By this neglect you have lest the enemy at liberty to attack you wherever they pleased: if you are quit of an alarm; if Mr. d'Orvilliers has not landed at Plymouth, and has not reduced that town and its arsenals to ashes, it was only the violent east-wind, which blew while he was before it, that hindered him from approaching near enough to have effected a landing. The ministers say, that next year they will ast with more vigour! They talk of reinforcements: for my part, to speak freely, I expect no good from all that they can do, at least that with inferior forces, they will not be able to fight the enemy, for we are sure that he can always preserve a superiority in number over us; and that by the month of May next the French will send to sea eight ships of the sine more than they had the last year; the Spaniards sour.
