e HE pope he'd a congregation the 19th infant, on the affairs of the ex-je uits, which lasted upwards of an hour; during which time, the debates were carried on with gie t warmth: at the breaking up of the congregation, it was reported that his holinets had diffolved it; but that was not the cafe, nor was it ikely, fince it was held at the defire of the courts of bourbon. who have infilted that the prefent pope shall not a ter any thing that has been done by his predecisfiors with respect to the jesuit : on the contrary, they demand or him the public tion of a buil, to confirm that which diffolves that fociety. It is reported upon this occ fion, that in one of the auditures which the spanish ambefile dor had of the pope, and in which he infi ed on the prisoners being released from the cathe of St. Angelo, he expressed himself in the following effect: holy father, I ad refs myself to you as minister from his catholic Maje"y, and I declare to you in the nun e of the king my master, that the ministers of the ourts of Pourbon will leave Rome the moment you let at itberty the jesuits who are prisoners." It is faid, that the pope was fo struck with this speech, that he reposed, he withed for nothing to much as to live upon frien ty terms with those courts, and that every thing resp & ing the jefuit . flould continue upon the f me footing, and confequently that the prisoners should not be set it liberty. It is moreover affured, that the court of 1 ortugal has not yet engaged to pay pensions to the jesuits expelled from that k ngdom. Three prisoners were, however, released from t e castle of :t. Angelo soon after the congregation of the 19th instant broke up viz. the fathers Ce chim and Ifari, and the fecular indie ozzi, who have been confined ever fince last uly, for propagating some pretended prophecies; and they received a strict charge to take care for the tuture how they engage in fuch absurdities.

For this concession on the fire of government, America recognizes the supremacy of the mother country, and pledges herielf to pay an annual income of 200,000 l. subject to

her own mode of affifing.

One of the merchants who refides at Norfolk requefted that the veffel q ight proceed with her cargo to Quibec, which was refused; nor would the committee furer it to be transflipped into another vessel belonging to the company, then loading for Whitehaven; nor allow the Molly to take in the tobacce whi h was prepared for her; but compelled the merchant to fend the cargo back in the fame bettom, without diminution or addition, to be landed at & hitehaven: for the performance of which they obliged him to give a bond of 30001.

PROVIDENCE, Sept. 9.

A veffel arrived at Boston from London on Wednesday last, but we do not learn that any intelligence by her has yet transpired.

CAMBRIDGE, Sept. 14.

On Monday last a regular soldier, from the besieged army in Bolton, went off in a canoe, with a delign, as it s supposed, of deserting: being dis overed, a ser-geant and four men haltened in pursuit of him; but he had reached to near Dorchelter Point before they overtook him, they having an unweildy boat to manage, and the wind against them, they could not recover the wharf again. Lieut. Sparrow, of col. Cotton's regiment marched down with a small party, and by his dexterity soon got within musquet shot, and threatened to fire in case they attempted to escape; they all sur-rend red themselves prisoners. The boats were imme-diately secured. The same day the six prisoners were brought under guard to head quarters in this town.

WATERTOWN, Sept. 11.

NEW-YORK, September 18.

Capt. Cunningham, from St. Thomas's, informs us, that on the 31st of July, on his passage from this port

for that island, he met with a very violent gale of wind, attended with uncommon sharp thunder and lightning, which proved to be the very day the late gale happened in the West-Indies, and in which 16 sail of French vesfels were cast away at Martinico, 6 or 7 at Santa Croix, and the Virgin illands, and that all the veffels at St. Kitts, Dominica, and St. Eustatia, were obliged to put to sea; that in the island last mentioned the planters had turned half of the cane lands into: provision ground; that the Spaniards at Porto-Rico had suffered very much in the faid gale; and that a stoop that had failed from St. Thomas's the 31st of July; for Santa Croix, with five gentlemen passengers, had not been heard of at either island as late as the 23d of August.

Several vessels, both from Europe and America, had been blown to leeward of Santa Croix, in the above gale, but had got up again.

Capt. Lee left Falmouth the 17th of July, and a few days after fell in with a brig from Maryland, for England. About three weeks ago he spoke with capt. Osborne, in a ship from London, for Philadelphia, and kept company with him ten days.

Capt. Hervey, in the ship Dutchess of Gordon, spoke with the following veffels, viz. July 28th, lat. 49, 49, with the Cerberus f. igate, from America, for I ondon; August 7th, lat. 41, 19, lon. 28, 30, a brig from Philadelphia, for Lisbon; the 12th, lat. 42, 15, lon. 39, with a schooner from this port for Bristol; the 21st, lat. 42, 35, lon. 53, with the brig Charming Sally, capt. Caldwell, 16 days from Virginia, f r Glasgow.

Isle au Noix (12 miles from St. John's) Sept. 8, 1775.

We embarked on Monday 28th of Augua, and procreded from Ticonderoga to Crown-Print; --- there we encamped until Wedneiday; -- from thence down the lake to a place colled Wilborough, where we tarried that night: in the morning proceeded on our passage to a place near that called the Four Brothers; from thence to the life au Motte, where we remai ed until the fecond division came up. From the isle au Motte we proceeded to the life au Noix; having staid there one day went to St. John's, and were kindly faluted with bombs and cannon from the fortifications. We immediately landed to entrench ourselves within about a mile and an half of the fort; but no sooner had we landed, than we were attacked by a body of horans and regulars who lay in ambush for us:---We lost four foldiers on the spot, -- three more were mortally wounded, who died in about four hours. Seven others were wounded, among whom are two officers, major Hobby and capt. Mead. We drove the enemy off, but thought it prudent to return to the life au Noix, until our artillery could come up.---We are determined to attack them shortly, and a bloody ingagement must en-fue, as they are very strongly fortified, and a number of Johnston's Indians are among them :--- We have a few with us.

An ther letter from the same place says, that the officer who commanded the party of the king's troops was either killed or wounded.

Sept. 21. On Tuesday evening the Amboy stage boat in returning to this city with pallengers, way, brought to, by the Asia man of war's boats, and capt. Tiley, an officer belonging to gen. Woofter's regiment, taking out and carried on board the man of war, with a box of papers in his custody, also 3 guns which were on board the stage boat. I he pretence for this felonious piratical outrage, is faid to be the detention of a suspected person, who is on his parole of honour in gen. Wooster's camp. This person having been observed to follow at a dittance, a load of powder on its way to the camp at Cambridge, was taken into cultody by the rifle-men and carried to general Washington, who not finding any evidence against him, sent him to general Wooster, who at his requelt, permitted capt. Liley to go for him to Bordon town for a box of papers, which he faid would clear his character, and prove him to be a true friend to the liberties of America. It is imagined, that on his intelligence, capt. I iley was detained. If fo, it will be but justice to retaliate on him any ill usage

capt. I iley may receive.
