

flattering recompence of all my labours would be the testimony of your satisfaction."

To which the president in behalf of congress returned the following answer:

"S I R,

"We receive with much concern the intimation you have given us, that the bad state of your health obliges you to leave America; though at the same time we are sensible of the continued friendly care of his Most Christian Majesty, in sending a new minister plenipotentiary to these states.

"Great as our regret is in thus parting with you, yet it affords us pleasure to think how well disposed you are to improve the favourable opportunities you will have, on your return to France, of evincing to his majesty the reality of those sentiments on our part, which may justly be termed the animating principles of the United States.

"By such representations the king will be assured, that the citizens of these states observe with the most lively satisfaction the repeated instances of his amity for them; that they regard the alliance as an inextinguishable connection, endeared to them by the purity of the motives on which it was founded, the advantages derived from it, and the blessings it promises to both nations; that their resolution of securing its essential objects, liberty and independence, is unalterable. That they are determined, by all the exertions in their power, to advance the common cause, and to demonstrate that while they are attentive to their own interests, they as ardently desire to approve themselves, not only faithful but affectionate allies.

"By a residence of more than a year near congress, you are enabled to form a competent judgment of the difficulties we have had to encounter, as well as of our efforts to remove them.

"Sir, We should be deficient in the respect due to distinguished merit, if we should fail to embrace this opportunity of testifying the high esteem, which you have obtained throughout this country by your public and private conduct. You have happily combined a vigilant devotion for the dignity and interests of our most excellent and illustrious ally with a zealous attachment to the honour and welfare of these states.

"Your prudence, integrity, ability and diligence, in discharging the eminent trust reposed in you, have secured our entire confidence, and now solicit from us the strongest declaration of our satisfaction in your behaviour.

"That you may be blessed with a favourable voyage, the approbation of your sovereign, the perfect recovery of your health, and all happiness, is among the warmest wishes of every member of this body.

There have been amongst the testimonies of respect exhibited to his excellency. Besides which, the attention paid to him by our worthy general and by the army, in two visits to the camp; and moreover the deference shown to him in polite assemblies and more public companies, which he has honoured with his presence, have completed that satisfaction which his sensibility would lead him to enjoy, from a knowledge that he has possessed the universal confidence and esteem of a virtuous and free people.

Thursday, October 21st, he set sail from the continent: his reputation shall remain amongst us, and go down with reputation to posterity. In the language of Cicero, "he has left a pleasing and lasting memory of his services and name with all Americans."

Shall it be said, that the testimonies of esteem exhibited to this illustrious character might be spared, seeing he was the minister of a foreign power, and not of these States? Let it be considered that he was the minister of a foreign power, whose interests are the same with those of these States; and for this reason, he was in some sense the minister of these states. Moving in the same

line, our ministers are the ministers of France, and the ministers of France are our ministers. When we cut away, as we ought to do, the idea of distinction in the council, we lose also that of distinction in the persons. The conjunction of action gives a community of approbation; and while France honours our commissioners and later ministers with testimonies of esteem, we shall gratefully retribute, add amicably compromise the generous contention of good-will by equal acts, on our part, of complaisance and friendship.

The case is widely different where two powers, though not at war, yet are opposite in interests to each other. There the minister of each power is spy upon the court where he is appointed to reside; and in proportion as he executes his trust faithfully for the respective power who has commissioned him, he is the object of watchfulness on the part of that power where he has his residence.

America and France, with regard to each other, are not in this situation. They enjoy a unity of interests, and combine a unity of councils. The man, in any station, who shall best understand and pursue the interests of the one, shall serve most faithfully the interests of the other, and shall best deserve the panegyric of both.
