WHERE Sit is thought expedient, that commissioners be appointed to thate and fettle the public accounts, and that they have power to call on all persons indebted for settlement and

payment of their balances;

Be it enalted, by the General Assembly of Ma-ryland, that Stephen Weit, William Stephen-son, and Lewis Neth, or any two of them, be and are hereby appointed commissioners for stating and fettling the public accounts, and that they have full powers to inspect and examine the and proceedings of the late and prefent auditor-general, and fee that the fame be properly posted and entered up; also the accounts and proceedings of the late and prefent commission of stores, commissioners of the loan-office, and quarter matter; and that they have full chillent call on the governot and council for the cower to call on the governor and council for the journals and proceedings of the coun il of satety, and of the late governor and council, thereby to facilitate their enquiries into the loan and dispo-ccion of all public monies; and that they have full powers to call on the commissioners of the full powers to call on the commindees of the tax and the collectors of the fame, to render full accounts of their respective proceedings, and see that the same be properly closed and finished, according to the directions of the several acts of assembly relating thereto; and that they have full powers to call on all persons who have had public monica advanced to them by the conven-erous, general affembly, council of fafety, or by order of the late governor and council, to render an account thereof; and in general, that they,
