"By such representations the king will be affured, that the litzens of these sizes ob ferve with the most lively substaction the repeated inflances of his amity for them; that they regard the alliance as an ineffinable conmedion, endeared to them by the purity of the motives on which it was founded, the advantages derived from it, and the biclings it promifes to both nations : that their reformi securing its essential objects, liberty and inde-pendence, is unal era le. That they are dependence, is unal eracle. That they are de-termined, by all the exe tions in their power, to advance the common cause, and to cemon firste that while they are attentive to their own interests, they as ardently defire to ap prove themselves, not only faith ul but affectionate allies.

" By a residence of more than a year near congres, you are enabled to form a competent judgment of the difficulties -e have had to encounter, as well as of our efforts to re-

shove them.

"Sir, We should be descient in the ref pect due to diffinguish denerer, if we should fail o emb ace this opportunity of tethfying the high efteem, which you have obtained throughout this country by your public and prive te conduct. You have happily combined a vigilant devotion for the dignity and interof our molt excellent and illuttrious ally +As with a zealous strachment to the honour and

welfare of these states.

"Your prudence, integrity, ability and diligence, in discharging the eminent trust reposed in you, have secured our entire considere, and now folicit from us the strongest declaration of our satisfaction in your beha-

vionr

"That you may be bleffed with a favoura ble voyage, the approbation of your fovereign, the perfect recovery of your health, and all ha pinef, is among the warmelt wishes of every member of this bod.
