all fuch cales as the affirmation of quakers hath been allowed and accepted within this state instead of an oath. And further, on fuch affirmation warrants to fearch for itolen goods, or the apprehension or commitment of offenders, ought to be granted, or fecurity for the peace awarded, and quakers, dunkers or menonists, ought also on their solemn affirmation as asoresaid to be admitted as witnesses in all criminal casts not capital.

37. That the city of Annapolis ought to have all its rights, privileges and benefits, agreeable to its charter and the acts of affembly confirming and regulating the same, subject nevertkeless to such alterations as may be made by this Convention or any

future legislature.

38. That the liberty of the press ought to be

inviolably preferved.

39. That monopolies are odious, contrary to the spirit of a free government, and the principles of commerce, and ought not to be suffered.

40. That no title of nobility or hereditary honours ought to be granted in this state.

41. That the subsisting resolves of this and the feveral Conventions held for this colony ought to be in force as laws, unless altered by this Convention or the legislature of this state.

42. That this declaration of rights, or the form of government to be established by this Convention, or any part of either of them, ought not to be altered, changed or abolished by the legislature of this flate, but in fuch manner as this Convention shall prescribe and direct.

This declaration of rights was affented to and passed in Convention of the delegates of the freemen of Maryland, begun and held at Annapolis the 14th day of August, anno domini 1776.


