fore the king; and I have it in command from his majesty to express to you his majesty's approbation of your for the public fervice, and of the unalterable attachment you have shewn to his person and government, from the first commencement of the present un. happy disputes, which have involved his majesty's faithful tervants in the colonies in difficulties and diffres, that are only to be equalled by the fortitude with which they are borne.

Your letter contains a great deal of very useful information, and your confidential communication of the characters of individuals, more especially of such as come over into ! ngland, is of great advantage; and you may relt affured that every possible precaution will

be used that no part of your letter shall transpire. An armament, onfitting of feven regiments and a fleet of trigates and finall flips, is now in readinels to proceed to the fouthern colonies, in order to attempt the reitoration of legal government in that part of America. it will proceed in the first place to North-Carolina, and from thence either to South-Carolina or Virginia, as circumstances of greater or less advantage shall point out ; - if to the latter, it may have very important confequences to the colony under your government ; and therefore you will do weil to confider of every means by which you may, in conjunction with lord Dunmore, give facility and affiltance to its operations.

TFE king being determined, in concurrence with his parliament, to purfue the most vigorous measures for reducing his rebellious fubjects in North-America to obedience, and for reftoring legal government has given the royal affent to the melofed, act, which I am commanded by his majesty to transmit to you, and at the same time to fignify to you his majesty's pleasure, that you do exhort all persons, upon whom the execution of this law shall depend, to pay a due attention thereto, and to we their best endeavours for carrying the provisions of it into effect; and trust that when his majetty's deluded subjects in the affociated colonies are better apprized of the fatal confequence of the conduct they have adopted and fee the determined fpirit of the nation to maintain its conftitutional rights, they will avail themselves of the means which the justice and benevotence of the supreme legislature have head out to them, of being restored to the king's grace and peace, and that a happy and lafting re-concliation and union will be effected and I have the satisfication to acquaint you that, in order to accelerate this refinable object the proper steps have been taken for passing a commission under the great seal, in conferently to the last section but one of that set, and that the commissioner or commissioners to be appointed for that purpose will have full power to enquire into the state and condition of the colonies, and to confer with proper persons upon such points as may be necessary for effecting a restoration of the public tranquillity.
