ARSHAL Romanzow arrived at Kolominski on hursday last; and was re-ceived by the empress with every posfible mark of satisfaction: He declined the honour of a triumphal entry, which was intended him, and for which magnificent prepa-

rations had been made. On riday morning the empress, accompanied by the great duke and ducheis, and attended by the great officers and lidies of the court, the knights being in the habits of their respective orders, walked in grand procession from the old palace in the Kremlin to the eathedral, where solemn mass was performed by the Archbishop of Petersburgh, and e Deum sung for the conclusion of the war; after which her imperial magicity, having returned in procession to the hall called Granovitaia in the old palace, was addressed by the procureur general, in the name f the whole empire, in an harangue full of expressions of the deepest gratitude for the bleffings which her reign had produced, and particularly for that recent one, the reftor tion of pubfic and domestic tranquillity, which her wisdom had so happily accomplished: !o which the vice-chancell r made a short but gracious answer, in the name of his fovereig ; after which the first five classes of the nobility had the howur of kiffing her majesty's hand. The keeper of the privy purie then read aloud a list of the gratifications and rewards, which the empress was pleased to bestow upon this occasion. Among the principal ones were:

To marshal Romanzow, an estate of 5000 peasants, 100,000 roubles in money, a fervice of plate, a hat with a wreath of laurel, enriched with precious stones to the value of 30,000 roubles, a diamond ftar and shoulderknot, a marshal's staff, and a diploma adding to his sur-name that of Sadeunaiskoy, which may be translated;

The Uttra-Danubian. The count Alexis Orlow 60,000 roubles, and a fword enriched with diamonds, of very confiderable value, and a diploma granting to him the furname of Chefme.
