

192 found in Pennsylvania, and five others mentioned
as having been sent to the upper states or out for country; that he
either chose to take his chance of the law, than take
up arms against his king and country, which was the
sole cause of his returning to England. In America
first, he called two witnesses, one of whom confirmed
what he said; the other, who was a merchant, said,
that at first time, masters were not come to extremities;
but the taking up of arms was more voluntary.

Sixty advocates just came from the English metropolis
to Lisbon, which cast a damp on his master's coun-
seil, and scattered through all his armies.

WILLIAM M. B. & P. G., London, etc.

On Tuesday night an express arrived from General
Custis, with dispatches to his excellency, advising
of his having received over his army from the Cumber-
land country, after concluding a treaty of peace with
Cumberland, and three other chiefs, on the part of the
whole nation, in their capacity of Cherokees, the particulars
of which are as follows, viz. All captives in their
hands, white or black, to be delivered up, fugitives re-
turning to Virginia by the route of Kentucky, at the
Long-Branch, and such as were taken from the towns
of North Carolina and Georgia at their return, as
fugitives as possible; besides the horses, cattle, and prop-
erty, at every place they have taken from the Indians,
at their value, to be determined by commissioners
on both sides, who are to meet for that purpose
at the Long-Branch. No white people to be captured
by the Cherokee, after they are committed to be
delivered up to the forces of America. All men
carrying arms, mounted, trade, slaves, and per-
sons, passing through the Cherokee, allowed to pass
across their country, and breaking fortifications,
to be wholly surrendered to the Virginia force,
with the number of their own chiefs, not exceeding
ten in number, to be made, and peace, harmony,
and brotherly affection, to take place. For the trans-
portation of these articles they agreed to charge
each carriage, 2000 lbs of iron, 1000 lbs of gunpowder
in them; it is exchanged yearly, the same money as
the Indians pay may require to be paid into their
hands.

Gen. Custis thought proper, before he set out on
his return home, to make a example of three towns
under the influence of a chief called the Indian King,
who was in principal cause of the war, and the other,
called Leavenworth, where a white prisoner of war was
badly burnt. These he utterly destroyed, yet did no
other damage to the Indians, whose pecuniary condition,
as many visitors, might have judged a more rigor-
ous punishment. It is to be hoped, however, that
the country's humane treatment of the savages, will
be used to work to its power to distract them, and
render secure any future machinations of such in-
cendiaries as erect and incite the Indians to fit them up to
war against the United States.
