HEREAS full power and authority is given to me, by and with the advice of the council, to continue the act, entitled, An prohibit for a limited time the exportaof wheat, flour, rye, Indian corn, rice, i, beef, pork, bacon, live flock, peas, beans, and other victual, and for other purposes, stam and after the tenth day of this instant, until the end of the next sellion of the general assembly, and to issue my proclamation accordly, provided the embargo be continued in the states of Pennylvania and Delaware, so that the trade of Delaware bay be not open for the emo-lument of the people refiding on the waters, or in the vicinity thereof. And it appearing, that the embargo hath been continued in the state of Pennsylvania until the thirtieth day of this month, and in the state of Delaware until the twentieth day of October next. And, Whereas by my proclamation iffued on the ninth instant, by and with the advice of the council, the said act was continued until this day, and having good grounds to believe that the embargo in the state of Pennsylvania hath been continued in force. I do therefore, by and with the advice of the council, hereby continue the faid act until the

end of the next fession of the general assembly.
