ENERAL HOWE, commander in chief of his majesty's forces in North-America, having taken a resolution, on the 7th of March, to remove from Boston to Halifax with the troops under his command, and fuch of the inhabitants, with their effects, as were defirous to continue under the protection of his majeffy's forces; the embarkation was effected on the 17th of that month, with the greatest order and regularity, and without the least interruption from the KEBELS. When the packet came away, the first division of the transports was under fail, and the remainder were preparing to follow in a few days, the admiral leaving behind as many of the ships of war as could be spared from the convoy, for the fecurity and protection of such vessels as might be bound to Boston.

Whitehall, May 5. The king has been pleafed to order letters patent to be passed under the great seal of Great-Britain, conflituting and appointing Richard lord viscount Howe, of the kingdom of Ireland, and the hon. William Howe, Big; major-general of his majetty's forces, and general of his majetty's forces in North-America only, to be his majesty's commissioners for reforing peace to his majesty's colonies and plantations in North-1.merica; and for granting PARDONS to fuch of his majesty's subjects there, now in rebellion, as shall deserve the royal mercy. [This is the ministerial idea.]

## LONDON, April 23.

The ship Williams, capt. Wheatley, from Jamaica, is arrived at Bristol, and brings an account, that the latter end of February nine fail of Spanish men of war of the line, and five frigates, with a great number of foldiers on board, arrived at cape François, where they landed their men; that this news has much alarmed the inhabitants of Jamaica, who expect a visit from them; and that necessary preparations are making to give them a proper reception.

Letters from Lisbon, dated the 7th of April, mention, that seven ships from Philadelphia had arrived there with corn and flour, and that they were to take loading, and return to Philadelphia the first opportu-

The following transports failed on Sunday from Gravesend for spithead, in order to take on board the guards for Boston, viz. the Jameson, Patterson, the Morning Star, Janson, and the Lord Rochford, Lambert.

Letters from Alicant, by the Chambro, capt. Smith, which is arrived off Dover, bound to Offend, bring advice, that on the first of February a considerable fleet of men of war, having on board near 2000 troops failed from thence for the island of Cuba and Hilpaniola.

Several Jamaica merchants, it is faid, have received letters from thence yesterday, with orders not to fend any more goods till further orders, as they imagined that there would foon be a strange revolution in that

Orders were fent down last night to Portsmouth, for feveral floops of war to get ready to put to led at fix hours notice, in order to carry expresses to America, and to the governors of the Well India illands.

The following letter was taken in capt. Arnaud, in the Queen of England storeship, addressed to an officer's daughter then in this town, dated Cork, September 205

My dear Mifs, AS your letter (which I received the 2d inflant) comes from the world of war, furrounded with fire and iword, fickness and poor provisions, it gives us great pleasure to hear that all your family are in the land of the living; and, whilft you can exist in the slames, we may call you all salamanders. God grant you a speedy call from butchering your friends there, to protect us here from the Spaniards, from whom we expect a visit fo foon as B-te and N-th can advife them of our troops here being embarked for your affiftance; however, as a recompence to us for the loss of these brave fellows, our generous popish nobility and gentry have differed to raise popular regiments to protect this kingdom; which proposal has been gracifusly received; so that you must acknowledge us to be under a kind and promising influence. Every day our ears and eyes are faluted with drums beating and colours flying, for volunteers, as they call them, with Mr. Cowley at their head; with a dray and feveral barrels of beer on it, to entice the rabble; and, like the wide ocean, receives all; (pick-pockaets, shoe-boys, cleve-boys, and cow-boys) with green boughs fluck up (to fave the expence of cockades) in their hats, together with many faggots decorated in the fame uniforms; from hence they marched in this glorious expedition to Bandon, and fome other conflitta-tional towns; but how can I relate (after exting lome of his late majefly's bread) without wetting my paper with tears, the indignity that was offered to his majer. ty's forces?
