Recause, though the placing such a power in the King, with the interpolition of both Houses of Parliament, is a better security against the abuse of it, than if it had been entrusted to the King alone, yet it may be so used, in corrupt or violent times, as to be made, in some cases, a perpetual negative on the freedom of

Because, if the power be grievous, and contrary to the inherent rights of mankind, the grievance is in-creased by the infinite number of persons over whom,

in the course of time, it is likely to extend. Because we are convinced, that all the good purposes and objects of the bill, which we have greatly at heart, might have been answered, without giving that perpetuity of restraint over the freedom of marriage, which we think ourselves bound in conscience to op-
