary Compen-"That with respect to the Emperor of Germany, the Two extensive Provinces of Moldavia and Walachia, North of the Danube, are to be ceded to him in Perpetuity; but that the present King of Peland is to to have the Government of them during his natural Life; and that his Polish Majesty, in return, is to abdicate the Kingdom of Poland, which is to be guarantied by the high-contracting Parties to Prince Albert of Saxony, who for that Purpose is to be elected King of Poland, with hereditary succession.
