WARSAW, Od. 15. Many of the nobles of Great Poland have caused to be printed and published a declaration, importing that lince the ministry of the King of Poland. at Waifaw take no measures to end the troubles of the kingdom, they have refolved to conflicute a permanent council, of which the Prince Augustus Sulowiki, Palatine of Gneina, is nominated president, with sourteen afficants. They have impowered this council to treat

with foreign courts, declaring they can no longer depend upon the government of Warfaw.

PARIS, Oct. 19. The government has augmented the pensions of those fathers who were here ofore jetuits, and are seventy years of age, 100 livres a year. Near Grosbois, in Brie, there was a convent of Camaldules, the only house of that order in France, which the government has thought proper to suppress, allowing the common monks a pension of soo livres per annum each, and the prior 1200. A new bo y of laws is going to be formed for the Island of Corsica.
